ATTEMPT TOO MUCH

The parcel post is already developing into something of a cumbersome burden to the postoffice department, because the latter, in characteristic fashion, having struck a good idea, has not rested till it has run it into the ground. To worry the express companies house calls have been instituted in several cities, for all parcels weighing over 10 pounds, in response to postal card or telephone order. Vacationists, quick to grasp economical facilities, are making overwhelming use of it. Suit cases weighing not over 50 pounds, will be called for, transported anywhere within 150 miles, and delivered, for 54 cents or less. They are also forming the habit of sending back their laundry in the same way. The Brooklyn postoffice estimates that it handles something like 30 suit cases an hour, and it is beginning to groan under it. It was intended to extend the notion all over the country, but the department "views with alarm" the general result on financial balances when it has to begin paying the railroads for transportation, and this, with several other attempted facilities, is more likely to be withdrawn than extended.

It was suggested some time ago that the department is going too fast with its parcel post and was abusing what was simply intended to fill a long-felt want.

"STAR SPANGLED BANNER CENTENARY"

Baltimore is to take a week from September 6th to 13th to celebrate the hundredth anniversary of the writing of the "Star Spangled Banner." Research has lifted all doubt as to the origin of this national hymn and the fortunate coupling of the patriotic outburst of Francis Scott Key, in the war of 1812, with an air that had come across the sea, and from the previous century, though to no general use until it was found in 1814 to fit the words of Key's poem, which were on everybody's lips. There will be a national celebration, even though Baltimore has the highest claim to local association with the author and his song.

The "Star Spangled Banner" gained its greatest favor during the war for the Union and hardly another air proved to have its appeal to the soldiers of the North or to the people in its homes. There was, nevertheless, a question if it would

continue to be popular or would become as familiar in its words as in its stirring air. In a valuable historical paper on the origin of the hymn, read before the Worcester Historical Society in 1872, it was declared that "the words will not be accepted as a permanent national song." This was the prevailing opinion of that time and it has persisted until, within a few years, there has come a realization that the verse of Key is not separable from the air to which it has been linked. None now think of a substitute in popular favor for the hymn, which in turn is no longer thought to need other words or other tune.

By the slow process of uniting public opinion, the "Star Spangled Banner" has come into such acceptance, practically universal, and is so widely hailed as the national hymn that Baltimore will be the center of an all-American interest during her week of celebration.

Speaking of neglected places, there is the peace palace at The Hague.
