WARLIKE PREPARATIONS.

We learn that Col. T. N. JOHNSON, Gov. McDougall's Aid, has received full instructions and authority in relation to carrying on the war against the Indians, and that he will leave this afternoon, in company with Judge MARVIN, for Mariposa.

MURDER AND LYNCHING AT CURTIS CREEK. We are indebted to Mr. BROWN, of Reynolds & Co.'s Express, for the particulars of one of the most cold blooded murders, followed by summary punishment, that we have ever been called upon to record.

ON SATURDAY evening, the 26th inst., WM. BOWEN and THOMAS McMASTERS had an altercation over a game of cards, when the former drew a pistol, for the purpose, as was supposed, of shooting his contestant.

The Babel of San Francisco.

All the world have read of Babylon, of the tower of Babel, and the confusion of tongues. Had the event recorded in Holy Writ occurred in the present day, instead of locating it in the now wastes of Asia, we should have given it a local habitation on Central Wharf, Commercial street, in San Francisco.

Most have read the passage of Bonaparte, over the bridge of Lodi, when the Austrian cannon disrupted his progress, and pictured to their mind the rush of men, and the vast slaughter through that narrow passage, in that desperate attempt. Were a cannon to be placed on Montgomery street, to defend it from such an inroad, the slaughter could not be less, and the sacrifice of human life would equal that of the passage of Lodi.

Our representatives in Congress should at once present the grievances of California, in regard to the isthmus mail services to the Post Office Department, and insist upon the immediate application of the proper remedy.

CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE.

IN SENATE.—The Finance Committee reported in favor of the bill allowing warrants to draw interest. Gov. McDougall returned the bill to provide for the inspection, with his veto, hoping it would "receive farther consideration in the body in which it originated, and as an admonition against acting prematurely in matters seriously affecting the interests of the public."

MR. GREEN was of opinion that this disposition of it might appear scarcely decorous enough to the Assembly. He thought that the contested elections should be settled before the consideration of the election of U. S. Senators, as it might be that one of the gentlemen whose seats were contested might be declared as not duly qualified.

MR. BRODERICK said that the election was fixed for next Monday. This left them only three or four days to make up their minds on the matter. He was opposed to such hasty action, and if any disposition was made of the resolution he hoped it would be indefinitely postponed.

MR. TINGLEY thought it should be laid upon the table. He was ready at any time himself to vote on the question, and was opposed to the indefinite postponement. He was willing however, to have the contested seats settled first.

MR. CARR, of the Committee on Commerce, reported back the separate bill which authorizes the Governor of the State to appoint and remove Port Wardens, with an amendment.

MR. WILKINS, on leave, introduced a bill to provide for a capitation tax. Read twice and referred.

MR. CAMPBELL presented a proposition from citizens of San Jose, donating valuable lands to the State, in consideration of this city being chosen as the site of the capital. Read twice, and referred to the Committee on Public Buildings.

MR. FULLER, had a difficulty in settling an account of a few dollars, which resulted in a quarrel between the parties. After considerable altercation, they separated, and Newby retired. Fuller soon after followed him with a loaded musket, and when within some ten paces of Newby, fired, the ball entering the back, immediately below the shoulder blade, and coming out just below the lobe of the left lung.

MR. CARR, of the Committee on Commerce, reported a bill, to establish the office of Harbor Master of any port, and defining his duties. Read twice, and ordered printed.

AN ACT regulating the Quarantine of Vessels at the Port of San Francisco. The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do hereby enact and declare:

§1. The quarantine anchorage shall be designated by the Board of Health, and shall be as near as possible to the Marine Hospital and every vessel subject to quarantine shall anchor within said anchorage...

§2. Every vessel in this act directed to be subject to quarantine shall be required to furnish a certificate of health, and when anchored at the place there assigned for quarantine, shall remain there with her officers, passengers and crew, until she is discharged by the Board of Health...

§3. All vessels arriving in the bay of San Francisco, California, are declared to be subject to quarantine hereunder, and shall be required to anchor in the anchorage designated by the Board of Health...

§4. No lighter shall be employed to load or unload vessels, or to receive or discharge cargo, or to receive or discharge passengers, or to receive or discharge mail, or to receive or discharge mail, or to receive or discharge mail, or to receive or discharge mail...

§5. AN ACT providing for the creation of a Marine Hospital for the State of California. The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do hereby enact and declare:

§1. There shall be established within and for the State of California, a Marine Hospital, and all buildings belonging to the same, shall be situated in the city of San Francisco, California, and shall not be more than five miles distant from the city of San Francisco, California...

§2. The Board of Health shall keep an office in the city of San Francisco, and shall be authorized to pay for the use of the same for the transaction of business between the Board and the State...

§3. The Board of Health shall keep an office in the city of San Francisco, and shall be authorized to pay for the use of the same for the transaction of business between the Board and the State...

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AN ACT creating Officers of Health for the Port of San Francisco, and Defining their Duties. The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do hereby enact and declare:

§1. There shall be established at the Port of San Francisco, California, a Board of Health, and the Board of Health shall be composed of the Mayor of the City of San Francisco, California, and two other persons, to be appointed by the Board of Health...

§2. The Board of Health shall keep an office in the city of San Francisco, and shall be authorized to pay for the use of the same for the transaction of business between the Board and the State...

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
