Lieut. (jg) H. PETERSEN in a PB4Y-1P aircraft of Fleet Air Photographic Squadron One took off from Central Field, Iwo Jima on 18 July 1945 at 1100 King to photograph the Hitachi Area of Honshu, Japan.

The weather conditions enroute to the target were very unfavorable. It was necessary to resort to instruments along the major part of the route and a mild front was encountered. The target area itself, however, was clear, and excellent photography was obtained from an altitude of 20,000 feet. Heavy, intense antiaircraft fire of a barrage type was encountered. Some shells burst within forty to fifty feet of the photo-Liberator, but no damage was sustained. On the return trip, F6F aircraft of the Third Fleet failing to immediately identify the photographic aircraft started to make runs on him from bracketing position. They recognized the friendly character of the plane, however, before coming into firing range and broke off. Lieut. (jg) PETERSEN then established communications with a flight of F4U aircraft in the vicinity. He returned to Iwo Jima at 2100 King.

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
