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We have just got through the late novel, Philip Augustus. Sir Walter Scott, in his celebrated Tales of the Crusades, has, perhaps, scarcely done justice to the character of Philip Augustus.

It is related by the French king's favorite, the beautiful Agnes de Meranie, to whom he was formerly attached—the calamities, which the terrible interdict brought upon the people—the fearful influence it exercised over the minds of the weak and the timid—the conspiracies, in various parts of the kingdom, to compel the pilgrim-marchers to submit to the pontifical edict—and the dignified bearing of the queen, under the most trying circumstances—are eminently calculated for the pen of a novelist; and Mr. James' new romance shows to what admirable effect such materials may be turned.
