Guest of Honor Brigadier General Mark W. Bircher

was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in 1976. After flight training he joined Marine Fighter Attack. Squadron 451, MCAS Beaufort, SC, flying the F-4 Phantom. He held junior officer billets in the maintenance and operations departments during two unit deployments to Iwakuni, Japan. During 1982-1984. Captain Bircher was an exchange pilot with the U. S. Air Force flying the F-15 Eagle with the 58th Tactical Fighter Squadron. Eglin AFB, FL. From 1984 until leaving active duty in 1988, he served with the Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron – the Blue Angels – at NAS. Pensacola, FL. flying the A-4 Skyhawk and the F/A-18 Hornet.

Transferring to the Marine Corps Reserve, Major Bircher flew the OV-10 Bronco from 1991 until 1994. He was the Maintenance Officer and then Commanding Officer of Marine Observation Squadron 4 at NAS Atlanta, GA. Following FiA-18 refresher training, Lieutenant Colonel Bircher served as Commanding Officer of Marine Fighter Atlack Squadron 142, NAS Cecil Field, FL. from 1994 until 1997. In 1998, Lieutenant Colonel Bircher joined the Executive Support Center, Office of the Secretary of Defense, Policy, Pentagon, serving as a Watch Officer. During 1999-2001, Colonel Bircher served as Deputy Commander, Marine Aircraft Group 42, NAS Atlanta, GA. In 2002, Colonel Bircher joined the 4th Marine Aircraft Wing at NSA New Orleans, LA, as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-6. Upon recall to active duty in 2003, he augmented to 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing for deployment to Southwest Asia in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. When released from active duty, Colonel Bircher rejoined 4th Marine Aircraft Wing in 2004. Brigadier General Bircher served as the Deputy Commanding General, I Marine Expeditionary Force (MOB), Camp Pendleton, CA, prior to assuming command of the 4th Marine Aircraft Wing.

Brigadier General Bircher is a graduate of the Naval Academy, Airborne, Topgun, Weapons and Tactics Instructor, Amphibious Warfare, Command and Staff, Landing Force Staff Planning, Reserve Components National Security, Naval War College Strategy and Policy, and the Basic and Advanced NATO Electronic Warfare Schools.



COMMANDING OFFICER Colonel Brian C. Phillips

was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps Reserve under the Platoon Leaders program after graduation from Eastern Kentucky University in May 1983, with a Bachelor of Science in Police Administration and a minor in Business Administration. He completed The Basic School in Quantico, VA in February 1984 and reported to Flight School at NAS Pensacola, FL in March 1984. After training in VT-3 and HT-18, he was designated a Naval Aviator in May 1986. He completed CH-53E training at HMT-301 at MCAS Tustin, CA and reported to the Condors of HMH-484 at MCAS New River, NC in October of 1986.

Promoted to Captain in October 1988, he deployed to the Mediterranean with HMM-102, serving with the 22nd MEU aboard the USS Guadalcanal. A year later, he was transferred to Marine Forces Panama, deploying to that country as the Air Operations Officer and taking part in both Operations Just Cause and Promote Liberty. In April 1990 Captain Phillips was assigned to HMH-461 and participated in Operations Desert Shield, and later. Desert Storm. He took part in Operation Eastern Exit - the non-combatant evacuation of the U.S. embassy in Mogadishu, Somalia - in January 1991. Later that fall, he attended the Weapons and Tactics Instructors course and was designated a Weapons and Tactics Instructor in the CH-53E. Upon completion of WTI. Captain Phillips joined HMM-263, deploying to Norway for Operation Teamwork. Returning to CONUS in 1992, he served as the Detachment Officer in Charge for a three aircraft deployment to the Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center - Twentynine Palms, CA in support of two back to back Combined Arms Exercises. He was transferred to HMM-162 in February 1993, once again as part of the 22nd MEU (SOC) aboard the USS Guadalcanal, where he served as Assistant Aircraft Maintenance Officer. In September 1994 Captain Phillips was released from Active Duty and transferred to the Individual Ready Reserve.

While serving in the IRR Captain Phillips was promoted to Major in August 1995. then in August 1998, he entered the Selected Marine Corps Reserves and joined HMH-772. In 1999, Major Phillips once again deployed to Norway in support of Operation Teamwork. He was activated in January 2002 as part of HMH-772, serving in support of Operations Noble Eagle and Enduring Freedom. Two months later, he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel and was assigned as the Detachment Officer-in-Charge of a six CH-53E helicopter detachment attached to HMM-263. 24th MEU, deploying to Kosovo as part of the NATO peacekeeping force, and serving in support of exercise Dynamic Response 2002. Upon completion of this exercise, Lieutenant Colonel Phillips rejoined the 24th MEU in Djibouti, Africa as part of the Joint Special Operations Task Force - Crisis Response Element, where they conducted counter terrorism operations in the Horn of Africa, and further participated in Operation Iraqi Freedom. Once again Lieutenant Colonel Phillips was released from Active Duty in January 2004, and returned to a reserve drilling status with HMM-772. In March 2005, Lieutenant Colonel Phillips assumed command of HMH-769 where he presently serves. He was promoted to his current rank in July 2007.

Colonel Phillips's personal decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross. Air Medal with Combat "V" single action award, Air Medal with numeral "2", Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal and Selected Marine Corps Reserve Medal.

History of the Squadron

HMH-769 was originally established as Helicopter Transport Squadron 769 on 15 April 1958, based at Naval Air Station Oakland, CA, and flying the HUP-2. In April 1959 the squadron began flying the Sikorsky H-34. The unit was redesignated as Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 769 on 1 April 1961 and relocated to Naval Air Station Alameda, CA in July of that same year. The squadron flew the H-34 until 1971 when it transitioned the Sikorsky CH-53A. The unit was redesignated as Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 769 on September 1980 and later designated as Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 772 Detachment A. In April 1990, as HMH-772 Det A, the squadron became the first Marine unit to fly the RH-53D Sea Stallion, a former minesweeper used to replace the CH-53A. With its minesweeping gear removed the RH-53D proved to be a powerful replacement to the aging CH-53A aircraft.

HMH-769 was activated for Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm on 27 November 1990, and deployed to Saudi Arabia in support of combat operations in securing the liberation of Kuwait. HMH-769 operated from Al Jubayl and the expeditionary combat base "Lonesome Dove" while supporting the assault. During the return from the Persian Gulf, while aboard the USS Tarawa, HMH-769 helicopters were involved in Operation Sea Angel – a humanitarian relief operation in Bangladesh – after a devastating hurricane killed over 10,000 people in that country.

On 1 May 1996 the unit relocated from Alameda to Marine Corps Air Station El Toro, CA. The squadron received its first CH-53E Super Stallions on 23 August 1996, replacing the RH-53Ds with the newer, more powerful air-frame. Three years later, the squadron relocated to Edwards Air Force Base, arriving in May 1999.

Following the tragic events of September 11th, HMH-769 was activated on 26 January 2002, serving for five months in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. During this activation the squadron deployed two aircraft and 17 Marines in the first ever reserve CH-53E augmentation of an Active Forces MEU, deploying with the 11th MEU (SOC) to Djibouti in the Horn of Africa. The Roadhogs were activated again in January 2004 and in March of that year deployed to Bagram, Afghanistan for seven months in support of Combined Joint Task Forces 180/76 for Operation Enduring Freedom 4 and 5.

On 2 April 2007, Headquarters Marine Corps released Marine Corps Bulletin 5400, directing the deactivation of the squadron, with a completion date of no later than 30 September 2008. The following year saw a flurry of activity as the squadron marched toward this milestone, transferring aircraft and personnel consistently throughout the year. On 18 July 2008, the squadron transferred its last two aircraft to HMH-461 at Marine Corps Air Station New River, NC, enabling the squadron to formally deactivate in today's ceremony.
