PINE MEN WANT **ONLY SOUARE DEAL**

Benevolent neutrality will be the attitude of the Southern Pine assoisiation on the matter of proposed rail rate advances when the association's case is presented by A. G. T. Moore, assistant secretary, to the Interstate Commerce Commission at its hearing in Washington this week.

Resolutions adopted at a meeting of the transportation committee of the association here last week and subsequently approved by the association's directors, accept increases, conditional upon their being made uniform on all commodities.

"The attitude of the Southern Pine association," says Mr. Moore, is one of what might be termed "benevolent neutrality' with regard to uniform rate advances. In this particular instance, however, much is involved, and considerable opposition from other shippers of lumber and various commodities is in evidence. Hence we are forced to the realization that should objections of our competitors he sustained and our rates alone advanced because of our attitude, we would be doing ourselves a grave injustice. Accordingly, we will thoroughly! present our transportation burden to the commission to obviate any possible misconstruction of our at-Witude.

"In connection with the presentation of the Southern Pine association, the most exhaustive and complete analyses which has even lbeen prepared in the history of the lumber industry will be introduced as evidence of the fact that already lumber is bearing more than its just proportion of the cost of transportation. It is indicative of the broad-minded, business policies of the yellow pine lumbermen, notwithstanding this knowledge, to *consent to uniform rate advances."
