#### THE WOMEN OF WATTS

The women of Watts have discovered that certain of the election laws are not regarded by the men as worthy of observance; and as a con-sequence five of Watts' city officials, ranging in dignity from mayor to school janitor, were recently arrested at the instigation of their feminine fellow citizens. The charge against them is a violation of the law prohibiting electioneering within a hundred feet of the polls, and distributing marked ballots. Both of these misdemeanors were committed by the five men in question at the recent bond election in Watts, according to the allegation of the fair complain-Moved either by the dictates of chivalry or conscience, the men do not deny the allegation, but plead that they were merely thoughtless

It is not that the men of Watts are inherently less law abiding than their brothers elsewhere. Never an election takes place in Los Angeles but some of the election laws are disregarded or openly violated. Not one voter in a hundred knows the laws. Betting on the results of an election, for example, is specifically prohibited; but who cares. Bets are made freely at every big election and many of the more prominent ones are not-ed in the papers as a matter of public In view of what has happened in Watts, however, it might be well for the men in other communi ties hereafter to mind their electoral p's and q's, lest the women take it into their heads to inform themselves upon the laws and insist upon their observance.—California Outlook.
