STOP SMOKING.

Effect of Preliminary Steaming and of Different Preservative Chemicals and Processes upon Both Green and Seasoned Timber.

With the increasing use of timber, preserved in one way or another against the decay and fire, it is important to determine the effect which the preserving process has upon the strength of the preserved timber.

Actual tests are necessary to determine what relationship exists between the preservative process and the strength of the treated plants in the United States.

The Bureau of Forestry has erected an extensive plant on the grounds of the St. Louis Exposition for carrying on a series of investigations of the methods for preserving timber.

The effects of the preliminary process were determined only on a loblolly pine. Both green and seasoned timber was used in determining the effect of preservatives.

In making comparative strength tests of treated and untreated timber, it is necessary to eliminate as far as possible the variations due to the great differences in quality of individual pieces of wood.

In testing the preliminary processes of seasoning, a 3-foot section was cut from one end of each timber and sawed up into test pieces, which furnished a basis of comparison between (1) the results of the preliminary seasoning processes and (2) the results of the ordinary seasoning processes.

It is expected that a bulletin will be issued upon the results of these investigations when the tests are completed.
