CANDY AND THATCHER, SIEGE OF SPANISH FORT.

Our Loss About Eight Hundred in Killed and Wounded.

General Steele's Command From Pensacola.

Captain of Regular General, of the Army, Twenty-five of His Officers, Four Hundred Men and about Four Hun- dred and Fifty Horses.

The Noble and Magnificent Railroad Cut and Two Vessels Captured.

Loss of the Heaters Milwaukee and those in Mobile Bay by Torpedoes.

Four Men Killed and seven Injured.

A NAVAL ENGAGEMENT EXPECTED.

Steele and Candy's Columns Only Six Miles Apart.

REBEL ACCOUNTS, &c.

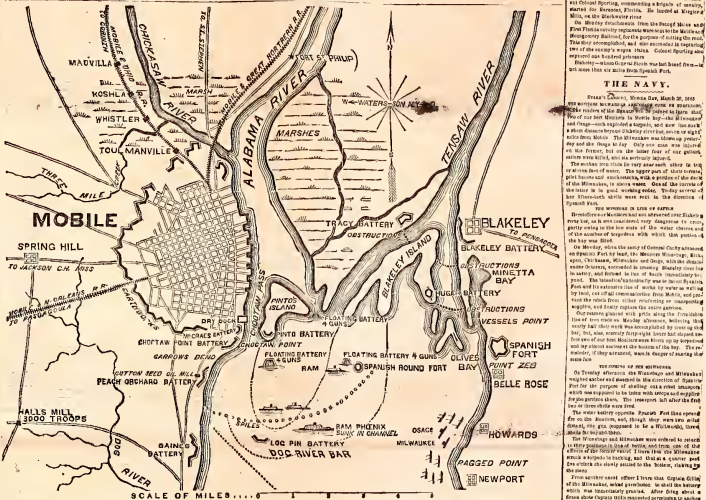
The insurgent forces, under the command of General Steele, are reported to have been driven back to the rear of the Spanish fort, and to have been killed and wounded to the amount of about eight hundred men and four hundred and fifty horses. The rebels are reported to have captured the noble and magnificent railroad cut, and two vessels. The loss of the heaters Milwaukee and those in Mobile Bay by torpedoes, and the killing and wounding of four men and seven others, are also reported. A naval engagement is expected between Steele and Candy's columns, which are only six miles apart.

The map shows the strategic positions of the Union and Confederate forces in Mobile Bay. The Union monitors Milwaukee and Osage were positioned in the bay, but were destroyed by torpedoes. The Confederate forces, under the command of General Steele, were reported to have captured the railroad cut and two vessels.
