#### GALLYMONT FIRE

(By Our Correspondent)

Men of the district were once more called into action on the afternoon of the 22nd inst, when a fire broke out on the property of Mr. J. White and travelled into "Little Forest," owned by Mr. J. Healy.

Mr White was absent at the time and Mrs. White, who had two young children in her care, bravely fought the flames and saved her home.

Mr. Healy, a man of over 70 years of age, was on his property at the time.
