The chairman called upon F. L. Frudd, people's warden, for the financial report, which showed receipts amounting to \$954.83, that being \$331 less than the previous year's receipts. The expense sheet was very readable, and it is to the credit of the warden and church committee that only \$4.50 had been paid out in labor in spite of the fact that a good deal of work had been done, especially in the beautifying of the church yard, by planting ornamental trees, etc. Whist Drive. A whist drive, followed by a basket social and dance, was held in the Luxton Hall on Saturday evening. The proceeds, amounting to \$24, will be used for the benefit of the hall. Luxton Hall boasts a beautifully laid and polished floor, and the residents of the district hope to install a piano in the hall in the near future, so that more use will be made of the hall and the floor by dance-lovers and the socially inclined, and incidentally by holding entertainments and dancing the hall committee would be able to raise more money to help with the upkeep of the hall. Little Mothers' Class. Metchosin now boasts of a "Little Mothers" class, held at the home and under the supervision of Miss O. K. Gawley, the public health nurse, at which girls ranging in age from ten years and upwards are taught not only the "care of the baby," but "first aid in the home" and the care of their own bodies, and many other things pertaining to good health. Miss Gawley's interest in the child life of the very large district which she covers in her work, has long been recognized as something more than duty; it is a personal and loving interest to which the children respond whole-heartedly. The "Little Mothers" class will no doubt prove to be of great benefit to the girls as they grow older and also to the general health of the community as a whole, particularly the younger members.

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"TWO KEELS TO ONE" POLICY LUDICROUS Says "Spectator" Discussing Present Naval Controversy. London, Jan. 12.—Any attempt by Great Britain to build a big navy in competition with the United States would be "absolutely disastrous," say some of the leading weekly periodicals of London, in commenting on the naval estimates for the current year. As presented in the House of Commons these estimates were fixed at £30,872,300. The Spectator condemns the post-war recrudescence of "navalism" under the caption "The Naval Skin Game." "Anyone who should be building?" it asks. "Either against America or Japan. We should not be building against both for an alliance between them against Great Britain is inconceivable. "We want to say most emphatically that in our opinion a competition with America would be absolutely disastrous. We hope the nation will never consent to it." Any suggestion of a "two keels to one" naval policy as directed against the United States, The Spectator dismisses as ludicrous, and it underscores the phrase: "We must not form our policy on the possibility of a war with America." "If ever we joined with Japan against America, we should have sounded the knell of the British Empire," the paper concludes. The Nation. The Nation, which brands big navalism as sheer lunacy, strongly opposes any competition with the United States, which it says will have a navy superior to the British in 1924. "We cannot successfully enter on a shipbuilding competition with America, which has twice our population and four times our resources," this paper says, and it continues: "Our navalists have put another nail in the coffin of the League of Nations. Unless this policy is repudiated at once, it will do more than anything else to keep America out of the League, to impel her to a political isolation, developing her full powers of military and naval defence, and the South American states into a Pan Americanism, fatal to the larger internationalism, and depriving the broken countries of Europe of the economic and financial aid that they badly need. And that only the trade and credit of America can supply. That way lies neither peace, nor economic recovery, nor financial salvation." The Outlook. The Outlook, which apologues for "inflicting on the reader the painful subject of an Anglo-American war which is rightly not considered thinkable by most of us," considers that under existing conditions of mine and submarine warfare, the British fleet, were it twice as big as it is, could not venture into American waters, nor could the Americans, with three the number of dreadnoughts they possess, venture to approach the British coasts. Incidentally, The Saturday Review puts in a strong plea for the sale of the West Indies by Britain to the United States, in order to reduce British indebtedness to America, without sacrificing British trade interests.

FAMILY BARRED BY IMMIGRATION LAWS. Women and Children Marooned by Technicality. Seattle, Jan. 12.—Technical provisions of the Canadian immigration laws have marooned Mrs. Max Robin, formerly Mrs. Mary Volinsky, wealthy Vancouver, B. C., woman, in Seattle with her six children, all of school age or younger. She is trying to re-enter Canada, from where she came to Seattle to spend the Christmas holidays with her sister, Mrs. G. Gromet, 211 17th Avenue. United States immigration authorities can do nothing for Mrs. Robin. Her case is being taken up with the Canadian Government in Ottawa by Attorney Simon L. Weiner, of Seattle, in an effort to get permission for her return to Vancouver, where she has lived for the last twelve years, that she may place her children in school again. Mrs. Robin came to Seattle last December 21, with her children, as Mrs. Volinsky, and while here was married on January 1, to Max Robin, a British citizen, born in Egypt and who came to Seattle recently from Australia. She thus became a subject of Great Britain and lost her Canadian citizenship. There is provision of the Canadian laws, Attorney Weiner said, which prevents a British subject from entering Canada, excepting directly from England, or with a passport. Mrs. Robin, of course, did not need a passport when she came here as Mrs. Volinsky. "On January 4 Mrs. Robin attempted to return to Vancouver. She was barred. She was forced to return with her husband and children to the home of Mrs. Gromet here. Attorney Weiner said that unless he can gain permission of the Government in Ottawa, Mrs. Robin may be forced to return to England, or to appeal to the British Government in London.

VANCOUVER GENERAL HOSPITAL HAS DEFICIT. Vancouver, Jan. 12.—With 1,300 beds and always from 900 to 1,000 inpatients to be cared for, Vancouver General Hospital has a deficit of \$120,000 for the past year, according to the statement of Dr. M. T. MacEachern, medical superintendent. However, this, he said, compares favorably with many of the institutions of the same nature in Eastern and Middle Canada. Toronto's hospital, with 750 beds, has a deficit of \$150,000; Winnipeg will show a deficit of \$80,000 to \$90,000, and Calgary's hospital has a shortage of \$250,000 to cope with. Dr. MacEachern said the united hospital committee estimated that the cost per day per patient was \$1.75, while the per capita cost for patients at the Vancouver hospital averaged for the year \$3.25 per day. The hospitals of British Columbia were very optimistic as to the future, as, in view of the quick decline of the cost of materials, many financial difficulties would be removed in the present year. Mayor Weaver, Hespeler, withdrew his name at the Mayoralty nomination, and Reeve D. N. Farnham becomes Mayor by acclamation.

Court of Appeal.

The case of Aghion vs. Stevens, details of which were reported in The Times yesterday, is still occupying the attention of the Court of Appeal to-day.

To Meet Ward Seven.—Reeve Watson will address the voters of Ward Seven this evening at the Tillicum School, when the work of the past year, taxation questions, and the criticism of the waterworks by-law will be dealt with.

To Attack By-law.—A meeting will be held at the Tolmie School this evening, when opponents of the water by-law will make a strong attack on the scheme. Supporters of A. E. Hall, sr., for the Reevehip will speak and Councillor-elect Ormond and candidates for the Police Commission will be invited.

Gets Six Months.—Mrs. Milward, who, with Mrs. Wigust was found guilty in the Police Court on a charge of theft and whose case was appealed to the County Court, was this morning sentenced to six months' imprisonment, Judge Lampan having upheld the conviction. Mrs. Wigust was not in a condition to appear in court, and on the doctor's report her case was stood over until to-morrow or Friday.

Case is Dismissed.—In the County Criminal Court this morning His Honor Judge Lampan dismissed the case brought against Russell Ferguson, a young man charged with the charge of having carnal knowledge of a girl under fourteen years of age. It was declared that there was no corroborative evidence to substantiate the charge. J. E. Brandon appeared for the prosecution and Harold Beckwith for the defence.

Not in Accord.—This afternoon a deputation of members of the Central Ratepayers' Association of Saanich is discussing with Francis Simpson, candidate for the Council for Ward Seven, his attitude towards the candidates for the Reevehip and the waterworks by-law. The Association has gone on record as supporting Reeve Watson, and also the waterworks by-law. Mr. Simpson has stated that he is opposed to the Association on both these endorsements, and it is probable that should he refuse to change his attitude, the Central Ratepayers will withdraw their endorsement of Mr. Simpson.

OPPONENTS TO PRESENT REEVE OUTLINE PLANS

Saanich Election Meeting at Royal Oak Last Evening

At the Royal Oak Hall last night a meeting of some thirty ratepayers of Ward Five, Saanich, were addressed by Reeve Watson, who was supported by A. E. Hall, jr., on behalf of the candidature of A. E. Hall sr. for the Reevehip.

The gathering was assured that, if elected Reeve, Mr. Hall would make such great improvements in the management of the municipal business as to assure that, while a one mill rate reduction was possible, at any rate there would be no raise in the tax rate, while the additional expenditures made possible would include special provision for grading all the lateral roads of Saanich, greater ward appropriations for the rural wards, an increased appropriation for new schools, more money for the School Board, the institution of an inspected system of septic tanks where needed, and many other suggested improvements.

Not Pertinent. Chairman J. Brydon asked the speaker "where is that money to be come from," and Trustee Holloway objected to a reference to the School Board staff proposals as being out of place, charging that the Hall was elected as Reeve he would find plenty of other matters to occupy his time without concerning himself with the administration and staff of the School Board.

From the floor an interrupter claimed that the inner wards are now getting the expenditure of the greater part of the funds raised from Saanich as a whole, and demanded how the candidate would meet the demand for an easing of rural tax burdens when his proposals would cost thousands of dollars additional to the present expenditures.

The speaker retorted that, by the improvement a business administration would introduce, such expenditures would result in no increase in the tax rate, and after referring to the heckling he had received at Gordon Head and the delegation present was following him around to continue the process, he launched into an attack upon the water extension by-law.

APPEAL MADE FOR STARVING CHINESE

Local Relief Committee Relates Tragic Incidents of Famine-stricken Area

An appeal on behalf of the stricken peoples of northern China who are facing starvation and death as a result of famine conditions is being made by the local Committee of the Chinese Famine Relief. This committee is representative of the local churches. As a result of a recent appeal the sum of \$1,255.40, raised by one of the city congregations was wired to Toronto yesterday by Rev. Dr. Sippell, pastor of the Metropolitan Methodist Church.

A member of the committee makes the following statement: "A personal investigation in the famine district on October 9 revealed the following facts as to one family. They had come to the end of their resources. The wife went to a neighbor to borrow food. She prepared a good meal, and when it was half-eaten told the husband and family that she had poisoned the food. They ate it and awaited death rather than die of slow starvation. "Starving families have sold their clothes for food and a northern winter is upon them. Food, clothing, medicine and medical aid must reach them or they must die. And all this can be done if Christian America will meet the terrible need.

"This is no time to enquire into causes and occasions, or to suggest reforms in the Chinese methods of social and governmental control. This is the time for the open hand and the generous heart. There are local appeals that seem imperative at times but none are as tragic as implied in the starving-conditions of millions of the human race, where a thousand a day die for want of food. One dollar a month will keep a child from starvation or from a life of shame. Let us as citizens of our fair city bestir ourselves and make the influence of our generosity known and felt among these needy people of the earth.

"Every church, club, lodge, and all other institutions in this city ought to make some effort to meet this need."

Referring to the recommendation made by Mayor Porter in his annual report that the city water rate should be lowered as the costs of the waterworks system were reduced. Alderman Patrick recalled that the Mayor had voted, with a majority of the Council this year to raise the rate. "The net minimum was \$1," he said. Since that time, he remarked, the Board of Trade had been reorganized, and it had been his pleasure to make an active part in the campaign for new members. "And it will certainly be my pleasure and privilege, if I am elected," he continued, "to co-operate with the Board of Trade in devising ways and means of advancing the city's interests. I believe that the Mayor and Council will be able to get excellent results in many matters by co-operating with business men and being ready to hear their suggestions. In addition if the Board of Trade, as I understand it plans to do, forms an entertainment committee to welcome prominent visitors to the city, I shall be happy to co-operate with it both officially and unofficially in all efforts to entertain strangers and show them the beauties of Victoria."

The steamship Amur is now in drydock at Esquimalt, where Messrs. Yarrow, Ltd., are fitting a new propeller made for the vessel here.

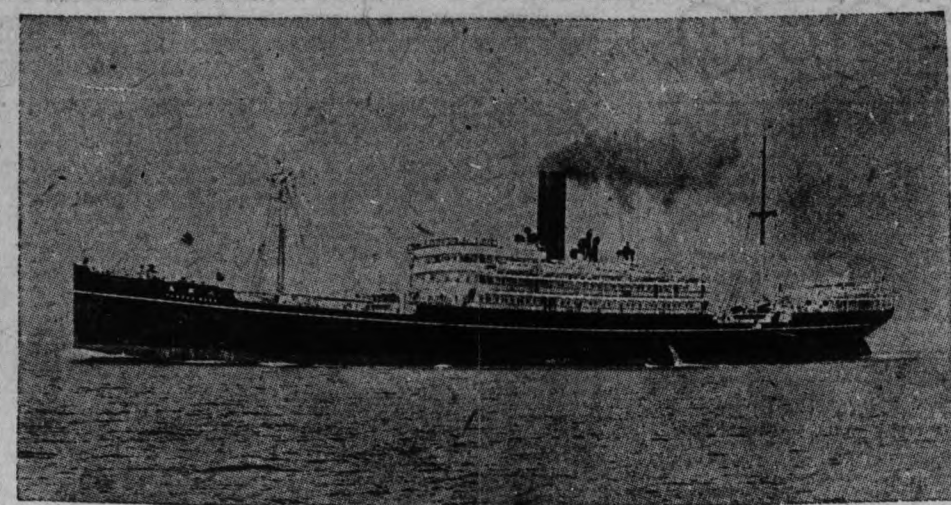

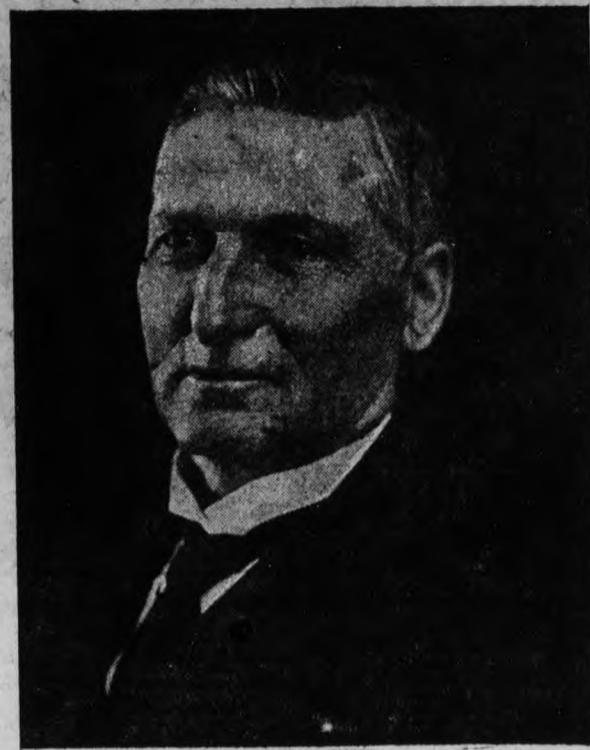

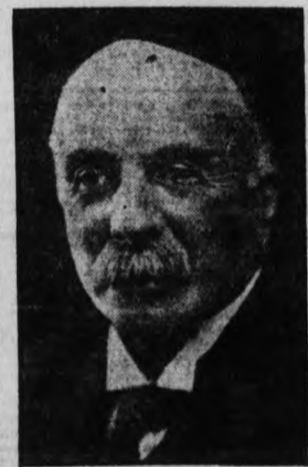

POLICE HELPLESS AT NORTH MEETING

headquarters and was told I must put it in writing. I then wrote to The Times and The Colonist, but of course they wouldn't publish it because it was true.

Get Off the Earth.

"The following Tuesday I again met the man with the chameleons and told him if I couldn't make money in a better way than that I would get off the earth. A crowd of about 300 people gathered. A young boy said I was right and I said, 'You come along with me and we will have a drink.' He said, 'Have another,' and I said, 'No, I have to telephone.' I phoned Chief Langley and told him about the case of cruelty to animals and he said, 'Oh, I have one at home, it catches flies. Come to my office, we will talk it over.'

"We then had another drink and when we went out on the street there were about 500 people with a policeman standing there wondering what was the matter. I walked up to him and he asked if I had caused the disturbance, and I said, 'Yes, and I demand to be arrested.' He said, 'Go away,' but I insisted and so he said, 'All right, come on.' He called the patrol, although I told him there was no need of it. I could walk, and he put me in as drunk and disorderly. I was not allowed to use the phone, and when my case came up I found it was a hard thing to get people to give evidence against a policeman's evidence.

"I spoke to Chief Langley and tried to get the case withdrawn, but it couldn't be done and I was fined again.

The Crazy Old Lady.

"My next experience was in San Francisco. I was walking down the street and a dear old lady was leaning up against a wall, groaning. I wondered what was the matter, so I walked up to her and said, 'Are you sick or are you selling something?' She said, 'No, I am crazy. I want to commit suicide.' (Laughter).

"Now, this is no laughing matter,

gentlemen. I thought, well, this is pretty good. She said she had lost her husband and little boy and wanted to jump overboard, but there were too many people around. I talked to that lady for two or three hours until someone with authority could come along and take charge of her.

"Finally I said, 'Come on lady, let's take a little walk,' and as we went along I met an old Victorian and later a policeman appeared. I tried to tell him what was wrong and he said, 'Mind your own business, if you don't run along I will smash your head in,' or words to that effect. I went to the hotel as fast as I could get there.

"Next day I went to police headquarters to explain the matter, but was blocked at every turn.

Tickled to Death.

"Vancouver is my best story. It was in 1911 I think and the Minto Cup games were on. I says to myself, 'Joe, you go down and buy ten tickets and make some money.' I went down town and sold those tickets for \$2 and made \$1 on each of them. As I was about to sell two of them a plain clothes man grabbed them and I grabbed them back. I like to see a good game, and I thought I was going to occupy one of those seats, but I was arrested and taken in the patrol wagon to the station and charged as drunk and disorderly.

"I had \$55 or \$70 in my pocket and asked for bail, but was refused. I asked to use the phone and was refused. I bothered them so much that they put me in a little cell all by myself. I insisted on a change and was taken out and put in the dungeon.

"Later I was given a Jap and a drunk for company. The drunk picked on the Jap and I said, 'Look here old chap, there are three of us here together, behave yourself.' Then he picked on me and I called for help. Two policemen knocked me down, and kicked me on the head. The row started again and finally they put me in another cell. "From this cell I could see the po-

licemen bringing men in. They would strike them on one side of the face and then on the other. They would go down, big-bang-woof-woof. Finally a friend came along and got me out minus a hat and with my clothes all torn."

Police Helpless.

The speaker dealt at considerable length with his experiences on the local dock where he is engaged in boosting for hotels. Frequent altercations took place between the candidate and C.P.R. Constable Adams and also the local police. One day he had a "few words" with Adams which resulted in a chase around the dock and a call for the patrol, but I happened to be away when it arrived and they went without me," said the speaker. This resulted in a summons being served for creating a disturbance.

"Next day a gentleman called my attention to the condition of Mr. Adams (he never takes a drink you know) and suggested that I should report him but I refused. When my case was called I told Adams I wanted to talk to him but he would not listen to me. What I wanted to tell him was that we were both in the same boat and he had better not go too fast. I was fined \$10.

"Later on Adams ran me in again for being drunk. Oh, there's lots of it," said the speaker as the audience was convulsed with laughter. On another occasion when he was addressing tourists and telling them which hotel to go to he was arrested, and the patrol was called. The officer said, 'Come along, you are drunk. I went to step into the wagon—you know where the step is—and he pushed me and I flensed the step and fell in. I came right up again and said: 'Officer don't do that!' When my case came up the charge was changed again to creating a disturbance but I beat them out that time."

Mr. North referred to the seizure of "perfectly good liquors" from Henry Emmert and criticized the police for not returning it to the place from which it was taken after the judge had declared that it should not have been seized. The speaker said that Emmert had witnesses who were prepared to swear that when the liquor was returned it contained twenty parts liquor and eighty parts water. "The question is, where did it go to?"

The case of Mr. Chilton, better known as "Winnipeg," was then referred to and the claim was made that Chilton had been arrested with-



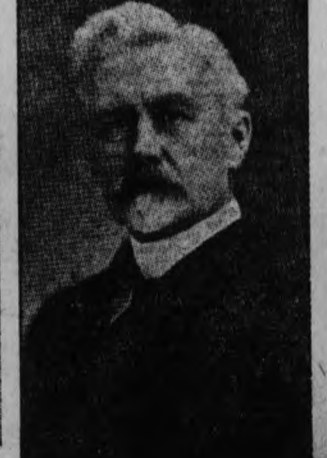

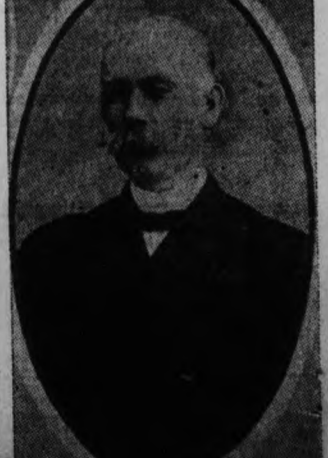

out any justification and he was innocent of any wrong-doing. A poor man's lawyer was needed, said Mr. North. "If we can afford to pay a prosecutor to make an innocent man guilty, we can afford to pay for a poor man's lawyer to defend him."

The speaker referred to the gambling that was permitted in Chinatown, and promised, if elected, to put this down by putting plain clothes men on the job who would be unknown to the Chinese, "and I would not put

it on the slate so that the inside policemen would know what I was doing."

will you guarantee not to bring any undue pressure to bear on saloon-keepers and policemen to take out life insurance? Have you in the past or are you now connected with any institution handling intoxicants? Will you swear that you have never stood up to a bar and bought the drinks, thus falling to practice what you preach, Prohibition?"

Mrs. Hood, candidate for the City Council, addressed the meeting briefly and confined her remarks to a complaint about a child that was taken from her custody, allegedly without authority. James Parfitt acted as chairman, and Mr. North who paid for the theatre, extended a general invitation to any other candidates to speak. The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.
