**MORE LAW ABIDING
FEWER VIOLATIONS OF TRAF-
FIC ORDINANCE BY OUR
OWN CITIZENS**

Judge Lowe says that 163 cases came before him last month, the large majority of them violations of the traffic ordinance. The greatest number heard in one day was 38. He is gratified to observe that there has of late been a great decrease in the number of arrests for speeding of our own citizens, due, he thinks, to the fines that have been imposed and the appeals he has made to the civic pride of offenders who were urged to uphold the good name of the city by refraining from further law violations. The bulk of the offenses now against the speeding law are by outsiders. As a sample, yesterday's docket bore the following cases: H. T. Burghul, of Oakland, 40.17 miles an hour through heavy traffic on East Colorado in the 20-mile zone; F. M. Winter, of Bakersfield, 32 miles an hour in the 20-mile zone on North Central avenue and he had no operator's license; E. P. Gillette, of Pasadena, 32 miles an hour in heavy traffic on East Colorado, in the 20-mile zone; Jack Roth, of Los Angeles, 42.15 miles an hour in the 15-mile zone on South Brand boulevard in the midst of very heavy traffic, and continued reckless weaving in and out among other autos. L. J. Morrisset, of Los Angeles, 50 miles an hour on Wilson avenue, between Everett and Verdugo road, and no attention paid to street crossings.

In the latter case, true to his declaration that any arrest for driving at a speed of 50 miles or more would draw a jail sentence, Judge Lowe fined Morrisset \$50 and sentenced him to 10 days in jail. But it having been proven to his satisfaction that the prisoner's young wife was lying very dangerously ill in a Los Angeles hospital, the sentence was suspended on good behavior.

MISS ORTH IMPROVES

Miss Mary C. Orth of 120 West Laurel street, who was injured about a month ago and taken to the Sisters' Hospital in Los Angeles, has had quite a serious time, according to friends who have visited her recently. It will be remembered that she was boarding a car at Los Feliz Road and just as she placed one foot on the step of the car it started and threw her to the pavement, breaking her hip. Because of her high blood pressure surgeons found it impossible to set the broken bone in the usual manner or place her in a cast. Instead they had to resort to sandbags to keep it in position to knit. She has been a great sufferer in consequence but is now improving to such a degree that the physicians give her great encouragement. She has made a claim upon the railroad company for damages which her friends are hopeful will be adjusted without lengthy litigation.
