#### Returns of Capital Invested Show Large Increase For 1905. Compared With 1900.

# Ottawa, June 27.—A bulletin issued to-day shows the capital invested in Canadian industries for 1905 to be \$843.—931,178, an increase of \$397,000,000, or 90 per cent. Over 1900. The production only increased 50 per cent. The apparent disparity in these ratios of increase was due to the inability of recently established works to produce their full capacity. In cars and car works for example the ratio of production to capital in 1900 was 151 and in 1905 it was 101; in Portland cement works 17 and 32 and electric light works 17 and 32 and electric light works 17 and 9 for the years respectively.

The five years have been a growing period in industrial investment, and the full results are not yet realised.



The criminal is not an isolated fiber but a condition of life closely interwoven with all that goes to make our complex social fabric. He is not an isolated but an associated factor. He is something more than a relic from past ages. He is not a mere reversion to a primitive type of humanity, but an actual, if very imperfect, member of our present society.

The criminal is still a man, something more than a curious anatomical specimen of humanity that some would Lave us believe. Whatsver he may have done he is part of that corporate life in which we all live and have our being. I do not believe the criminal act to be a strange deed of a remote and non-human order of being, nor the outself of the conduct of one who is linked in a thousand and one ways with his fellows. The act is anti-social, anarchic, and distinctive, but to understand the actor we must revert to his social conditions and human relations.
