Panama, July 21.—The government fleet sailed last night with reinforcements and ammunition and provisions for Gen. Bertieo's army at Agua Dulce. Gen. Salazar, governor of Panama, instructed the commander of the fleet to deliver certain letters to Gen. Bertieo, and by all means, should the revolutionary gunboat Padilla be met, to engage her in a decisive battle.

Governor Salazar believes that a big battle is being fought at Agua Dulce, and that if the governmet treops are victorious in the engagement the revolution on the listhmus will be ended.

GOLDBEATERS ON STRIKE.

Philadelphia, July 21.—A strike was inaugurated to-day throughout the country by the United Goldbeaters National Union of America. There are about 400 goldbeaters in the United States, and all are members of the urion. They demand the discharge of the women employed as mould fillers, who do the work at the rate of 18 cents, for which goldbeaters formerly received 90 cents. The beaters, it is claimed, can only earn \$12 to \$15 a week.

THE DEAD CARDINAL.

Keokuk, Iowa, July 21.—The height of the flood in the Mississippi river was reached to-day south of here. The river fell an inch and a half at Keokuk to-day and the fall will reach southern points to-morrow, but the rise of a foot or more in the vicinity of Canton, Quincey, Lagrange and Hannibal to-day carried the water over thousands of acres previously uninjured. The rise to-day took out some more wheat in the shock which proviously stood with its butts in water. Farmers are inclined to report much greater losses than a few days ago, but estimates of four to six millions dollars in Missouri along the fifty miles of river frontage are conservative. OF THE BIG DREDGE

Yesterday's Total Considerably Exceeded That Amount - Work Is Progressing Satisfactorily.

huge machine-craft would be more at home, but it is doubtful if it will heat yesterday's record by many points for some days to-come. During its operations yesterdays she threw three thousand five hundred cubic yards on the mud flats, while its general average is three thousand yards per day. It fact there is eighteen inches or more of sitt away on one side, indicative of the spreading qualities of the dark mass of stoff that is being constantly belched forth from the large pipe. All day long there is a group of curious spectators on the bridge, while hurrying citizens stop to see whether the Edward VII. is still holding its own with the bottom of Victoria harbor.

The city engineer this morning expressed satisfaction with the work of the dredge thus far. After having got all it can out of the harbor at its present station, he said it would shift its seene of operations to a spot near Belleville street, directly adjacent to the retaining wall extension. the company at work improving the system in that direction. The company for some time past has had a number of men employed taking up the old rails and replacing them with the more substantial type of 56 pounds "T" rail. It has been the intention of the directors for some time to improve the service on that street. The traffic up and down Fortstreet is no doubt greater than that of any part of the system, and the fifteen-minute service on occasions has been found insufficient to handle all. The question of putting on a ten-minute service is now under consideration, and there is little doubt it will be carried out very shortly. In this event a switch will be constructed at Fernwood road and another car will be put on the route. The company have also taken the precaution of laying the rails on Fort street nearer the sidewalk, so as to be prepared in the event of a decision being reached to double track that street. It has been rumored that this would be done next year, but as yet nothing definite is known.

FAST STEAMERS.

The Liverpool-Halifax and Canadian Australian Service.

Australian Service.

Toronto, July 22.—The results of the conference between the Canadian ministers and the British Board of Trade have not yet been announced, but, without doubt, the establishment of a fast Atlantic service between Liverpool and Halifax has been proposed. What Liverpool shippers are expecting is a combination between the Alian and Elder-Dempster lines and Sir Christopher Furness with subsidies paid by the British government and the Dominion, in the proportion of one-third and two-thirds, for a sorvice consisting of two 22 knot, and two 18 knot, steamships. This would take the Alian line out of the conference, where it 'is controlled by the Morgan combination, and involved in another freight war similar to the sea campaign opened by the Houstons to cut rates against-ring charges to South Africa.

No decision has been reached by the board of trade, but the offer of the British government to pay one-third of the subsidy is an old one, and probably will be renewed if fast steamers can be substituted for the present service between Vancouver and Brisbāne. Mails can be dispatched from England to Australia in 25 days via the Canadian Pacific under the joint system of Imperial and colonial subsidies.

WATER QUESTION UNDER DISCUSSION

ACTION OF COUNCIL STRONGLY CONDEMNED

Meeting Disapproved of New Regulations Restricting Use of Water for Irrigating Purposes.

The regular weekly meeting of the Voters' League was held at the city hall last night, when other subjects for discussion were shelved in order to allow members of the league to express their opinions upon the water question generity, and the recently passed regulation restricting the use of water for irrigation purposes to two days in the week. Members were unanimous in condemning this regulation, holding that it was not fair that the majority of the citizens should see their flowers droop and fade away for want of water in order that the few who had built homes in very high levels should be well supplied. Finally a resolution calling upon the council to rescind the regulation was carried unanimously.

Noah Shakespeare was elected to the chair, and the following were present: Senator Macdonald, W. H. Winsby, Jos. Peirson, Rev. Elliott S. Rowe, T. C. Sorby, C. H. Lagrin, A. S. Going, R. H. McMillan, Walter Moberley, P. R. Smith, A. J. Hannah, S. Shore, W. F. Beat, O. E. Redfern, E. Bragg, J. E. Cowan, T. S. Futcher, J. L. Belyea, T. Walker, and the secretary, A. J. Merley, A reply was read from the Minister of Mines acknowledging the receipt of the resolutions of the league forwarded to him in favor of the department testing the iron deposits and advertising same. The minister stated that he would give the matter careful consideration.

Wm. Laird forwarded a written notice that he intended to introduce for discussion at the next meeting of the league the subject of the improvement of the Victoria harbor on the lines of the Sorby scheme.

P. R. Smith gave notice that be would bring, up for discussion the relative

P. R. Smith gave notice that he would bring up for discussion the relative merits of a steel or stone structure at Point Ellice.

A series of questions from an anonymous correspondent were submitted dealing with a supposed scheme for the city council to purchase more land for the cemetery at Ross Bay, and the fact that the drive along the water front, planned by the late Sir James Douglas, was now interrupted by the cemetery.

As the league could not accept an unsigned letter, the questions were fathered by Mr. Peirson. Mr. Redfern remarked that the question of buying land at Ross Bay had come up during his mayoralty and there was a constantly repeated effort made to foist land upon the council. When he was mayor experiments were made on other land belonging to the council which was found to be in every way suitable for cemetery purposes. The council had abundance of land available, but it would be a long time before much of it was required. He did not know whether the present council had the matter under consideration, but if so he would be surprised, as the question had been discussed and settled long ago. The questions were then laid on the table for future consideration.

The question of the water supply was then taken up, and by way of introducing the subject the chairman said that he was not in accord with the policy of the council in the matter, and asked members of the league to express their opinions.

Mr. Beckwith said that there was considerated difference of agains in the

upon the matter. A friend of his who was something of an expert had made a statement to him about the water supply, which, if correct, would mean that in the event of a serious fire breaking out the fire department would be unable to cope with it for want of water.

Senator Macdonald said that the main pipes ought to have been laid right in the body of the lake instead of being hid in filter beds into which the slime was constantly running and having to be cleazed out. He also wanted to know why the council allowed perferential rates for the water, some people getting water for 60 cents a month, while others had meters and had to pay for every gallon of water used. There ought to be no profit made on water, and last year the council had made \$18,000 over and above the cost of maintenance. If a committee were appointed it would be well for them to look into the cost of maintenance and the water rates.

Mr. Sorby thought that there was some

On capital invested, on which the city had to pay 4 per cent. He was in favor of the introduction of nucters throughout the city, so that every one would pay for the water used. The corporation wasted an enormous amount of the water on the sewers and street sprinkling, something like 241 million of gallons annually.

Those people who chose to perch their houses away in should make their own arrangements for water and sewers. He believed that there was plenty of water in the lake to supply the people of the city as a previous years, and the present rule that water was to be used in the gardens only twice a week

would spoil most or the gardens in the city, as many plants required water every day.

Mr. Redfern remarked that there was no doubt that a great deal too much water was wasted on some of the gardens, some people leaving the water running hour after hour in the same place, which did more harm than good. He thought a better rule than the present would be to fix certain hours every day during which the water might be used. The new regulation had been put in force to suit a few people who lived in torry high levels. It was not fair that nine-tenths of the people in the city should have to see their gardens spoilt so that the one-tenth should receive the benefits which the majority lest. About 140 gallons of water per head of population was pumped into town every day, and that ought to be sufficient for every purpose. He thought a resolution should be passed asking the council to rescind the new regulation at once. During the present hot weather the water was greatly needed in the gardens.

Senatro Macdonald asked Mr. Redfern about the preferential rates he believed to exist in the city for water.

Mr. Redfern did not think there were any preferential rates. The rates were fixed according to the number of rooms in the houses, and higher rates charged to those who had large grounds and gardens. Meters were placed in breweries and other establishments which made a profit out of the water they used.

Mr. Peirson's motion that a committee of five should be appointed to inquire into the whole question of water supply and report to the league was then put. Mr. Beckwith seconded the motion, which was carried.

Mr. Redfern moved the following resolution:

Mr. Lugrin suggested that a regulation might be made that water should be used for irrigation purposes in each district during only half the day—in the morning in one portion of the town, and in the evening in another part. Personally, he was supplied through a meter, but the charges were not considerable.



THE STORY OF LORD DUNDONALD, THE SEAMAN


