Peters, Pacific Coast agent of the Union Steamship Company of New Zealand, the charterers of the Foreric. Owing to the fact that the charter of the Foreric did not call for her berthing here till August 15th, she will not commence to load till that date. She is scheduled to sail on September 1st from Vancouver.

ROSSLAND'S OUTPUT.

Over Six Thousand Tons Shipped From the Camp Last Week.

The output for the camp during the week ending Saturday night is normal, says the Rossland Miner, with the output of the War Eagle and Centre Star mines only slightly less than the previous week, while the Giant sent out a somewhat enhanced tonnage. The facilities for handling ore are down to their ordinary basis, and the expected increase in output may take place at any time. During the week but little of special interest has occurred at the big mine. Work has been continued along the main line without variations in the strength of the rock. It is expected that next month the output will be substantially increased. Last week only 70 tons of dump ore were shipped, but it is believed that next month the shipments from this source will be close to 500 tons daily until the whole is removed.

July 19th follows: Le Roi, 5,100 tons; Le Roi No. 2, 1,550 tons; Utah, 100 tons. Total, 6,750 tons.

FOUGHT VALIANTLY UNDER MANY FLAGS

THE STORY OF LORD DUNDONALD, THE SEAMAN

Some of the Feats of the Ancestor of New Commander of Canadian Troops.

Canadians will soon welcome to their shores Lord Dundonald a soldier of distinguished ability and excellent record, who is a man of remarkable and unusually interesting lineage.

Thomas Cochrane, tenth Earl of Dundonald, was born in 1775, and succeeded to the Earldom in 1831. All of the deeds which made his name ring through the civilized world were performed under the name of Cochrane.

Early in 1800, Cochrane, now 24 years of age, got his first ship, a little brig named the Speedy. This famous brig, to quote the biography by Hon. J. W. Fortescue, "was, to use Cochrane's own words, little more than a burlesque on a man-of-war, even in the year 1800, being of about the size of an average coasting brig, with a burden of no more than 125 tons."

Such as she was, the Speedy soon became the terror of the Spanish coast. He captured innumerable of the coasting vessels which plied along the Spanish coast. "The ordinary movements of cruisers consisted in coming inshore by day and standing off at night."

"Hoisting American colors, in order to puzzle the frigate until the brig had reached a favorable position, Cochrane suddenly ran up the British ensign and made straight for her."

execution, at the same time giving the Spaniards a broadside and a volley before they could recover themselves. The enemy, seeing the futility of attempting to board, now returned to their rigging, cutting up the Speedy's sails and rigging, but doing little further damage.

Cochrane was captured by three French line-of-battle ships, after a cruise in the Speedy of thirteen months of active mischief, "during which time she had taken or retaken more than 50 vessels, 122 guns and more than 500 prisoners."

In 1804 Cochrane was in command of the Pallas, a 34-gun frigate, and with her crossed the French coast of the Bay of Biscay. He was ordered by the French to be had by the Spaniards. In April he looked for some French corvettes in the Garone. He sent all his men except about 40 in the boats up the river to capture one of these.

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In 1808 Cochrane was in command of the Impetieuse, in which the future Captain Marryat, the sailor-novelist, was a midshipman. The Peninsular war had commenced, and Cochrane harried the French in aid of the Spaniards.

A succession of quarrels with the Admiralty and the government, into which Cochrane was unnecessarily, caused him to leave the British service under circumstances of great embarrassment.

unsuccessful. Then with extraordinarily inadequate forces he captured Valdivia, the most strongly fortified port in Spanish America. Embarking then upon the design of ousting the Spaniards from Peru, Cochrane successfully cut the harbor of Callao.

Cochrane was treated by the Chileans with gross ingratitude and quitted their service. His services had been extraordinary. With a small force, in the words of his latest biographer, Mr. Fortescue, he did the work of an army, with his boats the work of a squadron, and he "dominated the South Pacific with a sinking ship."

Cochrane himself with his single ship sailed to Maranhão, and by clever ruses baffled the Portuguese from the two northern provinces of Brazil. The usual display of ingratitude followed, and Cochrane left the service of Brazil.
