General Bliss Has Scheme to Suspend Race in Armaments

Former U.S. Representative on Supreme War Council Declares Nations of World Would Promptly and Inevitably Respond to Conference Proposals.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Should the United States call upon the mations of the world for a "full, free and fair discussion of reduction of armaments, the favorable response would be prompt and inevitable," the House Naval Committee was told to-day by General Tasker H. Bliss, former American representative on the Supreme War Council at Paris.

'The nation that would come to such a conference and refuse to agree to any proposition looking to disarmament or at lest a reduction of its military establishment," said General Bliss, "could be written down as the next Germany, and the United States could make its plans accordingly.

General Bliss preceded Secretary Daniels, who appeared again to give the committee detailed information regarding the relative naval strength of the great powers.

Cannot Stand Strain.

"Our present form of civilization can not stand the great strain of military preparation much longer," General Bliss declared. "The world war was a terrific strain on civilization. The next war will be very much worse."

General Bliss said he had discuss-ed disarmament "in a general way incidental to other matters," with Marshal Foch and high British mili-

complished in sixty days," said he.
Asked whether he had any knowledge of a "sincere desire" on the part of the other world powers for a disarmament agreement, General Bliss said he could see where some good might come from a reduction of navalbuilding by the United States, Great Britain and Japan for five years as provided in the pending Borah resolution if it were regarded as a prelude to a permanent agreement. He said, however, that naval building under contract in this country should be completed.

He said that in conversations with former Premiers Clemenceau and Orlando and Premier David Lloyd George and other Premiers of the Allied powers, he had found a universal "dread and horror" at the international situation and the potentialities for world chaos resulting from the world war.

Daniels Submits Data.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Secretary Daniels to-day laid before the House

Washington, Jan. 12.—Secretary Daniels to-day laid-before the House Naval Affairs Committee what he described as approximately complete data on the relative seapower of the three principal naval powers, requested by the Committee in connection with consideration of its international disarmament.

Tables submitted by the Secretary show that while the present effective fighting strength of the British navy includes 538 ships of 1,588,442 tons, as compared with 330 ships of 779,193 tons for the American navy, completion of the authorized building plan of this country in 1925 will give it a tonnage superiority in the ratio of 1.25 to one, with approximately equal number of ships.

"TWO KEELS TO ONE" **POLICY LUDICROUS**

Says "Spectator" Discussing Present Naval Controversy

London, Joh. 12.—Any attempt by Great Britain to build a big navy in competition with the United States would be "absolutely disastrous," say some of the leading weekly periodicals of London, in commenting on the naval estimates for the current year. As presented in the House of Commons these estimates were fixed at £90,372,300.

The Spectator condemns the post-

The Spectator condemns the post-war recrudescence of "navalism" un-der the caption "The Naval Skin Game." "Against whom should we be building?" it asks. "Either against America or Japan. We should not be building against both for an alliance between them against Great Britain is inconceivable.

"We want to say most emphatically that in our opinion a competition with America would be absolutely disas-trous. We hope the nation will never consent to it."

Any suggestion of a "two keels to one" naval policy as directed against the United States, The Spectator dismisses as ludicrous, and it underscores the phrase: "We must not form our policy on the possibility of a war with America."

"If ever we joined with Japan against America, we should have sounded the knell of the British Em-

The Nation, which brands big navalism as sheer lunacy, also strongly opposes naval competition with the United States, which it says will have a navy superior to the Brit-ish in 1924. sh in 1924.

"We cannot successfully enter on a shipbullding competition with America, which has twice our population and four times our resources," this paper says, and it continues:

"Our navalists have put another nail in the coffin of the League of Nations. Unless this policy is repudiated at once, it will do more than anything else to keep America out of the League, to impel her to a political isolation, developing her full powers of military and naval defence, drawing the South American states into a Pan Americanism, fatal to the larger internationalism, and depriving the broken countries of Europe of the economic and financial aid that they badly need, and that only the trade and credit of America can supply. That way lies neither peace, nor economic recovery, nor financial salvation."

The Outlook.

The Outlook, which apologies for "inflicting on the reader the painful subject of an Anglo-American war which is rightly not considered thinkable by most of us," considers that under existing conditions of mine and submarine warfare, the British fleet, were it twice as big as it is, could not venture into American waters, nor could the Americans, with thrice the number of dreadnoughts they possess, venture to approach the British coasts."



VANCOUVER GENERAL HOSPITAL HAS DEFICIT

Vancouver, Jan. 12.—With 1,300 beds and always from 900 to 1,000 inpatients to be cared for, Vancouver General Hospital has a deficit of \$120,-000 for the past year, according to the statement of Dr. M. T. MacEachern, medical superintendent.

However, this, he said, compares favorably with many of the institutions of the same nature in Eastern and Middle Canada. Toronto's hospital, with 780 beds, has a deficit of \$150,000; Winnipeg will show a deficit of \$30,000 to \$90,000, and Calgary's hospital has a shortage of \$250,000 to cope with.

Dr. MacEachern said the united hospital committee estimated that the cost per day per patient was \$3.75, while the per capita cost for patients at the Vancouver hospital averaged for the year \$3.25 per day. The hospitals of British Columbia were very optimistic as to the future, as, in view of the quick decline of the cost of materials, many financial difficulties would be removed in the present year.

To the Editor:—As previously stated most of the countries of the world have recognized the need of the mother for a period of rest by prohibiting employment for some time before and subsequent to her confinement. The period of payments of Maternity Benefits ranges from two to twelve weeks. In Great Britain and Australia a cash benefit is granted the mother. It is important to call attention to the fact that practically the entire wage-earning population of Austria, France, Germany, Great Britain, Russia and Australia are in receipt of some sort of aid during the period of childbirth. These countries disburse large sums on this account. In 1914 the Federal Government of Australia paid out three million dollars in maternity allowances; this sum representing three per cent. of the consolidated revenue of the Government. In France the maternity allowances call for one million dollars annually from the national government and another million from the local Government. These two instances are mentioned to show the extent to which governments are willing to assume financial burdens to refleve the monetary strain caused by child-bearing on the wage-earning population.

In the granting of maternity benefits the States is not bestowing charity, but performing a duty in providing itself with that which means its continued existence—for without the mother the States would cease.

We stand upon the threshold of a new age which is to herald the recognition of the mother and her child; to give public health-work that human touch it has hitherto lacked and to modify those glaring inequalities in social life and condition which are destructive alike to infancy and the ideals of Christian citizenship.







Cicada." This insect lives underground for sixteen years as a grub, and as a winged insect for only four or five weeks.



To help bring about the conditions all desired, the alderman declared that he would co-operate at all times with the new Chamber of Commerce, and while he proposed to enforce the laws fearlessly, he was absolutely opposed to a "narrow" administration.

Reaching Quarantine Station over-Reaching Quarantine Station overnight, the O. S. K. passenger steamer Alabama Maru, Captain Yamaguchi, made port here to-day at 10 a. m., after a fair run, but with some very unusual-weather. Captain Yamaguchi was formerly on the Manila Maru, and for a long time before that on the former Mexico Maru, being well known on this coast. The Alalama on this trip is completing her second call here, since she was launched from the yards at the Misui yards, Japan.
Captain Yamaguchi reported that three big vessels put out from Yoko-hama about the same day, and in consequence all of them went light. The Alabama Maru is carrying a total of 2,310 tons of general freight, silk, porcelain and general merchandise comprising the bulk of this shipment. She put off 75 tons at Victoria, and carries 192 tons for Vancouver, 710 tons for Seattle and 1,933 tons for Tacoma, her final port of call.
On board were 20 cablin passengers and 37 steerage, ten of the steerage being for this port. She cleared from Yokohama a day ahead of the Fushimi, which also docked this morning, and was some 16 days on the voyage.



SHIPBUILDING LESS FIRM AFTER YEAR OF **EXTENSIVE TONNAGE**

Lloyd's Register Shows Fall-ing Off in Construction at End of Year Past

The Lloyd's Register report of shipping for the past twelve months shows that the period was one of continued endeavor in all countries to make good war losses in merchant tonnage. Lloyd's work was far reaching as the committee assigned classes to 1319 vessels of 4,253,523 tons, as compared to a total of 3,800,000 tons in the previous year. At the end of June no less than 4,930,340 tons of craft were under construction with a view to classification. The United Kingdom, United States and Japan are credited with the most extensive ship building activity, in the relative order named. Holland, Canada, Italy, Sweden, Spain and Denmark are also mentished in the report.

Of the 1,319 vessels classed during the year, 594 of 1,391,808 tons were built in the United Kingdom, 480 of 1,930,705 tons in the United States, and 105 of 571,129 tons in Japan. Of the total, 2,009,495 tons were built for the United States (1,735,378 tons being for the United States (1,735,378 tons being for the United States Shipping Board), while the tonnage built for the United Kingdom was 1,234,311, and that for Japan 444,957. At the beginning of the war—in the year 1914-15—the total classed was 1,295,622 tons, so that the work of the past year represents between three and four times that total. The total classed for the carrying of oil in bulk consisted of 55 vessels of 275,714 tons.

It is also noted that a large number of vessels have been converted from the use of coal as fuel to that of oil, and that of the total world's tonnage of 100 tons and upwards 76 per cent now use coal, 16.3 per cent use oil as fuel for ternal combustion engines, and 6 per boilers, 1.7 per cent use oil in incent have sail only. These figures compare respectively with 82 per cent, 10.5 per cent, 1.5 per cent, and 6 per cent in the previous year, so that there has been a net transference of about 6 per cent from coal fuel to oil as steam-raising fuel.

BRITISH CREW ON CABLESHIP RESTORER SUBJECT OF IRRITATION

Subject of Irritation

Seattle, Jan. 12.—Whether the cable ship Restorer, owned by the Pacific Commercial Cable Company, and now moored at Charleston, Wash., can continue under the protection of the American flag, and yet refuse to employ American officers, is a question that will be determined soon, according to George Uhler, supervising inspector general of the steamboat inspection service. Gen. Uhler gave this assurance to Senator Jones to-day.

The Seattle agent of the Neptune Association complained by telegram to Senator Jones that the ship is commanded by a master with a British board of trade-license, and has a second mate with a similar license. The master, the telegram reported, has sent to Vancouver for a third officer with a British license, asserting that the American merchant service cannot produce a master possessing sufficient ability to handle this ship.

Gen. Uhler said the matter has already been called to his attention. He has determined that the vessel comes under the law covering inspection of ships, and if this is the case the department of commerce also has jurisdiction in the matter of employment of allen officers. The Restorer was built in England seventeen years ago. She has not been documented under the American flag, but is working under a letter of protection.


