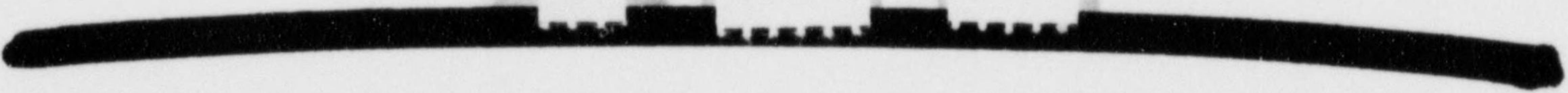

Subject: Establishment of British Consulate
in the U.S. Zone of Korea

Reference: SM-6787

Reference is made to your SM-6787 dated 30 September 1946 transmitting a copy of CM-IN 5776 and requesting the basis of a reply.

The State Department has advised the Secretary, SWNCC as follows:

"CM-IN 5776 repeated Acheson's 430 of 28 September from Tokyo. State Department answered 430 from Acheson by State's 138, dated 4 October (copy attached), addressed to CINCPAC Advance with request that it be forwarded to 'CG, XXIV Corps, Seoul, for Political Adviser.' Since the basic message requested the Department of State to notify General Hodge of the action to be taken by the British Government in the matter of designating a consular official, it is believed an adequate answer has been given by State's 138 and no reply is required to CM-IN 5776."

DRAFT MESSAGE TO SCAP

It is the opinion of the Department of State and the Chairman of the Far Eastern Commission that the directive sent to you in WAR based on a policy decision of the Far Eastern Commission taken at its meeting of September 25 does not require any specific action by you. However, it has been forwarded to you as a directive in view of the obligation of the United States Government under paragraph III, 1, of the terms of reference of the Commission.

You will note that the Far Eastern Commission reaffirms its previous decision that all cabinet ministers should be civilians. The Commission had been informed of your action in persuading the Japanese Government to amend the Constitution accordingly and therefore it was clear that no further action was necessary. However, the United States member saw no objection to the Commission's going on record as reaffirming its previous decision.

With regard to the decision that the House of Councilors should not have predominance over the House of Representatives, you will note that the only action the Commission contemplates in this matter is to scrutinize the implementing legislation. Consequently, it is the opinion of the Department of State and the Chairman of the Far Eastern Commission that no action by you is required other than supplying the Commission with texts of such legislation when they are submitted to the Diet.

Subject: Directive Relative to Further Policies

DRAFT DIRECTIVE FROM JCS TO SCAP
RELATIVE TO FURTHER POLICIES RELATING
TO A NEW JAPANESE CONSTITUTION

The following directive, prepared by the State Department to implement the policy adopted by the Far Eastern Commission on 25 September 1946 under the provisions of Paragraph II, A, 1, of its terms of reference, has been received from the State, War, and Navy Departments for transmission to you for guidance in accordance with Paragraph III, 1, of those terms of reference:

"The Far Eastern Commission reaffirms its previous decision, taken in FEC-031/19, [Directive Serial No. 54] basic principles for a New Japanese Constitution, that all cabinet ministers should be civilians, and further decides as a matter of policy that the House of Councilors should not have any predominance over the House of Representatives. The Commission considers essential its continuing right to scrutinize the implementing legislation very carefully to insure that such predominance is not established."

Report by Subcommittee for Military Information Control

THE PROBLEM

1. To determine, as directed by SWGCC 306/D, what positive steps should be inaugurated to provide for freer entrance into and travel through foreign countries by U.S. nationals and to provide for increased restriction and control on the entrance into and travel through the U.S. by foreign nationals.

FACTS BEARING ON THE PROBLEM AND DISCUSSION

2. A report of the Immigration Service provides for the coordination of all activities relative to the control of civilian travel in the Western Hemisphere.

3. Local authorities who have handled visits of foreigners have expressed themselves as being unguided in the matter of delineating the scope of inspection tours by foreign nationals and of distinguishing as between what to make available for inspection and what to withhold in the interest of national security. The armed services are unable to act in many cases because the subject matter is within the jurisdiction of individual states or municipalities. A case in point was the visits of Soviet engineers to the Los Angeles waterworks. The Corps of Engineers is unable to be of assistance in cases of this nature because only navigable streams are subject to review by that service (as far as installations on or over the streams are concerned or with respect to the drawing off of water from the streams). The protection of all other inland waterways is a matter for the individual states and municipalities to handle.



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4. The problem of civilian freedom of movement in the United States and foreign countries is a complex one and requires both intensive and extensive study.

CONCLUSION

5. It is concluded that this matter is beyond the scope of MIC and, therefore, that BWHCC 306/D should be returned to BWHCC with the recommendation that an inter-agency committee be appointed to consider the whole subject.

RECOMMENDATION

6. It is recommended that an inter-agency committee be appointed to consider the whole subject.

I have just received the following communication from Sir William Webb President International Military Tribunal:

"I enclose a letter which I have this day received from the Honorable Mr Justice Pal. His Honor desires to inform you of his position through me. The matter, of course, is entirely one for yourself and the Government of India." The pertinent parts of the letter which came from Judge Pal as the inclosure reads as follows: "When I was nominated by the Government of India for appointment on this Tribunal I was expressly told that it would be for a period of six months only. This period was important for me as I was now an ex-judge and was back to the legal profession. Upon this understanding I made appropriate arrangements about my work and procured adjournments of important matters until after the long vacation of the High Court which ends the second week of November.

When I saw that the work of this Tribunal would continue such beyond the period of 6 months, I wrote to my government informing it of his position so as to enable it to take whatever steps it might consider desirable in these circumstances. The letter is dated 25th August 1946.

I have not heard in reply from my government as yet. In these circumstances I am bound to return to assume my responsibilities to my clients and to the court at Calcutta."

Judge Pal requests transportation from Tokyo to Calcutta for 5th November 1946. It is impracticable at this late date to replace him. The Charter for the Tribunal covers the contingency of a lack of full membership in the 11 man Tribunal. The repercussions resulting from this withdrawal will be unfavorable to the trials proceedings. I recommend that the matter be presented on the highest level to the Indian Government for an expression of its views and its decision.

Subject: Summary of SWNCC Activities

During the period 21 - 30 September 1946 the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee cleared informally seven papers.


INFORMAL CLEARANCES

U.S. Guidance as to the Armed Forces to be Made Available to Security Council of the United Nations (SWNCC 219/3)

The Committee agreed to amend the draft agreement previously approved. Revised agreement reads: "The forces listed below will be available upon call to the Security Council and will normally be maintained at locations within the national borders of (Member Nation), its territories or other areas under its jurisdiction or administration in such a state of readiness as to be able to depart from such locations within the period indicated below."

Settlement of Amounts due Repatriated Japanese (SWNCC 224/3)

The Committee approved a policy statement on the above subject for transmittal to the U.S. representative on the FAS urging adoption. Approval also covered the forwarding by the JCS to SCAP of the policy statement for his information and the forwarding by the State Department of pertinent portions of the policy statement to the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization of the Justice Department and to the Bureau of Customs of the Treasury Department for implementation.

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Italian Civil Aviation (SUNCG 260/3)

The Committee concurred in a reply to the Combined Chiefs of Staff by the JCS proposing that the Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean be informed as follows: "The Combined Chiefs of Staff believe that you have authority under the provisions of FAS 642 to establish air taxi and feeder services to the extent recommended in NAF 1197. They approve the issuance of licenses for private flying in the manner, and in the type and number, recommended in NAF 1197. They recommended that the Italians be allowed to construct civil aircraft in sufficient numbers and of suitable types to fulfill the requirements for use within Italy."

Report of the Tripartite Naval Commission (SUNCG 208/18)

The Committee approved, on behalf of the U.S. Government, the original report of the Tripartite Naval Commission. The original report recommends that the Commission be dissolved on the date of approval of the report. After dissolution, the senior naval officers in Germany representing each of the three governments are to be authorized to handle jointly any matters which may arise from the agreement between the three governments regarding the German fleet.

Business Air Transport in the Transitional Period (SUNCG 31/10)

The Committee approved the amendment to SUNCG 31/3 recommended by the Air Coordinating Committee and approved by the JCS, which states:

"The rights of the transport aircraft of any nation not represented on the Allied Control Council to fly to, from and over, make technical stop and land, to take on or put off passengers, mail or freight in any zone shall be determined by the following procedure:

"1. That all such applications shall be received by the Allied Liaison and Protocol Section of Allied Control Council who will distribute such applications to the Air Directorate for consideration.

"2. That, where an application is in respect of one zone only, the matter shall be dealt with by the Air Directorate member for the control power concerned, but that the decision shall be transmitted

via the Air Directorate and Allied Liaison and Protocol Section of the Allied Control Council for purposes of continuity between control powers.

"3. That, where an application concerns two or more zones of occupation the matter shall be coordinated by the Air Directorate representatives of the Zones concerned with each Air Directorate representative retaining for the Zone Commander the right to refuse applications for over flying that zone and to specify flight corridors and appropriate airfields so as to insure flight safety and for other purposes. The decision to be transmitted via the Air Directorate and Allied Liaison and Protocol Section of the Allied Control Council as provided above."

Immunity of the U.S. Military Personnel from Foreign Criminal Jurisdiction (NSC 380)

The Committee approved the formation of an ad hoc Committee to formulate a coordinated governmental policy on the above subject.

Policy on Applications for Foreign Patents which Disclose Classified Information (NSC 386/1)



The State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee has developed draft terms of a trusteeship agreement for exploratory purposes only. The draft agreement has been drawn for application to the ex-Japanese mandates. It is believed, however, that substantially the same text could be used in the case of a strategic trusteeship agreement applied to any other area.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff are requested, as a matter of priority, to submit comments from a military point of view on the merits of the enclosed draft as a trusteeship agreement and particularly for its adequacy for protection of security interests.

In the event that this form of a trusteeship agreement is unacceptable from a military point of view, it is requested that the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee be advised of the specific respects in which it is unacceptable.

It is not intended that the submission by the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee or consideration by the Joint Chiefs of Staff of this draft agreement shall prejudice the ultimate decision as to whether the strategic control desired by the United States over former Japanese-held islands is to be accomplished through sovereignty or through United Nations trusteeship.

There is enclosed a draft directive prepared on the basis of a policy decision unanimously approved at the 25th meeting of the Far Eastern Commission on September 12, 1946, under the provisions of paragraph II, A, 1, of its terms of reference. It will be noted that this policy decision is quoted verbatim in the enclosed draft directive.

It is requested that the enclosed directive be forwarded by the Joint Chiefs of Staff to General MacArthur for his guidance in accordance with paragraph III, 1, of the terms of reference of the Far Eastern Commission. It is assumed that if the Joint Chiefs of Staff have any question regarding the draft directive they will refer the matter to the State Department for clarification before transmitting a directive on the subject.

The Secretary-General of the Far Eastern Commission requests that the Joint Chiefs of Staff in transmitting the enclosed draft directive to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers inform him that in adopting the policy decision on which this directive is based the Commission agreed that it should be released to the press 48 hours after its receipt in Tokyo in order to give the Supreme Commander time to provide for simultaneous release if he so desires. Acknowledgment of the receipt of the directive is therefore requested.

Because of the intention of not releasing the enclosure to the press until it has been received in Tokyo, the Commission would appreciate it if appropriate arrangements might be made to preserve the necessary security in the transmission of this message.

DRAFT DIRECTIVE FROM JCS TO SCAP

The following directive, prepared by the State Department to implement the policy adopted by the Far Eastern Commission on 12 September 1946 under the provisions of Paragraph II, A, 1, of its terms of reference, has been received from the State, War, and Navy Departments for transmission to you for your guidance in accordance with Paragraph III, 1, of these terms of reference:

"The action specified below should be taken with respect to facilities identified in the following categories of Japanese industry. Such action, under the Interim Reparations Removals Program, should be taken without prejudice to further removals that may be ordered under a final reparations program.

"1. Synthetic Oil Industry

"(Definition: Those plants and establishments, both government and privately owned, engaged in the manufacture of petroleum products from coal, whether by high-pressure hydrogenation, the Fischer-Tropsch hydrocarbon synthesis, or low temperature carbonization).

"a. All facilities identified within this category should be made available for claim, subject to the following reservation:

"(1) Any plant designated as suitable for actual or potential conversion to the manufacture of sulphate of ammonia for fertilizers should be retained in operation until the supply of fixed nitrogen from other sources becomes adequate.

"2. Synthetic Rubber Industry

"(Definition: Plants and establishments engaged in the production of synthetic rubber).

"a. All facilities which have been engaged in the production of synthetic rubber should be made available for claim."

On the assumption that certain of the Pacific Islands may be placed under trusteeships, a form of strategic trusteeship agreement was approved by the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee at its 48th (Special) Meeting on 17 September 1946. It is believed that substantially the same text could be used in the case of an ordinary trusteeship.

It is requested that the attached copy of the strategic trusteeship agreement be presented to the Joint Chiefs of Staff as a matter of high priority for their comments from a military point of view.

In the event that this form of a trusteeship is unacceptable from a military point of view, it is requested that the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee be advised of the specific respects in which it is unacceptable.

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It is not intended that this action shall be taken as an indication of a final decision by SWHCC with respect to a trusteeship for any of the Pacific Islands. Neither is it intended that this action shall prejudice any action which may be taken by SWHCC in the future.

DRAFT TRUSTEESHIP AGREEMENT

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS Article 75 of the Charter of the United Nations provides for the establishment of an international trusteeship system for the administration and supervision of such territories as may be placed thereunder by subsequent agreements; and

WHEREAS under Article 77 of the said Charter the trusteeship system may be applied to territories now held under mandate; and

WHEREAS on December 17, 1920 the Council of the League of Nations confirmed a mandate for the former German islands north of the equator to Japan, to be administered in accordance with Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations; and

WHEREAS Japan, as a result of the Second World War, has ceased to exercise any authority in these islands;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Security Council of the United Nations, having satisfied itself that the relevant articles of the Charter have been complied with, hereby resolves to approve the following terms of trusteeship for the Pacific Islands formerly under mandate to Japan.

ARTICLE 1

The Territory of the Pacific Islands, delimited as _____ and consisting of the islands formerly held by Japan under mandate in accordance with Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations, is hereby designated as a strategic area and placed under the trusteeship system established in the Charter of the United Nations. The Territory of the Pacific Islands is hereinafter referred to as the trust territory.

ARTICLE 2

The United States of America is designated as the administering authority of the trust territory.

ARTICLE 3

The administering authority shall have full powers of administration, legislation, and jurisdiction over the territory subject to the provisions of this agreement as an integral part of the United States, and may apply to the trust territory, subject to any modifications which the administering authority may consider desirable, such of the laws of the United States as it may deem appropriate to local conditions and requirements.

ARTICLE 4

The administering authority, in discharging the obligations of trusteeship in the trust territory, shall act in accordance with the Charter of the United Nations, and the provisions of this agreement, and shall, as specified in Article 83(2) of the Charter, apply the objectives of the international trusteeship system, as set forth in Article 76 of the Charter, to the people of the trust territory.

ARTICLE 5

In discharging its obligations under Article 76(a) and Article 84, the administering authority shall ensure that the trust territory shall play its part, in accordance with the Charter of the United Nations, in the maintenance of international peace and security. To this end the administering authority shall be entitled:

- (1) to establish naval, military and air bases and to erect fortifications in the trust territory;
- (2) to station and employ armed forces in the territory;
- (3) to make use of volunteer forces, facilities and assistance from the trust territory in carrying out the obligations towards the Security Council undertaken in this

regard by the administering authority, as well as for the local defense and the maintenance of law and order within the trust territory.

ARTICLE 6

In discharging its obligations under Article 76(b) of the Charter, the administering authority shall:

(1) foster the development of such political institutions as are suited to the trust territory and shall promote the development of the inhabitants of the trust territory toward self-government, and to this end shall give to the inhabitants of the trust territory a progressively increasing share in the administrative services in the territory; shall develop their participation in local government; shall give due recognition to the customs of the inhabitants in providing a system of law for the territory; and shall take other appropriate measures toward these ends;

(2) promote the economic advancement and self-sufficiency of the inhabitants and to this end shall regulate the use of natural resources; encourage the development of fisheries, agriculture, and industries; protect the inhabitants against the loss of their lands and resources; and improve the means of transportation and communication;

(3) promote the social advancement of the inhabitants, and to this end shall protect the rights and fundamental freedoms of all elements of the population without discrimination; protect the health of the inhabitants; control the traffic in arms and ammunition, opium and other dangerous drugs, and alcohol and other spirituous beverages; and institute such other regulations as may be necessary to protect the inhabitants against social abuses;

(4) promote the educational advancement of the inhabitants, and to this end shall take steps toward the establishment of a general system of elementary education; facilitate

the vocational and cultural advancement of the population; and shall encourage qualified students to pursue higher education, including training on the professional level.

ARTICLE 7

In discharging its obligations under Article 76(c), the administering authority, subject only to the requirements of public order and security, shall guarantee to the inhabitants of the trust territory freedom of speech, of the press, and of assembly; freedom of conscience, of worship, and of religious teaching; and freedom of migration and movement.

ARTICLE 8

1. In discharging its obligations under Article 76(d) as defined by Article 83(2), the administering authority, subject to the requirements of security, and the obligation to promote the advancement of the inhabitants, shall accord to nationals of each Member of the United Nations and to companies and associations organized in conformity with the laws of such Member, treatment in the trust territory no less favorable than that accorded therein to nationals, companies and associations of any other United Nation, except the administering authority.
2. The administering authority shall ensure equal treatment to the Members of the United Nations and their nationals in the administration of justice.
3. Nothing in this Article shall be so construed as to accord traffic rights to aircraft flying into and out of the trust territory. Such rights shall be subject to agreement between the administering authority and the state whose nationality such aircraft possesses.
4. The administering authority may negotiate and conclude commercial and other treaties and agreements with Members of the United Nations and other states, designed to attain for the

inhabitants of the trust territory treatment by the Members of the United Nations and other states no less favorable than that granted by them to the nationals of other states. The Security Council may recommend, or invite other organs of the United Nations to consider and recommend, what rights the inhabitants of the trust territory should acquire in consideration of the rights obtained by Members of the United Nations in the trust territory.

ARTICLE 9

The administering authority shall be entitled to constitute the trust territory into a customs, fiscal, or administrative union or federation with other territories under United States jurisdiction and to establish common services between such territories and the trust territory where such measures are not inconsistent with the basic objectives of the International Trusteeship System and with the terms of this agreement.

ARTICLE 10

The administering authority, acting under the provisions of Article 3, may accept membership in any regional advisory commission, regional authority, or technical organization, or other voluntary association of states, may cooperate with specialized international bodies, public or private, and may engage in other forms of international cooperation.

ARTICLE 11

1. The administering authority shall take the necessary steps to provide the status of citizenship of the trust territory for the inhabitants of the trust territory.

2. The administering authority shall afford diplomatic and consular protection to inhabitants of the trust territory when outside the territorial limits of the trust territory or of the territory of the administering authority.

ARTICLE 12

The administering authority shall enact such legislation as may be necessary to place the provisions of this agreement in effect in the trust territory.

ARTICLE 13

The provisions of Articles 87 and 88 of the Charter shall be applicable to the trust territory, provided that the administering authority may determine the extent of their applicability to any areas which may from time to time be specified by it as closed for security reasons.

ARTICLE 14

The administering authority undertakes to apply in the trust territory the provisions of any international conventions and recommendations which may be appropriate to the particular circumstances of the trust territory and which would be conducive to the achievement of the basic objectives of Article 6 of this agreement.

ARTICLE 15

The terms of the present agreement shall not be altered, amended or terminated without the consent of the administering authority.

ARTICLE 16

The present agreement shall come into force when approved by the Security Council of the United Nations and by the Government of the United States after due constitutional process.

Subject: Meteorological Information for Forces
Operating Under the Security Council,
United Nations.

In connection with a memorandum from the Department of State on the above subject dated 17 May 1946, which was forwarded to the Joint Chiefs of Staff by SWN-4366 on 31 May 1946, the Joint Chiefs of Staff have replied as follows:

"The proposal of the Department of State contained in SWN-4366 dated 31 May 1946 has been studied and the Joint Chiefs of Staff concur, in general, in subparagraphs g and d. It is felt, however, that it is not necessary nor desirable at this time to bring into being another body having cognizance of meteorological matters. Meteorological information for any military forces operating under the Security Council can be provided, if and when required, by obligating the national weather services of the member states to furnish specific meteorological service to the Military Staff Committee on request. A specialized agency on meteorology (preferably the present International Meteorological Organization established as a treaty intergovernmental organization) brought into direct relationship with the appropriate agency of the United Nations can coordinate and determine the requirements for such information.

"The Joint Chiefs of Staff propose to forward the enclosed memorandum to their Representatives on the Military Staff Committee of the United Nations for guidance in providing for the early establishment of a world weather exchange available to international security forces. Upon concurrence of the Department of State in the general plan contained in the memorandum it is requested that the U.S. Representative on the Security Council be furnished similar advice."

ENCLOSUREMEMORANDUM FOR THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE JOINT CHIEFS
OF STAFF ON THE MILITARY STAFF COMMITTEE OF THE
UNITED NATIONS

1. At the present time there exists in support of civil and military interests a world-wide meteorological network and international exchange of weather information. It is felt that the weather service requirements of the international security forces under the Security Council of the United Nations can best be fulfilled by utilizing and developing these existing facilities. To do this, the following action is desirable:

a. To include in the military agreement to be negotiated by the member states under Article 43 of the United Nations Charter a clause obligating the national weather services of the member states to furnish specific meteorological services to the Military Staff Committee on request.

b. To bring the existing International Meteorological Organization into direct relationship with the appropriate agency of the United Nations. This organization can then determine and coordinate the requirements of the security forces and other international activities, both military and civil, for meteorological information.

2. Necessary action on the proposal contained in paragraph 1 a above should result from collaboration between the Representatives of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on the Military Staff Committee, United Nations, and the U.S. Representative on the Security Council, to whom the Department of State is forwarding similar advice.

3. Action has been initiated on the proposal in paragraph 1 b above by the Chief, U.S. Weather Bureau.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF STATE:

Subject: Guidance for J.C.S. Representatives on the Military Staff Committee, U.N., on Making all National Forces Available to the Security Council.

Reference: SWNCC 219/8

The following memorandum is forwarded to the Secretary of State at the request of the Joint Chiefs of Staff:

"The United Kingdom representatives on a subcommittee of the Military Staff Committee of the United Nations have proposed inclusion in the Standard Form of Agreement concerning the size and composition of the armed forces to be made available to the Security Council an article as follows:

'Member Nation guarantees to place, if requested by the Security Council, the whole of its national forces at the disposal of the Security Council so far as its other commitments and transport resources permit.'

"The British members on the subcommittee of the Military Staff Committee presently drafting a Standard Form of Agreement have already agreed to inclusion of Article II as set forth in the draft agreement in SWNCC 219/8. It is, therefore, concluded that the British intend their proposed article to be in addition to Article II instead of a replacement for it. It is noted, however, that in the memorandum proposing the new article to the subcommittee, the British representatives

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stated, 'An agreement of this nature would seem to eliminate the need for large predetermined forces under Article II,' and that a British representative stated in effect in a subcommittee meeting on 22 August that national contributions should be kept as small as possible and that, in order to do this, member nations should agree to reinforce these contributions by the method set forth in the proposed article. These statements indicate a trend of thought which, if adopted by all other member nations, might result in the Security Council having on call armed forces insufficient to cope with even foreseeable situations. The purpose of making contributions under Article 43 of the Charter which is 'in order to contribute to the maintenance of international peace and security' may be vitiated by this trend. Aside from the proposed article itself, this trend of thought on the part of the British is objectionable from the military point of view.

"If member nations pledge quotas commensurate with their resources, the forces permanently available under the provisions of Article 43 of the Charter should be ample for any need that can develop, short of major war. The outbreak of war among the major powers will mean that the United Nations has failed to achieve its purpose and will terminate the organization as constituted under the present Charter.

"It is considered that the political importance of the matter is paramount. Its military implications are nebulous because of the indefiniteness of the phrase 'so far as its other commitments and transport resources permit' and because possible political and popular interpretations of the proposed article are unknown. The question is primarily whether additional forces, if required, will be made available to the Security Council by negotiation between the Security Council and member nations when or after an emergency arises, or whether the United States will agree beforehand that all forces not required for other commitments will be made available if needed. This and other political implications contained in the British proposal are outside the competence of the Joint Chiefs of Staff but appear to be of major importance to the United States. The Joint Chiefs of Staff, therefore, feel they should have advice from proper governmental authority as to the attitude of the United States Govern-

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ment toward the British proposal before preparing and forwarding to their representatives on the Military Staff Committee a statement of the position to be assumed toward it. It is possible that in the light of the advice received, military objections will become apparent which are not now perceived because of the obscure nature of the implications surrounding the British proposal.

"It is requested that this memorandum be forwarded to the Secretary of State with the request that he furnish the Joint Chiefs of Staff, as a matter of priority, a statement of the United States Government's attitude toward the British proposal."

It is requested that the information desired by the Joint Chiefs of Staff be forwarded to the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee for transmittal to the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Subject: Chinese Request for Payment of Deposits
in Bank of China, Osaka.

At its 48th Meeting on 11 September 1946 the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee approved the following message to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers:

OSAKA C 88361 29 March 1946, and C 88354 9 July 1946. Re Bank of China, Osaka Branch:

"1. Interested government agencies agree the recommendations of SWNCC 213/3 (MARK 88348, December 18, 1945) need not apply in this case and that if the Branch is solvent you may arrange for payment of all depositors by direct payment by the Branch or by transfers of accounts to open Japanese banks, subject to all pertinent financial regulations, such as blocking and restriction on amount of withdrawals. If Branch insolvent, request your views as to liquidation or other action at this time.

"2. Recommend that Bank of Japan continue as fiscal agent, that if solvent Branch not be liquidated at this time, and that action not be a precedent for liquidation of other closed foreign or puppet banks.

"3. Request views on general program for liquidation or reopening of closed banks."

It is requested that the foregoing message be transmitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in reply to CM-IR-630 dated 29 March 1946, provided the Joint Chiefs of Staff have no objection from a military point of view.

Subject: Summary on SWNCC Activities

During the period 1 - 10 September 1946 the State-Navy Coordinating Committee cleared informally four papers. No formal meeting was held.

INFORMAL CLEARANCE:

Exploitation of German and Austrian Specialists in
Science and Technology in the United States
(Ltr. 227/22)

The Committee approved the Interim Policy statement at its 46th Meeting on 21 August 1946 and the President approved the Policy on 3 September 1946. The Interim Policy stated in substance:

"It is the policy of this Government to exploit selected German and Austrian specialists in science and technology in the United States. To insure that the time required for normal processing of immigration papers does not delay evacuation of specialists and families to the United States so as to render present policy ineffective and thereby endanger the national security, the War Department PAPERGLIP Project would be expanded."

Definite details were outlined to implement the policy and place responsibility.

Training of Foreign Nationals at U.S. Service Schools (SWNCG 137/2)

The Committee agreed to appoint an ad hoc Committee to prepare a statement of national policy concerning the training of foreign nationals at service schools in the U.S., and further agreed that this policy should include:

- a. A list of the nations which should be afforded the training.
- b. The relative priority among these nations authorized.
- c. Proposals for legislation which should be sought, if any.
- d. The status of such students for whom no legal authority exists.
- e. The schools to be made available to foreign students.

Return of Looted Objects of Art to Countries of Origin (SWNCG 322)

The Committee agreed to appoint an ad hoc Committee to study and report on the above subject.

Repeal of Synthetic Oil and Synthetic Rubber Industries from Japan (SWNCG 315)

The Committee approved the following conclusions:

"The following actions should be taken as a part of the program for reducing Japanese industrial war potential.

"A. Synthetic Rubber Industry.

(Definition: Plants and establishments engaged in the production of synthetic rubber.) All plants and establishments identified by SCAP in the synthetic rubber industry should be impounded and their machinery and equipment made available for reparations or, if not desired by reparations claimants within the limit of approved claims, should be destroyed.

"B. Synthetic Oil Industry.

(Definition: Plants and establishments engaged in the manufacture of liquid fuels from coal, whether by high-pressure hydrogenation, the Fischer-Tropsch process, or low temperature carbonization.) All plants and establishments identified by SCAP in the synthetic oil industry should be impounded and their machinery and equipment made available for reparations or, if not desired by reparations claimants within the limit of approved claims, should be destroyed, subject to the following limitation: any machinery or equipment in such plants which is suitable for use in production of synthetic ammonia and, which, in the judgment of SCAP, should be transferred for use in production of synthetic ammonia for fertilizer manufacture, should be exempted from such action."

Subject: Reorganization of the Italian Air Force

Reference: SM-6550

In reply to Memorandum SM-6550 dated 20 August 1946 the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee informs the Joint Chiefs of Staff that, in general, the proposals of the British Chiefs of Staff in GCS 836/5 concerning the reorganization of the Italian Air Force are acceptable from a political point of view.

In order that the Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean (SACMED) may fully appreciate the necessity for exact compliance with the limitations to be imposed on the Italian Air Force, as recommended by the Council of Foreign Ministers, and to ensure that the interim Italian Air Force as organized under the guidance of SACMED will in no way exceed the ceilings agreed to by the Council of Foreign Ministers and further to ensure that the message will not be construed as a commitment to supply United States aircraft or material for the Italian Air Force, it is recommended that the draft message to SACMED proposed by the British Chiefs of Staff be modified as indicated in the enclosure.
