As I pointed out to you in our conversations, the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation is extremely anxious to cooperate with the occupying forces in Japan in order to help these forces in their efforts to rehabilitate the Japanese economy. From the observations I have made on my recent trip to Japan, I feel it is imperative, if the I. T. T. companies are really to contribute to the work done by the occupying forces, that experienced American personnel be allowed to go to Japan to take over the over-all management on a permanent basis. Our two manufacturing subsidiaries in Japan are at present cooperating with the occupation authorities in turning out communication equipment but they are not producing this equipment as quickly as the occupation forces desire and their method of manufacturing is, to say the least, inefficient. I feel that if some of our experienced American personnel were on the scene and were able to take over the manufacturing processes, the efficiency of production would be increased and the occupying forces would receive the much needed materiel in greater volume than they are at present. At the same time, if we were permitted to have permanent representatives in Japan they would be in a position to negotiate the restitution of our properties, and also to protect our properties from further deterioration until restitution can be effected. In my opinion, there would be one further advantage to the occupying forces and that would be that our American representatives would be in a position to provide valuable information regarding the activities of the companies themselves and Japanese developments in the communications field to General McArthur's forces.

The two companies involved, Nippon Electric Company and Sumitomo Electric Industries, were largely developed by American engineers. Nippon Electric Co. started as a telephone repair shop in 1898. The technique came almost entirely from American sources, each line of manufacture was installed under our direction and throughout most of the period operations were continually supervised by our engineers. This is also the case with Sumitomo Electric Industries though not quite to the same extent. In the case of that company the major plans for wire drawing

and insulating and cable making were developed by us; machines were originally procured, installed and to a large extent, designed by us.

Until the development of the intense nationalism and anti-foreignism in the mid thirties, a substantial foreign staff was always maintained in Japan. For example, in the early '30's we maintained there a cable and wire manufacturing expert; two apparatus manufacturing experts; an engineer and general supervisor. Their efforts were supplemented by specialists of other types sent on a temporary basis from time to time, and by visits of accounting and legal representatives. Our supervision was further promoted by taking important numbers of Japanese into our foreign factories for training purposes.

From my recent observations in Japan I feel that the plants and the technical and manufacturing methods have deteriorated during the war years, and that the plants can only be brought back to standard by reinstating foreign supervisors. Certain plant re-arrangements have been made which I consider distinctly ill advised, and other changes should be made which require careful study by engineers who have up-to-date knowledge regarding the best manufacturing practices.

We would be willing to make our own arrangements about housing and provisioning these representatives along the lines being followed in the case of Northwestern Airlines, so that they would not add to the occupation burden.

Initially, we would like to send out at least two representatives under the plan mentioned in our discussions, now in process of development, between Washington and SCAP, whereby we would pay a per diem charge for quarters and meals so that negotiations for restoration could be pushed as actively as possible.

Below is a list of the individuals we would like to include in our Japanese group. I shall, of course, appreciate any assistance you may be able to give us in working out the proposed plans.

Officer in Charge. Colonel Clinton B. Allsopp.

Colonel Allsopp is a Vice President of International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation who has had wide experience in the telephone business, both with I.T.T. and the Bell System. He was in the Signal Corps for several years during the war and at present is in charge of our Shanghai Telephone Company, Shanghai.

Legal Adviser. George J. Eder.

Mr. Eder has been with the I. T. T. System since July 1939 and at present is our Legal Adviser in Argentina. It is felt that the services of a lawyer are required for six months at least in interpreting the new laws and in handling the legal formalities which we anticipate in connection with restitution.

Comptroller - Sumitomo Electric Industries.

F. E. Samuels

Mr. Samuels joined the I. T. T. System in 1923, and during his years of service in the Comptrollers Department he has had full charge of the accounts of the Japanese companies.

It is felt that the Accounting Systems of the two companies require considerable attention. In particular it is felt that the ceiling prices which have been established in the past have contributed very much to the large continuing losses of the two companies, and that they were not established on proper information regarding production costs.

Manufacturing Supervisor - Nippon Electric Co. A. C. Chisholm





With reference to the attached application for permission to visit Japan, I would like to set forth the reasons for my application.

I was Managing Director of J. Witkowski & Co., Ltd, Japan, from 1935 until the outbreak of war. My firm, however, was established in Japan in 1887. The firm in Japan was both interested in imports and exports and represented the following companies:

In addition to the above agencies, we imported commercial diamonds, textiles and made up apparels in the better grades for Japanese consumption. To the best of my memory, our yearly imports were approximately one and a half million yen.

Our main business in Japan was exports to all parts of the world. We used to sell very considerably quantities of goods to America through our agents

We also had a very large clientele in England, France, Belgium, Scandinavia, Australia, New Zealand, Africa and South America. Our yearly exports from Japan were approximately ten to twelve million yen.

When the war broke out, the Japanese seized all our stocks in warehouses and to this date we have not been able to ascertain our position, vis a vis our losses in Japan. Whilst we have very heavy claims against the Japanese Government, we are likewise indebted to the Hongkong & Shanghai Banking Corporation in Japan.

Consequently, the purpose of my application to return to Japan is firstly, to see the possibilities of reopening our offices to carry on the trade in imports and exports that we had formerly; secondly to adjust our affairs with our bankers and ascertain the prospects of recovery of the stocks confiscated by the Japanese.


I think it only right to tell you that I am a British subject, having entered here under the immigration quota and Witkowski New York Agency, Inc., is owned by myself and Mr. Melvin W. Peyser, a citizen of the United States. I did approach the Board of Trade in London, who advised me that inasmuch as I have an office here in America, I should make my application through your office.

I feel that it is the policy of the American Government to encourage and foster trade with Japan and that in reopening our offices in Japan, we could be one of the means of serving that purpose.

I can also tell you that I have received communications from all our old clients the world over, regarding my plans for Japan and there is no doubt that with my long knowledge of Japan, having resided there from 1912 until 1940, I would have full support from our clients abroad for both imports and exports.

Needless to add, in the event of my being enabled to reopen my Japanese offices, it would be in conjunction with the office that I now have in New York City.

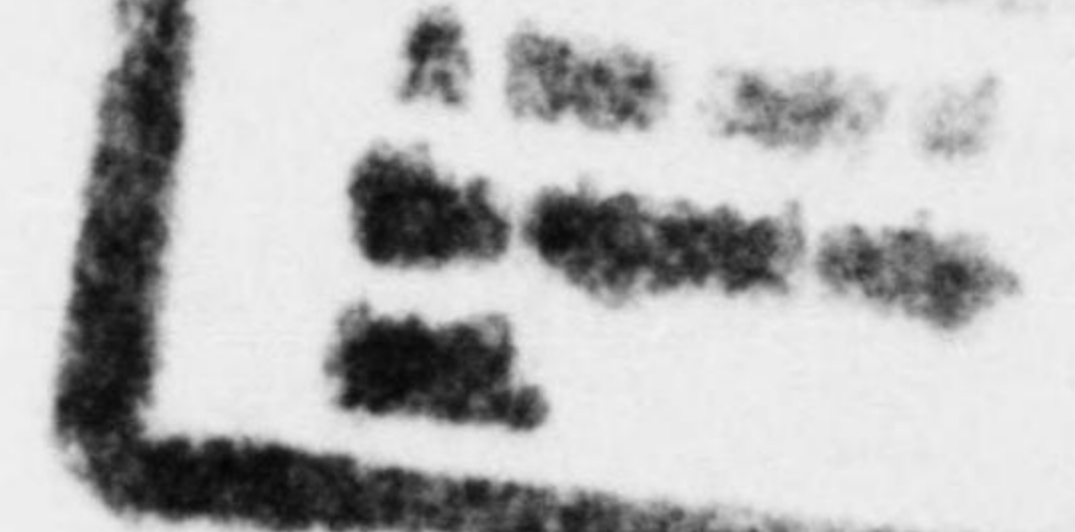

Mr. O'Brien called Lt. Ramsey and requested him to verify the details of Mr. Muggeridge's permit so that Mr. O'Brien could communicate this information to the British Embassy which would prepare a statement indicating Mr. Muggeridge's clearance by SCAP as required by SCAP Circular 8.

Lt. Ramsey informed Mr. O'Brien that CAD was informed of Mr. Muggeridge's clearance by means of SCAP cablegram No. Z-24115 of October 6, 1947 which states that Mr. Muggeridge is cleared for entry into Japan and Korea between October 15, 1947 and December 15, 1947. It further states that Mr. Muggeridge's stay is limited to two weeks beginning the date of his entry.

Mr. O'Brien then called Mr. Ranken and informed him of his conversation with Lt. Ramsey.

Mr. Ranken stated he would prepare a statement for Mr. Muggeridge on the basis of this information.

SUBJECT: Telegram No. 277 from Tokyo October 22, 1947

With reference to a telephone conversation with Mr. Fearey and the attached telegram from Tokyo No. 277 of October 22, 1947, we have talked this over with Mr. Paige of OE, who points out that a broadcast to Malaya explaining the regulations for businessmen's entry into Japan may run the risk of offending the British, who for one reason or another may wish to limit the number of Malay businessmen desiring to go to Japan. These reasons, Mr. Paige says, include the overall limitation of UK businessmen to a total of 64, the racial aspects of the situation, the necessity of having to supply businessmen with dollars in order to complete transactions.

It is suggested, therefore, before we consider further any broadcast of proper entry procedure, that you might wish to ask the Consul General in Singapore to look into the situation in Singapore and even consult with the British to determine their attitude on the travel to Japan of local Asiatic businessmen. We might be in a better position to handle this, following the receipt of the Consul General's report. The action telegram is being returned herewith.

We are writing to you at the request of the Embassy of India in regard to the status of Mr. K. N. Daryanani, traveling on British India passport No. 22427, who is in Minneapolis en route to Japan via Northwest Airlines.

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The Secretary of State presents his compliments to His Excellency the Siamese Ambassador and has the honor to refer to the Department's note of September 29, 1947 stating in reply to the Embassy's note No. 1486/2490 of September 12, 1947 that the Department was transmitting the applications to travel to Japan of Messrs. Ob Vasuratna, Somhit Khosavanna, Udem Sangkasaba, Chulind Lansan, Phaibulaya Phongpagdi and Chuan Ghavanich to the appropriate military authorities for consideration and that the Embassy would be informed as soon as the Department learned of the decision reached by the military authorities concerning these applications.

In this connection the Department has been informed by the military authorities that the above-mentioned applications were not favorably considered by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers because the information furnished by them concerning their proposed travel to Japan was not complete. The military authorities request a full

explanation of the purpose of the subject gentlemen's visit. If they are entering Japan as private traders the military authorities wish to be informed as to the types of goods in which they are interested in purchasing and selling. If these Siamese businessmen are entering as service representatives, information is requested as to the nature of the service which they plan to render.

Further information is requested as to the mode and route of travel these gentlemen plan to employ if they go to Japan. The military authorities also stipulate that they enter Japan within a specific fifteen-day period, such as the period November 1 to November 15 or the period November 15 to November 30 et cetera, and that the military authorities be informed as to this period. However, it also must be understood that if they are granted a military permit this permit is valid only for twenty-one days although a short extension may be granted on this time limit if facilities are available.

If the Embassy wishes to re-submit applications in these cases containing the detailed information as outlined

above,

above, the Department will transmit these applications to the military authorities for consideration. It should be noted, however, that the military authorities point out that the quota for Siam allows only two Siamese businessmen to enter Japan in any given period and that the military authorities request that applications be submitted on this basis.



Paragraphs 7a, 11c and 12b of the enclosed Circular provide that applications within the scope of the Circular will be submitted by the representative in Japan of the country of the applicant's nationality unless the country concerned does not have a representative in Japan. In the latter case applications may be forwarded through diplomatic channels to the Department for reference to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for consideration.

Because of the direct interest of the United States Government in the administration of the occupation of Japan by the Allied Powers, the Department will undertake the transmission of applications within the scope of the enclosed Circular originating with any government having no representation in Japan whether or not the Department has already undertaken to perform for such government in Japan formal or informal representation services.

I. GENERAL. 1. Circular 3, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 8 June 1946, is rescinded.

2. Purpose: Procedures to be followed in the control of individuals, aircraft and surface vessels entering and leaving Japan, i.e., the four (4) main islands of Hokkaido, Honshu, Shikoku and Kyushu and outlying islands under control of the Occupation Forces.

3. Implementing Agencies:

a. The Commanding General, Eighth Army, will control the entry into and exit from Japan of the categories of persons mentioned herein.

b. The Commander, Naval Activities Japan, will control the entry and exit and the movements of surface vessels while in Japanese waters.

c. The Commanding General, Pacific Air Command, United States Army, will control the entry and exit and the movements of aircraft into and out of Japan.

d. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will keep the implementing agencies informed as to the action taken on requests for entry into and departure from Japan of individuals, aircraft and surface vessels. This information will include the period of validity of the permit and area or areas in Japan to which individual can travel.

e. The Commanding General, Eighth Army, will establish passport, health and customs control at ports of Entry and Exit, both air and surface, utilizing such Japanese agencies as are appropriate. Such control will include:

- (1) Medical examinations.
- (2) Giving of necessary inoculations.
- (3) Examination of baggage.
- (4) Issuance of permit of entry.
- (5) Maintenance of facilities for the detention of unauthorized arrivals, including food and shelter for aircraft crews not permitted to leave airports.

f. Implementing

f. Implementing agencies shall have power of detention over individuals, aircraft and surface vessels in the event of failure to comply with this circular.

4. Ports of entry for aircraft and surface vessels will be designated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, at the time of approval for entry. Currently, the ports of entry for both aircraft and surface vessels are included in the Tokyo-Yokohama area.

5. The provisions of this circular do not apply to persons being repatriated to and from Japan under the supervision of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

II. INDIVIDUALS. 6. Authorization to Enter Japan:

a. Members of the Occupation Forces and individuals required for service therewith, and their dependents will be authorized to enter Japan in accordance with international agreements providing for the presence in Japan of such forces, subject to rules and regulations as may be established by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. "Members of the Occupation Forces" are defined herein as military personnel of the Eighth Army and Allied Forces under its operational control, military personnel of the Pacific Air Command, naval personnel under the command of the Commander, Naval Activities Japan, and the staffs of the Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Forces, Pacific and of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

c. Individuals, and their dependents, other than members of the Occupation Forces or required for service therewith, desiring entry into Japan will first obtain authorization from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

7. Requests for Authorization to Enter:

a. Request for authorization to enter Japan will be made to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers by the representative in Japan of the country whose national desires to enter Japan. In the event that the country concerned does not have a representative in Japan, the request may be made through diplomatic channels to the United States Department of State, which in turn will refer the request to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for consideration. Requests will be submitted at least ten (10) days prior to the expected date of departure for Japan.

b. Request for authorization to enter will contain the following information:

- (1) Full name.
- (2) Place and date of birth.
- (3) Citizenship. If naturalized, date and place of naturalization.

(4) Type

- (4) Type of work in which engaged at present.
- (5) Full explanation of purpose of visit to Japan and full description of nature of work to be performed. If any official status is involved, this will also be indicated; for example, member of diplomatic, military or liaison mission; the Allied Council for Japan; the International Military Tribunal for the Far East, etc.
- (6) Expected length of stay.
- (7) The desired date of entry.
- (8) Point of origin and final destination in Japan.
- (9) Route and means of travel to Japan and number, date of issuance, issuing authority, period of validity of passport (if applicant is a civilian and not traveling in uniform).

8. Action on Requests for Entry:

a. Action on requests will be governed by the following regulations:

- (1) Notification will be given by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers of action taken on the request through the same channels as in paragraph 7a.
- (2) Approved requests for entry will constitute a clearance by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for entry into Japan. Such clearance is valid for a period of sixty (60) days only and will designate a single point of entry at which clearance is valid; individuals not arriving in Japan within sixty (60) days must submit a new request.

9. Entry into Japan:

a. Upon arrival of individual at point of entry:

- (1) He will have in his possession a passport or equivalent travel document, together with a statement in English from an authorized representative of the country of his nationality at point of origin, that he has been cleared by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for entry into Japan; this statement will include the same information as required in paragraph 7 b.

(2) His

- (2) His baggage will be subject to customs inspection and may include only those items which can be reasonably assumed to be for his own personal use. Declarations will include all property and all money, negotiable instruments, legal and commercial documents which he wishes to take into Japan.
- (3) He will have in his possession on arrival, a certificate showing successful vaccination against smallpox within the preceding six (6) months, immunization against typhoid-paratyphoid fevers within the preceding twelve (12) months and against typhus within the preceding sixty (60) days. An individual embarking in Korea, China, Indo-China, and India for Japan will have been successfully vaccinated against smallpox within sixty (60) days prior to embarkation and immunized against cholera within the preceding four (4) months. If arriving without such required certificate he will be given the necessary immunizations and held in quarantine at the port of entry for sufficient time to determine that he is free of infectious disease.

b. Before passports or equivalent travel documents are stamped to indicate approval of entry:

- (1) They will be checked against the names of persons approved for clearance by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and furnished to the implementing agency (Section I).
- (2) Individuals who have not been cleared properly, or who do not hold a passport or other equivalent travel document, will be detained by the implementing agency and the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers so notified.

c. Passports or other equivalent travel documents will be stamped: "Approved for Entry into Japan by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers."

d. The Entry Permit:

- (1) Individuals who meet all requirements for entry into Japan will be issued, at the port of entry, an entry permit. This permit will include a statement as to the period of validity of the permit and the area or areas in Japan to which the individual can travel.

(2) In the

- (2) In the discretion of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, this permit may at any time be endorsed so as to limit, extend or cancel the period of validity of the permit and the area or areas to which the individual may travel.
- (3) This permit will not authorize the bearer to call upon Occupation Forces for transportation, subsistence, accommodation, or any other facilities.

10. Exit from Japan:

a. Individuals and their dependents, other than members of the Occupation Forces or required for service therewith, desiring to leave Japan will make applications to do so at least ten (10) days prior to the anticipated date of departure.

b. Applications will be made to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

c. Applications to depart will be supported by a properly visaed passport or other evidence of clearance into country of destination.

d. At ports of exit, individuals will submit a declaration of all property and a list of all moneys, negotiable instruments, legal and commercial documents which they intend to take with them from Japan.

e. The Entry Permit (See paragraph 9d) will be taken up on departure.

f. Upon departure, baggage will be subject to customs inspections; personal property and, in addition, items whose total appraised value does not exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) are authorized.

III. AIRCRAFT. 11. Control of entry, passage and exit of aircraft into and from Japan:

a. Aircraft, other than those assigned to or serving the Occupation Forces will not be permitted entry into, or passage over, Japan unless authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Ports of Entry: (See paragraph 4) Details as to communications, escorts, etc., are variable with local conditions and will be announced from time to time.

c. Requests for authorization for aircraft passage or entry will be submitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in the same manner as that prescribed in paragraph 7a, and will contain the following information:

(1) Type

(2) Markings

(3) Duration

- (3) Duration and purpose of stopovers.
- (4) Purpose of flight.
- (5) Names and positions of crew members.
- (6) Names of passengers, if any, and purpose of their trip.
- (7) Description of cargo carried.
- (8) Details of route and timing of flight.

d. The representative of the requesting country will be informed of the action taken on request. Approved requests will be valid for five (5) days from date for which flight is approved. Any change in estimated time of arrival will require twenty-four (24) hours notice.

e. Crew and passengers of such aircraft will be required to remain in the airport with their aircraft until the aircraft departs, unless they are covered under the general provisions for entry of individuals (Section II).

f. Each aircraft will have as a member of the crew an English speaking radio operator.

g. Appropriate clearance will be obtained from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers prior to departure of the aircraft from Japan; no aircraft will take off from any point in Japan unless its latest complete cargo manifest has been approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

IV. SURFACE VESSELS. 12. Control of entry and exit of merchant vessels:

a. Surface vessels other than those assigned to or serving the Occupation Forces will not be permitted entry into Japan unless authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Requests for authorization for entry of surface vessels will be submitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in the same manner as that prescribed in paragraph 7a, and will contain the following information:

- (1) Name and tonnage of vessel.
- (2) Route and port of entry.
- (3) Purpose of voyage.
- (4) Approximate date of arrival at port.
- (5) Cargo carried.
- (6) Description of cargo to be unloaded in Japan.

c. The

-7-

c. The representative of the requesting country will be informed of action taken on the request. Approved requests will be valid for one (1) month from the date authorized for entry; thereafter, a new request will be submitted.

d. The port of entry, in each instance, will be designated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, (Paragraph 4).

e. Radio communication can be established with Naval Radio Tokyo (Call NDT) or Naval Radio Sasebo (Call NEG) on 500 KCS, which will be used, except in emergencies, for calling only. After communication has been established, messages will be exchanged with Radio Tokyo on 482 Kcs, and with Radio Sasebo on 468 Kcs respectively.

f. A departure report giving the expected time of arrival in Japan should be cabled to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers when the vessel departs from the last port of call before entering Japanese waters.

g. Upon the arrival of any vessel at the port of Japan, the Master will furnish the following documents to the port authorities:

- (1) The register.
- (2) The articles.
- (3) Bill of health from last port of call.
- (4) The list of names of the members of the crew and the passengers, if such desire to go ashore.

h. Crew and passengers will remain in the port until the vessel departs unless they are covered under the general provisions for entry of individuals. (Section II)

i. The vessel will be permitted to remain in port a reasonable length of time.

j. Prior to departure from a Japanese port, the Master of the vessel must obtain clearance, indicating the next port of call and route to be followed.

k. A complete description of all cargo to be loaded at any point in Japan will be presented to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for prior approval.

l. No vessel will depart unless its latest complete cargo manifest has been approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

13. Control of entry and exit of combatant ships:

a. Combatant ships other than those assigned to or supporting the Occupation Forces will not be permitted entry into Japan unless authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Requests for authorization for entry of combatant ships will be submitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in the same manner as that prescribed

in paragraph

in paragraph 7a, and will contain the following information:

- (1) Name and type of vessel, giving length, beam and draft.
- (2) Number of officers and men in the crew.
- (3) Ports to be visited with estimated date of arrival and departure from each port.
- (4) Name and rank of Commanding Officer.
- (5) Name and rank of Flag or General Officer, or very important persons on board as passengers.
- (6) Purpose of visit.
- (7) Brief statements of any special facilities required.
- (8) Whether vessels have current information on minefields in Japan. Course to be followed in Japanese waters.
- (9) Radio frequency by which communication can be established.
- (10) Complete description of all cargo carried, which is to be unloaded in Japan.

c. While in Japanese waters, combatant ships will report to the Commander, Naval Activities Japan, for operational control for navigational purposes.

d. A complete list of passengers for Japan and their identification will be presented with the manifest to the port of disembarkation.

e. Crew and passengers for Japan will be cleared for entry in accordance with the provisions for entry of individuals in section II.

f. A complete description of all cargo to be loaded at any point in Japan will be presented to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for prior approval.

V. CUSTOMS AND PUBLIC HEALTH REGULATIONS. 14. More detailed and technical instructions pertaining to customs and public health will be published later.

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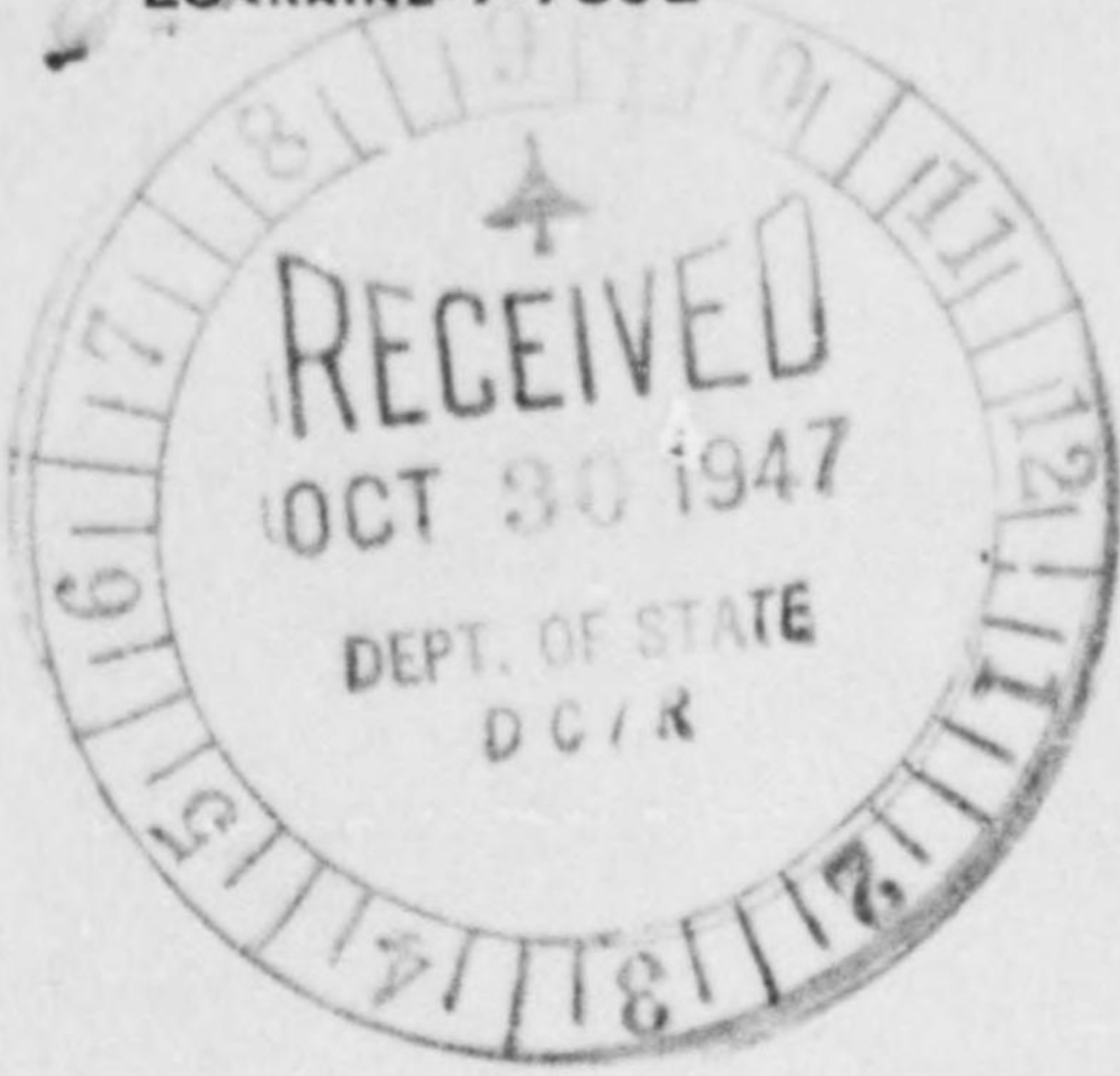

The Military Permit Section is requested to bring this application to the attention of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at Tokyo indicating that it is to be considered under the quota of businessmen permitted to enter Japan assigned to "other" nations by the Inter-Allied Trade Board.

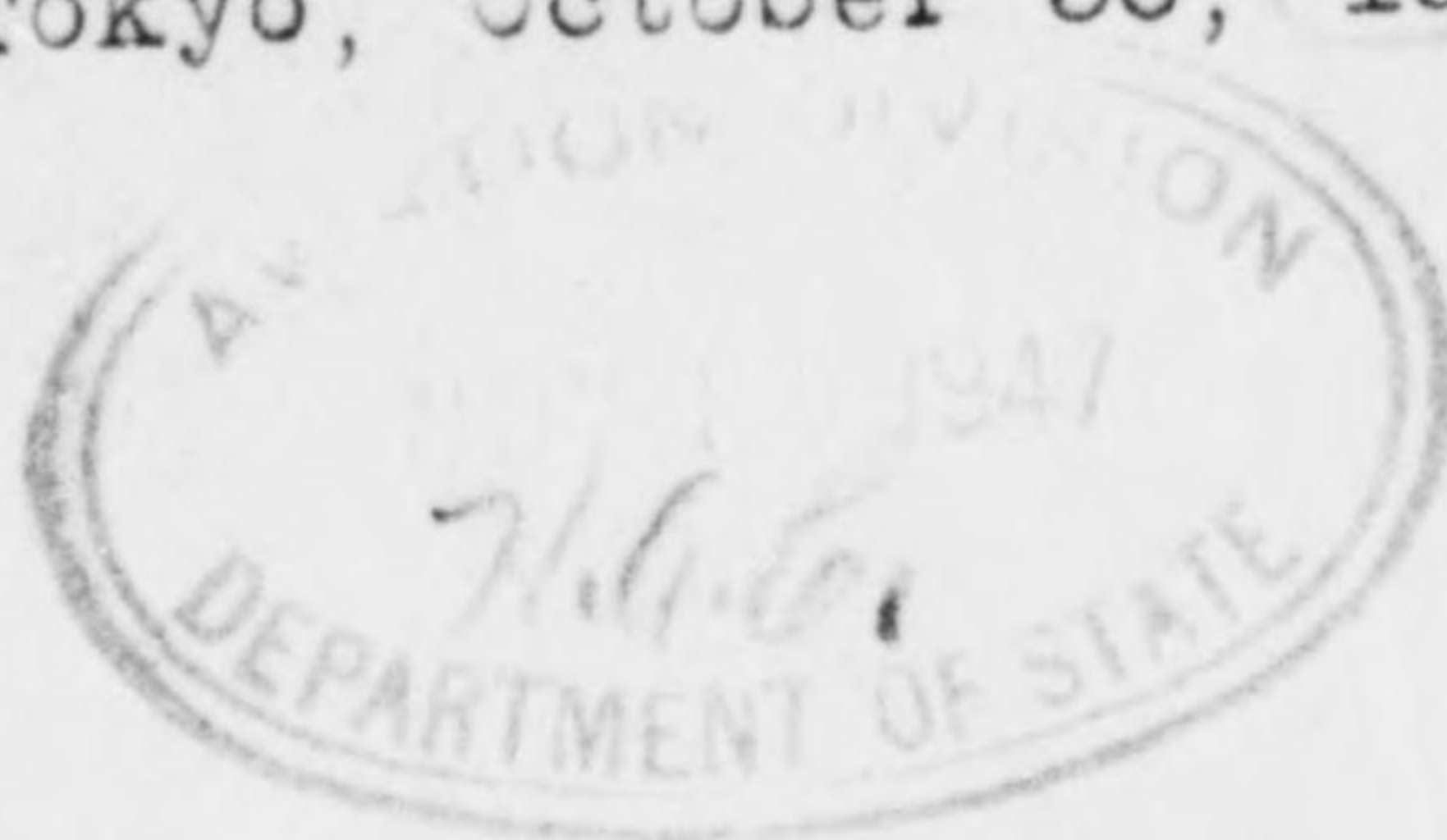
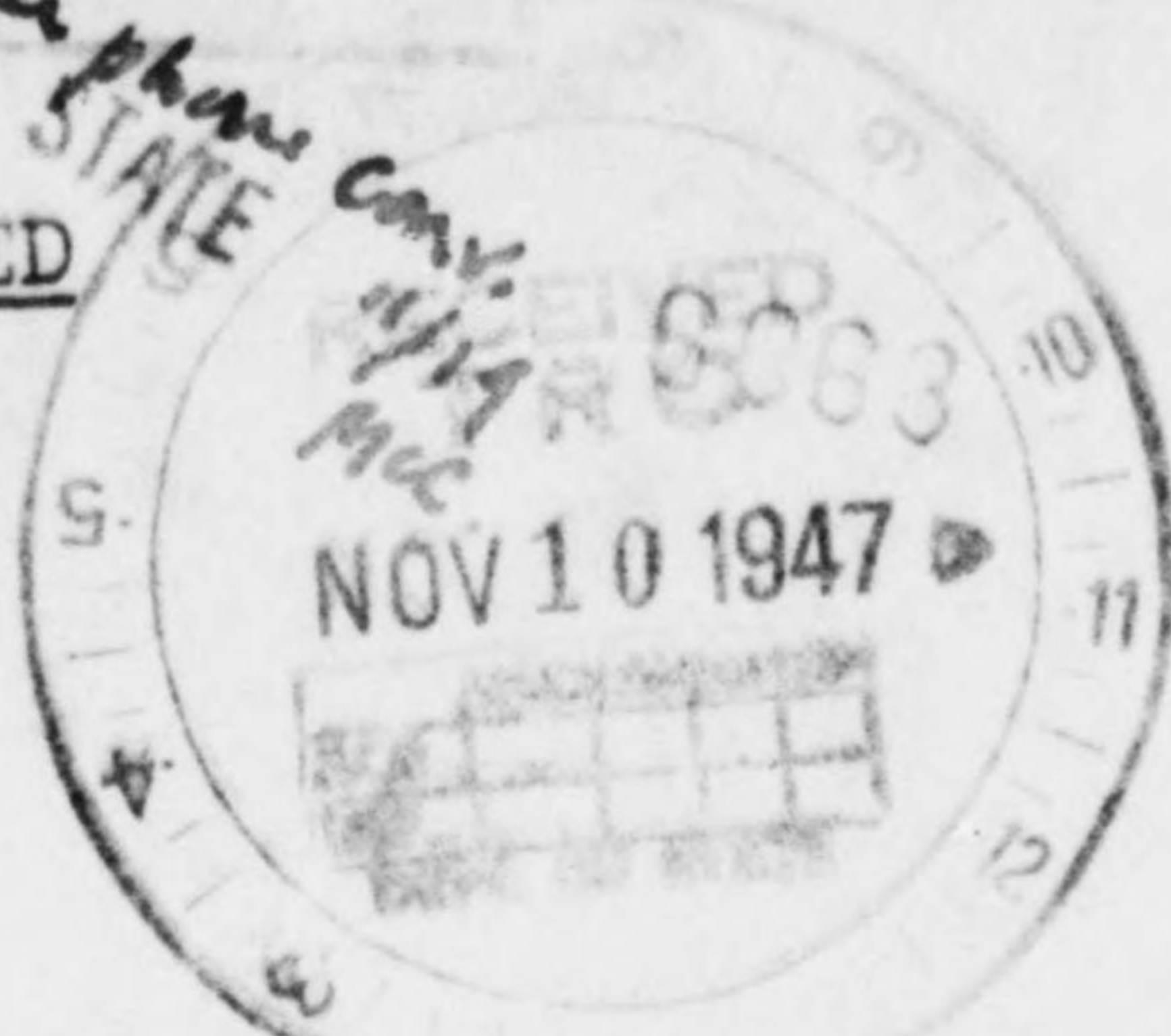

The Acting Political Adviser has the honor to refer to the following despatches from this Mission: No. 600 of September 10, 1946, concerning the entry into and exit from Japan of individuals, air craft and surface vessels; and No. 707 of November 15, 1946, concerning quarantine regulations for Japan. There are now enclosed (under separate cover) twenty-eight copies of circular No. 12 dated October 15, 1947 issued by this Headquarters concerning cargo accompanying persons entering or leaving Japan.

Under paragraph 3b of the circular it is provided that, except by specific authorization of the Supreme Commander, Japanese nationals and foreign nationals living within the Japanese economy are forbidden to import or export items other than those authorized for transmittal through international mail channels. In addition items prohibited from import into Japan and procedures to be followed in importing authorized items are described under paragraph 7. In paragraph 9 baggage belonging to duly accredited diplomatic personnel is exempted from examination and crew members of air craft and surface vessels are forbidden to bring into Japan financial or commercial instruments. In the event that the import of any item is subject to question final decision is delegated to the Commanding General of the United States Eighth Army. The provisions of circular No. 12 are not applicable to persons being repatriated to or from Japan unless specific instructions to that effect are issued.

CONTROL OF ENTRY AND EXIT OF PROPERTY AND
CARGO OF INDIVIDUALS INTO AND FROM JAPAN

1. References.

- a. Circular 8, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 30 August 1946.
- b. Circular 10, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 28 October 1946.
- c. Circular 12, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 5 December 1946.

2. Purpose. The purpose of this circular is to set forth regulations governing the entry and exit of property and cargo of individuals entering and leaving Japan, i. e., the four main islands of Hokkaido, Honshu, Shikoku, and Kyushu, and outlying islands under control of the occupation forces.

3. General. a. This circular does not deal with ordinary commercial imports and exports into and from Japan. Such imports and exports must be authorized by an appropriate license validated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Japanese nationals and foreign nationals living within the Japanese economy are prohibited from importing or exporting items into or from Japan, except when specifically authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers or when such items are authorized to be transmitted through international mail channels.

4. Definitions. The following terms are defined according to their application in this circular:

a. Personal property is luggage, clothing, books, toilet articles, an automobile, articles of personal adornment, and other effects intended and reasonably necessary for the personal use of the individual.

b. Household articles are those items intended and reasonably necessary for the use of an individual and his family in establishing or maintaining living accommodations.

c. Professional instruments and tools of trade are those which are intended for and reasonably necessary to a normal individual vocation or avocation.

(Cir 12)

d. Commercial items are those items which are intended and reasonably necessary for use by firms or agencies (as distinct from individuals) in the transaction of business within the terms of the license which authorizes such firms or agencies to operate in Japan.

5. Jurisdiction. The property of individuals and cargo shipped into or from Japan will be subject to the examination of port officials or other representatives of the Commanding General, Eighth Army, except that:

a. The Commander, United States Naval Forces, Far East, will be responsible, under the provisions of this circular, for the examination and clearance of the property of Navy personnel entering or departing Japan at points under naval control, or at points other than the designated ports of entry.

b. The Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, will be responsible under the provisions of this circular, for the examination and clearance of the property of any individual (including United States Air Force personnel) entering or departing Japan by air at any airfield other than Haneda airfield or Iwakuni airfield.

c. The General Officer Commanding, British Commonwealth Occupation Force, will be responsible, under the provisions of this circular, for examination and clearance of the property of British Commonwealth Occupation Force military and naval personnel entering or departing Japan at any port in the British Commonwealth Occupation Force area, and for examination and clearance of the property of any individual entering or departing Japan at Iwakuni airfield.

6. Implementation. The Commanding General, Eighth Army, will:

a. Establish property and cargo control at the ports of entry and exit designated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Utilize such customs personnel and facilities of the Japanese Government as may be appropriate.

c. Maintain appropriate records for individuals and cargo entering and leaving Japan, to include all prescribed official documents.

7. Entry. a. At ports of entry, the individual will submit a declaration that his property (including property not actually accompanying the individual but shipped separately) contains only personal property, household articles, professional instruments and tools of trade, and samples or other commercial items, not prohibited by paragraph 7e, as may be necessary in the conduct of his authorized business.

(Cir 12)

b. Unless specifically authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, an individual may bring into Japan only property intended for the individual's personal use, except that individuals authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to enter Japan for business purposes may import samples or other commercial items of a value not to exceed \$500 as may be necessary and appropriate in the conduct of their authorized business.

c. Commercial firms and agencies which have been authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to operate in Japan may import such commercial items as are necessary in the conduct of their authorized operations.

d. All property of individuals and commercial items imported into Japan will be cleared through customs whether shipped by government transportation or by commercial carriers.

e. The importation of any of the following items into Japan is prohibited unless such items have been specifically approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers:

- (1) Gunpowder and other materials of an explosive nature, except that ammunition for hunting purposes may be entered in a reasonable amount for personal use.
- (2) Any book, pamphlet, paper, writing, advertisement, circular, print, picture or drawing, containing any matter advocating or urging treason or insurrection against any government.
- (3) Any item of a pornographic nature.
- (4) Any narcotic, drug, or utensil used therefor.
- (5) Counterfeit, altered, or imitation coins; gold or silver coins, gold, silver, or platinum bullion, or any alloy thereof.
- (6) Articles which infringe upon rights in patents, utility models, trade marks, and copyrights.
- (7) Any instrument of a legal or financial nature pertaining to external assets owned or controlled, directly or indirectly, in whole or in part by any Japanese person. The term person shall include any individual, partnership, association, or corporation.

(Cir 12)

(8) Any item whose entry is prohibited by Circular 10, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 1946.

8. Exit. a. At ports of exit the individual will submit a declaration that his property (including property not actually accompanying the individual but shipped separately) contains only personal property, household goods, professional instruments and tools of trade, and bona fide gifts, not prohibited by paragraph 8d, and, in addition, items whose total appraised value does not exceed \$500.

b. Unless specifically authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, only property intended for the individual's personal or household use, items intended and reasonably fit for bona fide gifts, and, in addition, samples and other items whose total value does not exceed \$500 will be taken out of Japan, except that commercial items brought into Japan under provisions of paragraph 7b may be taken out of Japan by the individuals who imported them.

c. All property of individuals and commercial items exported from Japan will be cleared through customs whether shipped by government transportation or by commercial carriers.

d. The exportation from Japan of Japanese national treasures and of items prohibited for importation by paragraph 7e is prohibited, unless the exportation of such items has been specifically approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

e. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers reserves the right to restrict the movement from Japan of all items which he deems critical.

9. Special Provisions. a. Exemption from examination will be accorded such duly accredited and recognized diplomatic and other personnel as may be designated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Cargo consigned to any component of the occupation forces for subsequent consumption by or use of these forces shall not be subject to declaration or examination according to the provisions of this circular. However, cargo must be manifested as directed in Circular 8, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, 1946.

c. Crew members of aircraft and surface vessels entering or leaving the defined limits of the ports of entry into or exit from Japan will pass through proper examination and carry no financial or commercial

instruments nor any articles in excess of that which can be reasonably put to personal use.

d. Appropriate provisions will be made by the Commanding General, Eighth Army, for processing vessels and aircraft arriving at or departing from ports other than those designated as ports of entry and exit by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

10. Decisions and Appeals. a. Decision as to whether articles being imported or exported are reasonably intended for personal use or as bona fide gifts will be made by the authorized representative of the Commanding General, Eighth Army.

b. Appraisals will be made by the authorized representative of the Commanding General, Eighth Army.

c. Appeals from these decisions may be made to the Commanding General, Eighth Army, whose decision will be final. Pending such an appeal, the articles in question will be impounded by the Eighth Army authorities, who will furnish the persons from whom the articles are taken a receipt containing the reason for the seizure. Appeals must be filed with the Commanding General, Eighth Army, within 60 days from date of seizure.

11. Misrepresentation, Omission, Violation. In all instances in which declarants materially or wilfully misrepresent or omit the existence, status, or quantity of their property, entry or exit may be refused and the subject property confiscated. Any person who violates, conspires, or attempts to violate any of the provisions herein may be subject to appropriate prosecution and punishment.

12. Disposal of Confiscated Property. a. The Commanding General, Eighth Army, will report all cases of confiscation of property to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at the conclusion of the 60-day period, or in the event an appeal is filed, at the time of final action on the appeal. (See inclosure 2, "Record of Property Confiscation.") Reports will be numbered serially by ports of entry and exit. (Reports Control Symbol QESS-13 applies).

b. Property of any government participating in the occupation, will be turned over to the appropriate occupation force supply agency by the Commanding General, Eighth Army.

c. Other property will be held pending instructions from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers as to its disposition.

(Cir 12)

d. Upon completion of disposal of confiscated property, a "Report of Property Disposal" (inclosure 3) will be forwarded to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Attention: Civil Property Custodian. This report will correspond serially with each "Record of Property Confiscation." (Reports Control Symbol QESS-14 applies).

13. Communication. The Commanding General, Eighth Army, is authorized direct communication with the Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, and the Commander, United States Naval Forces, Far East, in all matters pertaining to implementation of the provisions of this circular.

14. Repatriates. Unless specific instructions are issued at the time of repatriation, the provisions of this circular do not apply to persons being repatriated to and from Japan under the supervision of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

Dear Mr. President,

I write in the hope you may help to overcome the main obstacle to my early return to Japan, where I lived for over nine years until repatriated to England under the diplomatic exchange of Allied and Japanese nationals in 1942.

Until 'Pearl Harbour' I was associated with a British merchant in Yokohama, Mr. R.G. Bell, when I was arrested by Japanese police on a trumped-up charge of espionage and detained in a Yokohama gaol (in solitary confinement for about four months) for questioning.

Having lost practically everything, with the exception of my business experience and contacts in the Far East, I now desire to return to where I know my understanding of the orient could be of most service and at the same time assist the completion of my own recovery and rehabilitation which, I feel sure you can appreciate, means much to a man of middle age.

With this object in view I have, for the past ten months, been in touch with our Government departments, including the British Foreign Office and an application to the Board of Trade, and I am given to understand that the only obstacle to my immediate return is the necessary formal permission from the United States Military Authorities in Tokyo.

If I may be forgiven for approaching you in this manner, I would be most grateful to receive the permission of the American Occupation Authorities to return to Japan to re-establish myself. In conclusion may I add that I have living accommodation available in Tokyo at No. 580, 2 chome, Nakameguro, Meguro ku, Tokyo.

The Acting Secretary of State transmits herewith a copy of a letter dated November 1, 1947 addressed by Mr. A.E. Turner, a British national, to the President requesting that the President authorize the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at Tokyo to permit Mr. Turner to return to Japan for permanent residence and business there. It will be noted that Mr. Turner states that the British Foreign Office and the British Board of Trade approve his return to Japan but that he cannot return until he receives formal permission to do so from the United States military authorities at Tokyo.

Since Mr. Turner is a British national his case is one which should be brought to the attention of the Supreme Commander by the British representative at Tokyo rather than by the Department. It may be that the British representative at Tokyo may secure for Mr. Turner the permission which he requests, although this is not considered likely since American citizens with cases similar to his are not being permitted to return to Japan at this time.

The Officer in Charge is requested to address an appropriate reply in the sense of this instruction to Mr. Turner. He may be advised also that if the British Foreign Office formally requests the Department to do so, the Department will communicate with the Office of the Acting United States Political Adviser in Japan for comments concerning his case. The Department will not, however, take any action which might be construed as intervention concerning the Supreme Commander's policies with respect to the Occupation of Japan.
