

Berlin Ct Jan^o 25th 1831.Br^r Phelps.

As I have now a small remnant of a
 broken eve^r before^{me}, & as it is some time since I last
 addressed you, I now devote a few moments to commun-
 ion with you. The Lord has recently called me thro' scenes
 of affliction. A week ago this day I received & sad
 intelligence of the death of my Mother. For the last week
 of her life she failed very rapidly, being almost worn out
 with her long existing nervous affection. I was suddenly
 called home to attend & funeral ceremonies. The loss
 & interment of those we love, I find by experience more
 trying to patience & submission than I had previously
 supposed. But our heavenly Father reigns; & let the earth
 rejoice. May my affliction bring forth in me & all my
 kindred & peaceable fruits of righteousness.

I received your last letter a few weeks since; am much
 obliged to you for your cautions about & preservation
 of health; tho' my danger from excessive action, I think not
imminent at present. As for Attil, Saunders was & only
 man I got for N. Haven to take my place. His removal

has continued to advance since I left there. I gave them ~~an~~ a negative answer. For some reason, I know not what, Dr. Saunders is not about to carry with them. They have written to me for a candidate for N. H. Now I know not of a suitable man who can be had. I have preached in this place of late & am to remain here one Sab. longer. The ch. meets this week & Soc^z next Monday to see about giving me a call. I understand & presume they will be but one voice about it. The Soc^z here is not very large. The congregation consists of 4 or 5 hundred in summer, & less in winter. The village in summer is one of & most delightful in state. The Soc^z has an organ in the church. The Soc^z has rather declined for a few years tho' sectarian influence, & old age & feeble health of Mr Goodrich. The pres. wish now if possible to recruit & invigorate the Soc^z. The universalists for this & neighboring towns are about ^{to} put up a church of their stamp in this village, wh. will be the 2^d church of that kind in this state. They need some man to stand in this place, & withstand those libertines. They want a stronger man, than I fear they will get. Several things are very pleasant about this Soc^z. It is very

compact. Every school house is within 2 miles of the church.
It is near home &c. Near Hartford, Middletown, &c. &c.
town & places of public meetings, &c. But still I do not wish
to settle any where yet awhile; & it is quite doubtful
whether I carry here, even if & per. wish it ever so much.
I expect to leave this place for Brooklyn & seat of Windham
county, next week. The orthodox Socⁱ have recently
dismissed Mr. Edson. A revival has lately commenced
there. They have sent for me to come over & carry
over till 1st of April. I have not engaged however
to remain with them only till 1st of March,
you know not yet preaches in Newf^r. There has been, ^{quite}
an accession to the ch. since he has been there. There
are still new cases of conviction & conversion. There
are revivals in some neighboring towns. There has been
of late & still is a gradual revival in Tylers Socⁱ in
Middletown. ^{Feb 1st Berl^r Socⁱ} I arrived in the
town yesterday. The church & Socⁱ in Berlin have given
me a unanimous & very pressing call to settle with them. Several
men in early life who have hitherto refused to join & Socⁱ, came
forward & joined on Monday last, & several more will probably
join soon. The Socⁱ thought it not best to vote formally a larger
salary, lest some shd, in consequence, refuse to join & Societ

They therefore voted a salary of 500 dollars, as a Soc². This individuals made pledges of a 100 more. In & dispensations of divine Providence, they have become so much united, & as they say & universal we rejoice to have me negative their call; they pretend that I must come back. May & Lord direct me in & decision of solemn question before me. His people have contended for & driven away. Dark clouds of division lately hung over & church. But they dispersed in a striking manner. There is a general unanimity among & orthodox
