**COMPREHENSIVE PROGRAMME ARRANGED**

**Agricultural Bureau Conference At Woodstock**

South-western district branches of the Agricultural Bureau will hold their annual conference this year at Woodstock on Wednesday, March 22. On this occasion the western district will combine with the southwest.

An interesting and comprehensive programme has been arranged, and all members of the public, whether associated with the Agricultural Bureau or not, are invited to attend.

The policy of the Agricultural Bureau is one of adult education and seeks to encourage its members to obtain all available information on farming, economic, health and social problems.

The conference, which opens at 10 a.m. will be presided over by Mr. A. Young, of Walli. The organising secretary is Mr. W. Rowlands, of "Greylands," Woodstock. The president of Waugoola Shire, Cr. P. W. Richardson, will extend a welcome to delegates and visitors.

Mr. F. Cahill, M.L.A., will officially open the conference at 10.30.

Addresses during the day will be given by Mr. P. Coelli, general president; Mr. C. C. Crane, chief executive officer of War Agricultural Committees; Dr. Lloyd Ross, speaking on postwar rural housing; Mr. C. Walkden-Brown, district pools of agricultural machinery; Mr. J. Cavanagh, ex-general president and member of Wheat Board; Dr. Cooper Booth, Director of Social Hygiene, speaking on problems of venereal disease.

Various other addresses are being arranged.

A special feature of the day will be the ladies' sessions, which will be presided over by Mrs. O. Preston. During these sessions, addresses will be given by Miss E. Christie, chief dietician of St. George's Hospital, Kogarah, and Mr. D. Shand, of Armidale, with several members of the W.A.S.P.S.

An address on drying and preserving fruits and vegetables will also be given.

£20,000 FOR BLAYNEY

**TRANSPORT OF CARCOAR CHILDREN TO COWRA SCHOOL**

MORE than £1200 per year will be expended on the conveyance of children from Carcoar and other centres to the Cowra High School, following the approval of an increase in subsidy by the Minister for Education (Mr. Chas. Swartz). Extracts from a letter by the Minister to the local member (Mr. F. Cahill) is: "I have much pleasure in advising you that I have approved of an increase in the subsidy to these children to 1/3 per child, under the same conditions as already paid, to take effect as from February 1, 1944."

**GALLYMONT FIRE**

(By Our Correspondent).

Men of the district were once more called into action on the afternoon of the 22nd inst, when a fire broke out on the property of Mr. J. White, and traveled into "Little Forest," owned by Mr. J. Healy.

Mr. White was absent at the time, and Mrs. White, who had two young children in her care, bravely fought the flames and saved her home.

Mr. Healy, a man of over 70 years of age, was on his property at the time. With the fire within half-a-mile of his homestead, he realised the futility of fighting a lone battle, so rode to Gallymont, four miles away, for assistance. The only men available at the time, Messrs. K. Molloy and A. Lynch, hurried to the scene to find Messrs. J. Healy, D. Tarrant, Ken. Healy, R. Fuller, F. Bright and Mrs. J. White fighting desperately in long grass on a half-mile front.

Fortunately a slight change of wind aided the fighters, and the fire was turned from the homestead, taking a north-easterly course, where it was met and eventually brought under control by men arriving from Gallymont, Mandurama, Neville, Garland and Lyndhurst.

Contact was made with Mandurama by Constable McGovern, and Mr. D. J. Knight brought food supplies to the scene.

Although it is invidious to make distinctions among the host of workers who labored so valiantly during the period this district was menaced by fire, a word of appreciation is due to the ladies of Mandurama for the manner in which food supplies were prepared and despatched to this centre.

And a previous brief reference to the work of Miss B. Bright, at the local post office, was rather inadequate, for Bet. was on practically continuous duty from the first alarm on Tuesday until the position was deemed safe on the following Friday evening.

When the military took over on Wednesday, despatch riders from the seat of the fire returned hourly during the night to keep headquarters at Bathurst informed of the position. In addition was the directing of callers and assisting in the dispensing of refreshments at all hours of the day and night.
