




Photograph showing 2000 Easter Lilies in bloom-hulbs supplied by us.

HYACINTHS.

Directions for Planting in the Open Ground.—Octoher and Novemher is the proper time, hut they can be set out at any time, as long as the ground is open and the bulbs remain sound. The best compost for their culture is the following : one-third river or sea saud, one-third well-rotted cow manure, and one-third good garden mould; or, where the soil is naturally light, well-rotted cow manure liberally intermixed is all-sufficient. The heds composed of the above compost should he well dug to a depth of fourteen inches, and raised from two to four inches above the level of the walks. The bulbs should he planted evenly about six inches deep (to the bottom of the hulbs) and from five to six inches apart; if planted at unever depths they will not bloom at the same time, but irregularly. Care must be taken not to press the earth too firmly around and over the bulbs; some successful gardeners follow the planting, cach hulb in a handful of clean sand, which insures drainage. After planting, rake the bed smootb, and after the ground has frozen tolerably hard in early winter cover with dry litter, leaves or coarse manure. If this covering be applied hefore freezing weather, it renders the bulbs liable to the predations of field-mice.

For Culture in Pots.—Prepare the above compost, adding, if possible, a quantity of leaf mould. The most favorable time for planting is September, Octoher and November. The size of the pot depends on the number of hulbs planted in a single one; three bulbs in a pot of say six inches in diameter have a rich massive effect; one or two hulbs in each may be planted in proportionately smaller pots—two bulbs in each are very effective. In potting, each hulb should remain one-half above the surface of the soil, when thus planted, water them well, to inhed the bulbs firmly in the soil, allowing them to remain in this condition one or two days; then bury the pots in the open ground to the depth of six inches for eight weeks, in which condition the preparatory root growth necessary to a vigorous development of their flower scapes is made. After this period take up the pots and remove them to aroom not heated, but not so cold as to freeze. Being exposed to the light for the first time, they are, of course, very delicate. Care should therefore he exercised not to place them in the direct rays of the sun for two or three days. When about ready to flower scapes is made. After this period bring them to the ordinary living-room, where the warmth will soon cause them to holom. By so hringing them out, a few at the time, you can abundance of air in mild weather, and pleuty of water.

For Growing in Glasses.—Single Hyacinths do better than double in glasses, as they produce a much larger and more showy spike or truss. Place the hulb in the glass, which should he filled with water so it touches the bottom of the bulh, place them in a close box in a cool place, or on a shelf in the dark part of the cellar, change the water every ten days or two weeks; keep them in the dark, cool place from six to cight weeks, then remove them to the light (not too strong). If then kept in a cool room they will produce very fine spikes and remain in hoom a long time.









NOTHING is more beautiful than a bed of tulips in the spring. They are the showiest flower in bloom at that time of year. They should be planted in beds of any design, made of a good portion of loam and manure mixed well with the soil; the distance apart should be about four inches. The bulbs must be planted about four inches deep. A covering of long manure or straw for over winter is very beneficial for the bed. Tulips are also excellent for growing in the house; four or five bulbs to six or seven-inch pots, or they can be forced in the greenhouse with good results.





The bulbs should be potted in early fall in rich soil, and the pots plunged in sand, where they should be allowed to remain until the approach of cold weather. The aim should be to prevent the tops starting until the roots have become strong and vigorous, when they may be brought in and placed in gentle heat. It can be forced into bloom at any desired time, and the freedom with which the flowers are produced is truly remarkable; even the smallest bulbs will bloom. For outdoor planting it is already recognized as a very desirable acquisition, as it is perfectly hardy, easy of culture, and one of the finest plants for garden or cemetery decoration. A bulb once planted will last for years.




DAFFODILS NOT BLOOMING.

This is not an uncommon occurrence, even with the professional florist who plants daffodil bulbs in his greenhouse to raise winter flowers for market. Such bulbs he calls "bilba," he cause the eye, or flower-germ, is without life. Bulbs of this character are mostly from the southern part of France. The Strawberry delights in good, rich, moist soil, but will grow on auy soil which is capable of raising good general crops. By planting early medium and late varieties, the grower is supplied with fruit during the entire Strawberry season. They, however, must be planted in first-class soil. There are two systems of plauting largely followed, viz.: "hill " and " matted row." Those who wish to grow large, fine fruit, use the former; while, if quautity is to be preferred to quality, the matted row system is preferable. In hill culture, plant 15 inches apart each way, in beds 4 feet wide, with alleys of 2 feet between them. For matted rows, plant 1 foot apart in rows of 4 to 5 feet apart, for varieties which make plants freely; for other varieties, 3 feet will answer. It is well for all to test the new varieties for themselves by setting a few plants, say a dozen or twenty-five of each sort. They can then judge for themselves which are the best adapted to their soil, and do not have to depend upon the word of others; for the varieties which do well in one section of the country and in one climate may be a total failure somewhere else. We make a specialty of Strawberry Plants. Those marked (P) have pistillate or imperfect flowers, and must be plauted near perfect flowering

kinds, in order that the flowers may be fertilized. Plant one row of a staminate variety to every three rows of a pistillate variety.
