## HYACINTHS.

Directions for Planting the open Gronnd.-Octoher and Novemher is the proper time, hut they can be set out at any time, as long as the ground is open and tbe bubs remain sound. The best compost for their culture is the following: one-third river or sea sand, one-third wellrotted cow manure, and one-third good garden mould; or, where the soil is naturally light, well-rotted cow manure liberally intermixed is allsufficient. The heds composed of the above compost should he well dag to a depth of fourteen inches, and raised from two to four inches ahove the level of the walks. The bulbs should he planted evenly about six iaches deep (to the bottom of the hulbs) and from five to six inches apart; if planted at uneven depths they will not btoom at the same time, but irregutarty. Care must be taken not to press the earth too firmly around and over the bulhs; some successful garleners follow the plan of setting cach hulb in a hand ful of elean sand, which insures drainage. After planting, rake the bed smootb, and after the ground has frozen tolerably hard in early winter cover with dry litter, leaves or coarse manure. If this covering be applied hefore freezing weather, it renders the bulhs liable to the predations of field-mice.

For Culture in Pots.-Prepare the above compost, adding, if possible, a quantity of leaf mould. The most favorahle time for planting is Septemher, Octoher and November. The size of the pot depends on the numher of hulhs planted in a single one; three bulbs in a pot of say six inches in diameter have a rich massive efcet; one or two htlins in each may he planted in proportionately smaller nots-hwo bulbs in each are very effective. firmy in the soil, allowing them to remain int this condition one or two days: tben bury the pots in the open ground to the depth of sia fiches eight weeks, in whicb condition the preparatory root growth necessary to a vigorous development of their flower scapes is made. After this period takc up the pots and remove them to a room not heated, but not so cold as to freeze. Being exposed to the light for the first time, they are, of colrse. very delicate. For Growing in Glasses. - Single Hyacinths do better than double in glasses, as they produce a much larger and more showy spike or truss. Place the hulb in the glass, which should he filled with water so it touches the bottom of the bulh, place them in a close box in a cool place, or on a shelf in the dark part of the cellar, change the water every ten days or two weeks; keep them in the dark, cool place from six to cight weeks, then remove them to the light (not too strong). If then kept in a cool room they will produce very fine spikes and remain in hloom a long time.

## HINTS ON GROWING PLANTS IN "JADO0" FIBRE.

In sowing seeds in "Jadoo" Fibre an even surface must first be obtained, either by sifting the "Jadoo" Fibre, or by putting a little fine soil or sand on the top of it.

Seed properly sown in "Jadoo" Fibre is certain to come up. Fvery single seed will germinate, provided it has life in it when sown.

#### Abstract

The Strawberry deligbts in good, rich, moist soil, but will grow on auy soil which is capable of raising good geueral crops. By planting early medium and late varieties, tbe grower is supplied with fruit during the entire Strawberry season. They, however, must be planted in first-class soil. There are two systems of plauting largely followed, viz.: "hill" and "matted row." Those who wish to grow large, fine fruit, use the former; while, if quautity is to be preferred to quality, the matted row system is preferable. In hill culture, plant 15 iuches apart each way, in beds 4 feet wide, with alleys of 2 feet between thenı. For matted rows, plant 1 foot apart in rows of 4 to 5 feet apart, for varieties which make plants freely; for other varieties, 3 feet will answer. It is well for all to test the new varieties for theinselves by setting a few plauts, say a dozen or twenty-five of each sort. They can then judge for themselves which are the best adapted to their soil, and do not have to depend upou the word of others ; for the varieties which do well in one section of the country and in one climate may be a total failure somewhere else.

We make a specialty of Strawberry Plants. Those inarked (P) have pistillate or inperfect flowers, and must be plauted near perfect fioweriug kinds, in order that the flowers may be fertilized. Plant one row of a staminate variety to every three rows of a pistillate variety.
