SEEDS BY MAIL. Sending seeds by mail is a very important branch of our business, and we are well prepared to fill orders promptly and correctly the day they are received in nearly all cases.

PARCEL POST RATES. Below we give a table showing Parcel Post rates of the different zones. Ask your postman what zone you are in from Columbus and you can then figure the necessary postage on your order. You will note that each zone is so much for the first pound and so much for each additional pound. Example: 4th zone .09 and .04. If you live in the 4th zone and want to order 10 pounds of seed, the first pound would be 9 cents and the remainder would be at 4 cents per pound, the 4th zone rate for each additional pound, or 45 cents postage for the 10 pounds. See table. You will note we give under each zone the cost of the first pound and of each additional pound.

Remember our prices include postage on pounds (Peas, Beans, and Corn, 2 pounds) unless otherwise noted.

We are listing such varieties as are of real merit in some section or other, but are cutting out such sorts as are being replaced by others of greater value. It is our constant aim to secure all varieties true to the type as originally introduced. Our trial-grounds, on our own farms, help us to know as to the purity of the stocks we are supplying.

Cultural directions will be found at the heading of

each class of vegetables, and also on most of our packets. These directions, while reliable, will not apply in every detail to the extreme sections of the United States, and therefore some allowance must

be made for the difference in latitude.

We also send free to our customers, on application, a cultural leaflet, "The Vegetable Garden," which is of value to beginners.

Asparagus Sparael Esparragos

A most delicious and health-giving plant, but it is best when fresh cut and cooked at once. By all means have a bed of it handy to the kitchen. It comes about as early as rhubarb (pieplant), and the two make good spring "medicine"—neither one "hard to take." Good, rich, sandy soil is best, but it is so hardy it will grow and live year after year almost anywhere. For small gardens, one-year-old plants are quickest. Seed is cheapest, but takes a year longer. Set plants about a foot or so apart each way, with the crown about 4 inches below the surface. Cover the bed with manure in the autumn and dig it in early in the spring. Fifty to a hundred plants are about right for a family randon Expense addy in the spring. plants are about right for a family garden. For more details or for larger plantings, we send leaflet free to customers, if requested.

One ounce of seed will sow 60 feet of drill. About 400 plants to the ounce

Washington Rust-Proof. The daddy of all the rust-resistant varieties, and the first one originator's stock. It is a fast-growing, exceedingly tender sort of excellent flavor and of a beautiful dark green color, tinged with purple. PALMETTO. A popular sort and will continue to be grown where the ground is not infected with the rust disease. Broccoli

Spargekohl

Belongs to the same family as the cauliflower, but of a little coarser texture. More hardy and there-fore better adapted to a wider range of conditions. The new Green Sprouting types are quite different in manner of growth, as shown in illustration. Sow the seed in the same manner as for late cabbage, in May, and transplant in June or July, in very rich soil about 2½ by 1½ feet apart.

EARLY LARGE WHITE. Heads medium size, close and compact. One of the most certain to head. Pkt. 10 cts., ½oz. 25 cts., oz. 40 cts.

Early Green Sprouting. Here is something quite new to our people, but yery popular with our Italian friends. Our strains are produced by the best growers in this country. They make a specialty of growing for seed purposes. The fields are carefully inspected to find and remove any mixtures each year, and the seed is hand picked, so that our stock will be found first-class in every way.

How to Grow. Plant Dwarf Beans in small gardens, in rows 2½ feet apart, and three or four Beans in a hill about a foot apart in the rows. Cover the Beans with 2 inches of soil and press it down firmly, to aid in germination. For a continuous supply, plant about May 15 and every ten days until August.

Our Bean prices include postage up to two pounds. If the larger quantities are wanted sent by mail, remit additional amount at the parcel post rates.

Two pounds (1 qt.) will plant a row 200 feet long; 1 to 2 bushels an acre





Beets for Table Use

The soil best suited for the culture of the Beet is that which is rather light, provided it is thoroughly mixed with manure. If wanted very early, sow in hotbeds and transplant; but for main crop sow in the spring, as soon as the ground becomes fit to work, in drills 1½ feet apart,½ inch deep. For winter use, the turnip varieties may be sown as late as June and the seed covered 2 inches. When the plants are 3 to 4 inches in height, thin out so that they stand 3 to 4 inches apart. Keep free from weeds by frequent hoeing and hand-weeding if necessary. Before freezing weather sets in the roots may be stored in cellars or pits, same as potatoes. Cabbage requires deep, rich, mellow soil, high manuring, and good culture to obtain fine, solid heads. For early use, sow seeds of the early kinds in the hotbeds or in a box in the house the last of January or early in February; transplant into the open ground in April in rows 2 feet apart and 1½ feet apart in the row; or sow a bed of seed outside as soon as the soil can be worked; transplant in about four weeks. For second early Cabbage, sow in April and transplant in May. For late Cabbage, sow in May and transplant in July in rows 3 feet apart and 2 feet apart in the row. In transplanting, it is important that plant be set down to the first leaf, so that the stem may not be injured in case of frost. Be careful not to cover the heart of the plant. Hoe every week and stir soil deeply. As they advance in growth draw a little earth to the plants until they begin to head. To prevent splitting or bursting, go frequently over the ground and push every cabbage that appears about to mature over sideways, which will break some of the roots and check its growth. To prevent attacks of the cabbage fly on small plants, dust thoroughly with plaster, air-slaked lime, or wood ashes.

Sow the seed in the hotbed in January or February and transplant the plants 2 to 3 inches apart in boxes, or in another hotbed, until such time as they are safe to be planted in the open ground. Set the plants in the field 2 feet by 15 inches apart. If properly hardened off, they are seldom injured by being planted out too early. When heading tie the outside leaves loosely over the head to protect it from the sun.





Cucumbers

How to Grow Cucumbers.—Cucumbers require rich, sandy soil, but do quite well in almost any good garden soil, especially if some fertilizer is mixed in where the hills occur. As soon as the weather has become settled and warm, plant in hills 4 to 6 feet apart each way, with 8 to 10 seeds in a hill; cover ½ inch deep, smoothing the hill off with the hoe. When the plants are out of danger of insects, thin out to three or four plants to a hill. The seed may also be sown in rows 6 feet apart, with the seed every few inches in the row, thinning out when plants are large enough to withstand the bugs. For pickles, plant from June 1 to August 1. The fruit should be gathered when large enough for pickling, whether required for use or not, as, if left to ripen on the vines, it destroys their productiveness.



CULTURE.—For early spring use, sow in a seedbed in September or October, and protect through the winter in cold-frames, or in the South with leaves or litter, or sow in a hotbed in early spring. Lettuce plants may also be started very successfully in the house in boxes which are about 5 inches deep. Make soil very fine and firm. Mark off into rows 2 inches apart and ¼inch deep, into which sow the seed quite thinly; cover with blotting or brown paper fitted into the top of the box. First saturate the paper with water and keep moist until the seed germinates, then remove. Expose the young plants gradually to the light. As soon as the ground outside is dry and warm, so that it can be well worked, set out the plants inches apart in the rows. For outside sow very thinly in rows 1½ feet apart, covering seed ¼inch deep with fine soil, and when well up thin to 1 foot apart in the rows. In order to have crisp, tender Lettuce, it should be grown as rapidly as possible, therefore the soil should be made very rich by liberal manuring.



Plant in hills 8 to 10 feet apart each way, with a very generous shovelful of well-rotted manure mixed with the soil in each hill. If commercial fertilizer is used, it should contain a large percentage of ammonia and potash. Plant eight to ten seeds in each hill, and finally, when danger from insects is past, thin out to three strong plants.





Tomato Culture

For very early fruit, the seed should be sown in a hotbed about the first weck in March, in drills 5 inches apart and ½inch deep. Later sowings may be made until the last of April. (Sufficient plants for a small garden can be started by sowing a few seeds in a shallow box or flower-pot and placing in a sunny window in the house.) When the young plants are 3 to 4 inches high, they should be set 4 to 5 inches apart in another hotbed or coldframe, or transplanted into small pots, allowing a single plant to a pot. Expose to the air as much as possible to harden them for planting out. Water freely at the time of transplanting into the open ground and shelter from the sun a few days until the plants are thoroughly established. Cultivate thoroughly as long as the vines will permit, but the last two or three workings of the social should be very challer.

Cultivate thoroughly as long as the vines will permit, but the last two or three workings of the soil should be very shallow.

Tomatoes grow splendidly trained to stakes or trellises, and the fruit is much improved, not only in appearance, but in quality. This mode of cultivation is quite common among gardeners who grow for the early market, and at private places throughout the country; especially is this desirable where neatness and at the same time economy of space in the home-garden is desired. The usual method is to set one strong plant to a stake 5 to 7 feet high, tying the plant up with wool or other strong, soft twine, and pruning quite freely as the vine advances in growth. By this method plants may be set much closer than in the ordinary way. For fine, large specimens of high color and attractive appearance generally, grow the clusters of the fruit in paper sacks, as is commonly practiced by grape-growers. These paper sacks or bags should be put on when the Tomatoes are about three-fourths grown. About 2,000 plants will be produced from one ounce of seed.



Biennials from seed generally bloom the second year, then die. Some varieties, if planted early, bloom the first season and therefore are treated as annuals.

therefore are treated as annuals.

Perennials endure northern winters with little or no protection and live and bloom several years. Most of the perennials will bloom the first year if started early in the spring. Hollyhocks, Columbines, Larkspurs, Foxgloves, Poppies, etc., are in this class.

Set the plants of early varieties 10 inches apart in the row, and those of the later varieties 15 to 18 inches apart. The richer the ground the better your flowers will be, and water is very necessary.
