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¶ An order for Morning
Prayer to be used yeerely the
fift of August.

Exhort you therefore, that first of all, prayers, supplications, intercessions, and giuing of thankes be made for all men: For Kings, and for all that are in authoritie, that we may leade a quiet and peaceable life, in all godlinesse and honestie. For that is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Sauour.

1. Tim. 2. vers. 1. 2. 3.

¶ First the Minister shal with a lowd voyce pronounce one of these 3. sentences following.



At what time soeuer a sinner doeth repent him of his sinne from the bottom of his heart, I will put all his wickednesse out of my remembrance, saith the Lord.

Ezech. 18.

Rent your hearts, and not your garments, and turne to the Lorde your God, because he is gentle and mercifull, he is patient, and of much mercy, and such a one as is sorie for your afflictions.

Ioel 1.

To thee, O Lorde God, belongeth mercy and forgiveness: for wee haue gone away from thee,

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thee, and haue not hearkened to thy voyce, where-
by we might walke in thy lawes which thou hast
appointed for vs.

Dearely beloued brethren, the Scrip-
ture mooueth vs in sundry places, to
acknowledge and confesse our mani-
fold sinnes and wickednesse, and that
wee should not dissemble nor cloke
them before the face of almighty God our heauen-
ly father, but confesse them with an humble, low-
ly, penitent, and obedient heart, to the ende that
wee may obtaine forgiuenesse of the same, by his
infinite goodnesse and mercy. And although wee
ought at all times humbly to acknowledge our
sinnes before God, yet ought we most chiefly so to
doe when we assemble and meete together, to ren-
der thanks for the great benefits that we haue re-
ceiued at his hands, to set forth his most worthy
praise, to heare his most holy worde, and to aske
those things which bee requisite and necessary, as
well for the body as the soule. Wherefore I pray
and beseech you, as many as be here present, to ac-
company me with a pure heart and humble voice,
vnto the throne of the heauenly grace, saying af-
ter me.

¶ A generall confession to be said of the whole con-
gregation after the Minister, kneeling.

Almightie and most mercifull father, we haue
erred and strayed from thy waies like lost sheep,
wee haue followed too much the deuices and de-
sires of our owne hearts. Wee haue offended a-
gainst thy holy Lawes. We haue left vndone those
things which wee ought to haue done, and wee
haue

for the fift of August.

haue done those things which wee ought not to haue done, and there is no health in vs, but thou, O Lord, haue mercy vpon vs miserable offenders. Spare thou them O G O D, which confesse their faultes, restore thou them that be penitent, according to thy promises declared vnto mankinde in Christ Iesu our Lord. And graunt, O most mercifull father, for his sake, that wee may hereafter liue a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of thy holy name, Amen.

¶ The absolution to be pronounced by
the Minister alone,

A Almighty God, the father of our Lord Iesus Christ, which desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that hee may turne from his wickednes and liue, and hath giuen power and commandement to his ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the absolution and remission of their sinnes, he pardoneth and absolueeth all them which truely repent, and vnfeignedly beleue his holy Gospel. Wherefore we beseech him to grant vs true repentance and his holy spirit, that those things may please him which wee do at this present, and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy, so that at the last wee may come to his eternal ioy, through Iesus Christ our Lord.

The people shall answere, Amen.

¶ Then shall the Minister begin the Lords prayer
with a lowde voyce,

Our father which art in heauen, halowed bee thy name. Thy kingdome come. Thy will be done in earth as it is in heauen. Giue vs this day our dayly bready. And forgine vs our trespalles, as

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wee forgiue them that trespasse against vs. And lead vs not into temptation. But deliuer vs from euill, Amen.

THe Lord is my light and my saluation, whom then shall I feare: the Lord is the strength of my life, of whom then shall I be afraid?

When the wicked (euen mine enemies and my foes) came vpon me to eat by my flesh: they stumbled and fell.

Though an hoste of men were layd against me, yet shall not my heart be afraid: and though there rose by warre against me, yet will I put my trust in him.

One thing haue I desired of the Lord, which I will require: euen that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the dayes of my life, to behold the faire beauty of the Lord, and to visit his Temple.

For in the time of trouble he shall hide me in his Tabernacle: yea, in the secret place of his dwelling shall he hide me, and set mee by vpon a rocke of stone.

And now shall he lift by mine head: aboue mine enemies round about me.

Therefore will I offer in his dwelling an oblation with great gladnes: I will sing and speake praises vnto the Lord.

Hearken vnto my voice, O Lord, when I crie vnto thee: haue mercie vpon me, and heare me.

My heart hath talked of thee, seeke ye my face: thy face Lord will I seeke.

O hide not thou thy face from me: nor cast thy seruant away in displeasure.

Thou hast been my succour: leaue me not, neither forsake me, O God of my saluation.

When my father and my mother forsake me: the Lord taketh me by.

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Teach me thy way, O Lord: and leade mee in the right way, because of mine enemies.

Deliver me not over into the will of mine aduersaries: for there are false witnessen risen by against me, and such as speake wrong.

I should vtterly haue fainted: but that I beleeue verely to see the goodnesse of the Lord in the land of the liuing.

O tary thou the Lords leasure: be strong, and he shal comfort thine heart, and put thou thy trust in the Lord.

Draw mee out of the net that they haue laide priuily for me: for thou art my strength.

I haue hated them that holde of superstitious vanities: and my trust hath beene in the Lord.

I wil be glad and reioyce in thy mercy: for thou hast considered my trouble, and hast knowen my soule in aduersities.

Thou hast not shut mee by into the hand of the enemy: but hast set my feete in a large roome.

Haue mercy vpon mee, O Lord, for I am in trouble:

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trouble: and mine eye is consumed for very heauinesse, yea, my soule and my body.

For my life is wahren olde with heauinesse: and my yeeres with mourning.

My strength faileth mee, because of mine iniquitie: and my bones are consumed.

I became a reproofe among all mine enemies, but specially among my neighbours: and they of mine acquaintance were afraide of mee, and they that did see mee without, conueyed themselues from me.

I am cleane forgotten, as a dead man out of minde: I am become like a broken vessel.

For I haue heard the blasphemie of the multitude: and feare is on euery side, while they conspire together against me, and take their counsaile to take away my life.

But my hope hath beene in thee, O Lord: I haue said, thou art my God.

My time is in thy hand, deliuer mee from the hand of mine enemies: and from them that persecute me.

Shewe thy seruauant the light of thy countenance: and saue me for thy mercies sake.

Let me not be confounded, O Lord, for I haue called vpon thee: let the vngodly bee put to confusion, and be put to silence in the graue.

Let the lying lips bee put to silence: which cruelly, disdainefully, and despitefully speake against the righteous.

How plentiful is thy goodnesse, which thou hast laide by for them that feare thee: and that thou hast prepared for them that put their trust in thee, euen before the sonnes of men.

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Thou shalt hide them priuily by thine owne presence from the prouoking of al men: thou shalt keepe them secretly in thy tabernacle from the strife of tongues.

Thankes be to the Lord: for he hath shewed me marueilous great kindnesse in a strong citie.

And when I made haste, I said: I am cast out of the sight of thine eyes.

Neuerthelesse thou heardest the voyce of my prayer: when I cried vnto thee.

O loue the Lord all ye his saints: for the Lord preferueth them that are faithfull, and plentifully rewardeth the proud doer.

Be strong, and hee shall stablish your heart: all yee that put your trust in the Lord.

Exultate iusti. Psal 33.

Reioyce in the Lord, O yee righteous: for it becommeth well the iust to be thankfull.

Praise the Lord with Harpe: sing Psalmes vnto him with the Lute and instrument of tenne strings.

Sing vnto the Lord a new song: sing prayeses lustily (vnto him) with a good courage.

For the word of the Lord is true: and all his workes are faithfull.

Hee loueth righteousnesse and iudgement: the earth is full of the goodnesse of the Lord.

By the word of the Lorde were the heauens made: and all the hostes of them by the breath of his mouth.

He gathereth the waters of the sea together, as it were vpon an heape: and layeth vp the deepe, as in a treasure house.

Let all the earth feare the Lord: stand in awe of
him

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him all yee that dwell in the world.

For he spake, and it was done: he commanded, and it stood fast.

The Lord bringeth the counsaile of the Hea-then to nought: and maketh the deuises of the people to bee of none effect, and casteth out the counsels of Princes.

The counsell of the Lord shall endure for ever: and the thoughts of his heart from generation to generation.

Blessed are the people whose God is the Lord Jehoua: and blessed are the folke that he hath chosen to him to be his inheritance.

The Lord looked downe from heauen, and beheld all the children of men: from the habitation of his dwelling he considereth all them that dwell in the earth.

Our soule is escaped, euen as a birde out of the snare of the fowler: the snare is broken, and wee are deliuered.

He hath no pleasure in the strength of an horse: neither delighteth he in any mans legs.

For hee hath made fast the barres of thy gates: and hath blessed thy children within thee.

Hee maketh peace in thy borders : and filleth thee with the floure of wheate.

¶ The first Lesson, is the xxij. Chapter of the second Booke of Samuel.

 And Dauid spake the wordes of this song vnto the Lord, what time the Lorde had deliuered him out of the hand of all his enemies, and out of the hand of Saul. And he sayd, The Lord is my rocke, and my castle, and my deliuerer.

God is my strength, in him will I trust: he is my shield, & the horne of my saluation, my hie tower, and my refuge, my sauour, thou hast saued mee from wrong. I will call on the Lorde which is praise worthe: and so shall I be saued from mine enemies. For the pangs of death closed me about, the floods of Belial put me in feare. The sorowes of hell compassed mee about: the snares of death ouertooke me. In my tribulation did I call vpon the Lord, and cryed to my God: and hee did heare my voice out of his Temple, and my cry did enter into his eares. The earth trembled and quaked: the foundations of heauen mooued, and shooke when he was angry. Smoke went out at his nostrils, & consuming fire out of his mouth: coales were kindled thereat. And he bowed heauen, and came downe, and there was darkenesse vnder his feete. And hee rode vpon Cherub, and did flie: he came flying vpon the wings of the winde. Hee made darkenesse a tabernacle round about him: with waters gathered together in thicke clouds. Through the brightnesse of his presence, were the coales of fire kindled. The Lorde thundred from heauen: and he that is most high, gaue his voice. He shot arrowes, and scattered them: to wit, lightning, and ouerthrew them. The channels of the Sea appeared, and the foundations of the world were seene: by the reason of the rebuking of the Lorde, & through the blasting of the breath of his nostrils. Hee sent from aboue, and tooke me: he drew me out of many waters. He deliuered me from my mightie enemy, and from them that hated mee: for they were too strong for mee. When they had preuented me in the day of my calamitie:

lanitie:

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lamitie : the Lord stayed me by. For hee brought mee out into a large place : hee deliuered me, because he had a fauour vnto me. The Lord rewarded me according to my righteousnesse : according to the purenesse of my hands he recompensed me. For I haue kept the wayes of the Lord : and did not wickedly against my God. For all his lawes were in my sight : and from his statutes I did not depart. In his sight also haue I beene vpright : and haue kept me from mine owne iniquity. And the Lord did to me againe according to my righteousnesse : euen after my purenesse in his eye sight. With the godly thou shalt be godly : and with the man that is vpright, thou shalt be vpright. With the pure thou shalt be pure : & with the froward, thou shalt shewe thy selfe froward. And the poore people thou wilt saue : but thine eyes are vpon the proud, to bring them downe. For thou art my light, O Lorde : and the Lorde shall lighten my darkenesse. For by thee I shall breake through an hoste of men : and by my God will I spring ouer a wall. God is vncorrupt in his way, the word of the Lorde is tryed in the fire : hee is a shield to all that trust in him. For who is a G O D saue the Lord ? and who is mightie saue our God ? God strengtheneth me in battell : and maketh the way cleare before me. He maketh my feet like Hindes feete : and setteth mee vpon my high places. Hee teacheth my hands to fight : so that euen a bowe of Steele is broken with mine armes. Thou hast giuen mee the shield of thy saluation : and with thy louing meekenesse thou dost multiply mee. Thou hast enlarged my steps vnder mee : and my legges shall not faile mee. I haue followed vpon
mine

for the fist of August.

mine enemies, and destroyed them: and turned not againe butill I had consumed them. I haue wasted them and wounded them, that they shall not be able to arise: yea, they shall fall vnder my feete. Thou hast girded me about with might to battell, and them that rose against me, hast thou subdued vnder me. And thou hast giuen mee the neckes of mine enemies: that I might destroy them that hate me. They looked about, but there was none to saue them: euen vnto the Lord, but hee heard them not. Then did I beat them as small as the dust of the earth: I did stampe them as the clay of the street, & did spread them abroad. Thou also hast deliuered mee from the dissension of people, thou hast kept me to be an head ouer nations: the people which I knew not, do serue me. Strange children dissemble with me: at the hearing of the eare they obey me. Strange children will shrink away: and they shall be smitten with feare in their priuie chamber. The Lorde liueth, and blessed bee my strength: magnified bee God, euen the force of my saluation. It is God that giueth me power to reuenge me: & bringeth downe the people vnder me. He deliuereth me from mine enemies, thou also hast lift mee vp on high from them that rose against mee: thou hast deliuered mee from the wicked man. And therefore I will praise thee, O Lord, among the nations: and wil sing vnto thy Name. He is the towre of saluation for his king, and dealeth mercifully with his annoynted: with Dauid, and with his seede for euermore.

¶ The seconde Lesson is the xxiiij. Chapter of the Actes of the Apostles.

AD Paul earnestly beholding the counsaile, said, Men and brethren, I haue liued in all good conscience before God vntill this day. And the high Priest Ananias commaunded them that stood by, to smite him on the mouth. Then said Paul vnto him, God shall smite thee thou painted wall: for sittest thou and iudgest me after the law, and commandest me to be smitten contrary to the law? And they that stood by, said, Reuilest thou Gods hie Priest? Then said Paul, I will not, brethren, that he was the high Priest:

For it is written, Thou shalt not curse the ruler of thy people. But when Paul perceiued that the one part were Sadducces, and the other Pharisees, he cryed out in the counsaile, Men and brethren, I am a Pharisee, the sonne of a Pharisee: of the hope and resurrection of the dead I am iudged. And when he had so said, there arose a debate between the Pharisees and the Sadducces: and the multitude was diuided. For the Sadducces say that there is no resurrection, neither Angel, nor spirit: but the Pharisees confesse both. And there arose a great cry: & when the Scribes which were of the Pharisees part arose, they stroue, saying, We find no euill in this man: but if a spirit or an Angel hath spoken to him, let vs not strue against God. And when there arose a great debate, the chiefe captain fearing least Paul should haue beene pluckt asunder of them, commanded the souldiers to goe downe, and to take him from among them, and to bring him into the castle. And the night following, the Lord stood by him, and said, Be of good cheere, Paul: for as thou hast testified of mee in Hierusalem, so must thou beare witnessse also at Rome. And when it was day, certaine of the Jewes gathered themselves together, and made a bow, saying that they would neither eate nor drinke till they had killed Paul. And they were moze then fourtie men, which had made this conspiracie. And they came to the chiefe Priests & Elders, and said, We haue bound our selues with a bow, that we will eate nothing vntill we haue slaine Paul. Now therefore giue ye knowledge to the chiefe captaine, and to the counsaile, that he bring him forth vnto

you to morow, as though ye would know something more perfectly of him: and we, or euer hee come neere, are ready to kill him. And whē Pauls sisters sonne heard of their laying a wait, he went and entred into the castle, and tolde Paul. And Paul called one of the vnder captaines vnto him, and said, Bring this yong man vnto the high captaine: for he hath a certaine thing to shewe him. And he tooke him, and brought him to the high captaine, and said, Paul the prisoner called mee vnto him, and prayed me to bring this yong man vnto thee, which hath a certaine matter to shewe thee. Then the high captaine tooke him by the hand, and went with him out of the way, and asked him, What is it that thou hast to tell me? And he said, The Jewes are determined to desire thee, that thou wouldest bring forth Paul to morow into the counsaile, as though they would enquire somewhat of him more perfectly. But follow not thou their mindes: for there lie in waite for him of them mo then fourtie men, which haue bound themselves with a bow, that they will neither eate nor drinke, till they haue killed him: and now are they readie, and looke for a promise from thee. The chief captaine then let the young man depart, and charged him, See thou tell it out to no man, that thou hast shewed these things to mee. And he called vnto him two vndercaptaines, saying, Make ready two hundred souldiers to goe to Cesarea, and horsemen threescore and tenne, and spearmen two hundred, at the third houre of the night: And deliuer them beasts, that they may set Paul on, and bring him safe vnto Felix the hie deputy. And he wrote a letter after this maner.

Claudius

Claudius Lysias, vnto the most mightie ruler Felix, sendeth greetings. This man was take of the Jewes, & should haue bene killed of them: Then came I with an armie, and rescued him, and perceiued that he was a Romane: And when I would haue knowen the cause wherefoze they accused him, I brought him foorth into their court. Whom I perceiued to be accused of questions of their law, but hauing nothing layd to his charge worthy of death, or of bonds. And when it was shewed me how that the Jewes layd wait for the man, I sent him straightway to thee, and gaue commandement to his accusers, that the things which they haue against him, they should tell before thee. Farewell. Then the souldiers as it was commanded them, tooke Paul, & brought him nigh to Antipatridis. On the morow, they left the horsemen to goe with him, and returned vnto the castle. Which when they came to Cesarea, and deliuered the Epistle to the deputie, presented Paul also before him. And when the deputy had read the letter, he asked of what prouince he was. And when he vnderstood that he was of Cilicia: I will heare thee, said he, when thine accusers are come also. And he commanded him to be kept in Herods iudgement hall.

Heare vs O most mercifull ffather wee beseech thee, in these our humble petitions which wee present with reue- rent heartes vnto thy diuine Maiesty, through Iesus Christ our onely Saviour and Redeemer, Amen.

not fearefull to good workes, but to the euil. Wilt

feare, for hee beareth not the sword in vaine: for
hee is the minister of God, reuenger of wrath on
him that doeth euill. Wherefore yee must needes
be subiect, not onely for feare of punishment: but
also because of conscience. And for this cause pay
yee tribute, for they are Gods ministers, seruing
for the same purpose. Giue to euery man there-
fore his duetie, tribute to whome tribute is due,

custome to whom custome, feare to whom feare,
honour to whom honour belongeth.

The Gospel.

Matth. 27.



When the morning was come, all the chiefe priests and Elders of the people held a counsell against Jesus to put him to death. And when they had bound him, they led him away, and deliuered him to Pontius Pilate the deputie. Then Judas, which had betrayed him, when he saw that he was condemned, repented himselfe, and brought againe the thirty siluer pieces to the chiefe priests and elders, saying, I haue sinned, in that I haue betrayed the innocent blood. And they said, What is that to vs? see thou to that. And when he had cast downe the pieces of siluer in the temple, hee departed, and went his way, & hanged himselfe. And the chiefe Priests tooke the siluer pieces, and said, It is not lawfull for to put them into the tresurie, because it is the price of blood. And when they had taken counsell, they bought with them the potters fiede, to burie strangers in. Wherefore that fiede was called, The field of blood vnto this day. (Then was fulfilled that which spoken by Jeremie the Prophet, saying, And they tooke the thirtie siluer pieces, the price of him that was valued, whom they bought of the children of Israel: and gaue them for the potters fiede, as the Lord appointed me.)

and inuisible : and in one Lord Iesus Christ, the only begotten sonne of God, begotten of his Father before all worldes, God of God, light of light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father, by whome all things were made : who for vs men, and for our Saluation, came downe from heauen, and was incarnate by the holy Ghost of the virgine Mary, and was made man, and was crucified also for vs vnder Pontius Pilate. He suffered, and was buried, and the third day he arose againe according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heauen, and sitteth on the right hand of the Father. And he shal come againe with glozy to iudge both the quicke and the dead : whose kingdome shall haue none end. And I beleue in the holy Ghost, the Lord and giuer of life, who proceedeth from the Father and the Sonne, who with the Father and the Sonne together is worshipped and glorified, who spake by the Prophets. And I beleue one Catholique and Apostolique Church. I acknowledge one baptisme for the remission of sinnes. And I looke for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come, Amen.

Whatsoever yee would that men should doe vnto you, euen so do vnto them, for this is the Law and the Prophets.

Almightie God and heauenly Father, whose prouidence is wonderfull and to be magnified in the gouernment of all things, but specially in the preleruation and deliuerance of thy Church, and chiefly the godly kings and gouernours there-

Thou O Lord of thy speciall fauour and gracious prouidence, hast as vpon this day most mercifully and marueilously deliuered our Soueraigne Lord King Iames, from the traitorous attempts of Earle Gowry with his brother and other their adherents in Scotland: preserving him both from this and many other diuelish conspiracies, that he might become by thy grace a Prince of peace to this Realme: a fosterfather to our Church: a defender of thy faith and true religion amongst vs, as wee see and feele to our great comfort this day. Amen.

Euen so Lord still confound all those, that haue euill will against his sacred Maiestie: Detect their counsels, repress their assaults, prosecute their persons with destruction, and leaue their names a curse to all posterities.
