


## Parenthesis

Parentheses are used to set off information in a sentence that is important but not really a part of the main message.

Your sentence should still make sense if you were to delete the parentheses and the information contained in them.



### **Good Examples of Parenthesis**



- Rachel finally responded (after taking 30 minutes to think) to my message about the party on Friday.
- Twenty-three new regulations have been set this month.
   (See Table 4.3)
- I want to attend the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) one day.

### **Q** Bad Examples of Parenthesis




- I was walking to my car (it is grey) (it is outside my house in the drive way).
- I was hoping Dave (my childhood crush,) would ask me to homecoming.
- Jeffery (My Sisters Friend) is picking us up after school to hangout on Friday.

# EECTS:

- If what is in the parentheses ends a sentence, the period goes after the parentheses.
- They always come in pairs.
- Periods go inside only if an entire sentence is inside the parentheses.

- Parentheses should be used around abbreviations or acronyms.
- Parentheses can be used to reference a source.
