HAINES PANORAMIC VIEW STU-DIO WILL ADVERTISE GLEN-DALE FAR AND WIDE

Melvin Miller, who came to Glendale recently from Denver, Colo., to organize a sales force for D. D. and Wm. Haines, makers of panoramic scenic views, is enthusiastic over the possibilities of the business which. he says, he has learned from close investigation, is the largest of its kind in the world. The views are taken with a circular camera and are not moving pictures but pictures taken with a moving camera, which is set to automatically swing in a circle to the end of any required arc. The camera will take a picture ten inches wide and six feet long. These can be pasted together to make a continuous view 24 feet long if necessary. The Messrs. Haines still have a large studio in Conneaut, Ohio, whence they came to Glendale about a year ago. Their views taken in this western country bear the stamp of the Glendale studie and will thus advertise our little city all over the world. Should present plans work out as is hoped. the entire business will be located in Glendale.


