Canadians Had Support of Newest British Guns in Fight For Mine Craters at St. Eloi; Sixth Brigade, Led by Brig.-Gen. Ketchen, Added to Its Reputation, Says Correspondent in London

London, April 15.—The stories told by the several participant in the great battle last week for mine craters at St. Eloi who talked sarily are imperfect owing to the terrific nature of the fighting and the limited range of view, but these men in their combined narratives, present a picture of the whole operation correcting some details sent earlier. The Canadians endured a strain of the most tremendous nature, day after day, in the St. Eloi craters

in a way that brings undying glory to Canada's army.

The 6th Brigade, commanded by Brig. General Ketchen, of Winnipeg, and made up of western battalions, won a great reputation in its raids and forays into "No Man's Land" during the winter, and now it has undergone an experience that will rank in imperial history with the opening days of the second battle of Ypres.

The brigade advanced on Monday, nothing to the British and Canadians on theirs.

Here discipline told and they automatically and coolly continued their work, even when death for all seemed inevitable. Some climbed up the steep sides of the craters, filled trench bags and, put them in position, forming parapets, and bombers crawled out to make a counter offensive.

"Behind the craters there was a German communicating trench and here the Canadians and Germans met. Time after time parties met and died.

"The cratera revealed some of the most terrible aspects of war. Most of those in them could see nothing of what was going on outside, and, as they themselves said, simply had to wait their turn. Every ounce of fortitude was called upon and the men proved gloriously fit for their task. Time after time, despite the activity of the British artillery, the Germans strove to make rushus forward. Some escaped the fire of the big guns only to be met by the machine gun fire, which swept them away wholesale. Soldiers who witnessed something of these rushes will retain forever impressions of men staggering, reeling, rushing into inevitable death.

# MEN FROM DOMINION HELD THEIR GROUND STATES EYEWITNESS

Struggle for Mine Craters at St. Eloi Described in Detail; Troops Were Called Upon to Display Self-Reliance and Courage; Many Incidents Went to Make Up the Whole Operation.

"On the night of April 8-9 good progress was made in consolida ing and improving our lines and communications. Some ground we gained and a few prisoners taken.

"On the night of April 10-11 the Germans attacked four of th craters held by our troops and some of the front line trenches. The were repulsed at all points.

"Lieut. Browne met a few more of our men who had been o off from their trench, and with these reinforcements charged th point from which he had been fired at. Twelve Germans were foun re, one of whom was an officer. All twelve were clubbed to deat the officer being attacked and killed by Pte. Simoneau

"A party of 40 Germans advanced in close order towards one of the craters held by our men. They were observed by Sergt. Reeve 31st Battalion, who was commanding a detached platoon of Majo Daly's company. The enemy was allowed to approach within 40 o 50 yards. Sergt. Reeve then gave the order for rapid fire and the hostile party was entirely destroyed. The front trenches were imperfect dugouts still in embryo and machine gun emplacements not yet constructed. Communication trenches were practically non-existent and the relief had to be effected by the soli-tary front line treaches from both flanks. Most of the trenches were at

situation, but dawn found the positions in front unsatisfactory. In the early morning and again at intervals during the day the German artillery bembarded our lines in this sector. The fire was both severe and accurate. Protection and cover were all too scanty. The low trench was damaged, particularly that portion of it held by the 27th Battallon, and the old British treach to the north of the craters also suffered. Our artillery retailated with a heavy fire until each bombardment in turn had been silenced.

## WILL ARRANGE FOR STEEL SHIPMENTS

Japanese Shipbuilder to Place Orders for Material; Yards Are Busy

Officers of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha liner Yokohama Maru, which was in m in shipbuilding which is now be ng experienced in Japan, and fully ing experienced in Japan, and fully confirm-previous reports of this shortage of tonnage which exists in spite of the efforts to speed up the building of new vessels. It is reported that the Nippon line is increasing its fleet by six freighters, and three vessels which, in addition to being able to handle large cargo, also will have accommodation for passengers. Recently three freighters have been launched. They are vessels of 7,000 tons, similar in type to the Takata Maru, which sank after a collision in the Atlantic.

While the shipbuilders are swamped with orders, they are finding it a difficult matter to secure the necessary material, and K. Matsukafa, president of the Kawasaki Dockyard Company, Kobe, is now visiting the United States and will go east in order to open negotiations direct with steel works in an endeavor to arrange for a regular supply of steel. He hopes to be able to arrange so that all the material purchased will be sent overland to the Pacific coast and shipped to Japan.

After completing his arrangements in the east, Mr. Matsukata will proceed to England, where he, as representative of all the shipbuilding interests of Japan, will open negotiations with the British government for the TO CARRY GRAIN

If Mr. Matsukata is successful in his mission the shipbuilders will be in a position to rush work on the vessels they have on order.
