ELECTION TALK STILL PERSISTS

London Times Says Machinery Being Prepared

London, Jan. 29.—Lloyd George, says The London Times, has sent instructions from Paris for the coalition party machinery to be ready for a general election in May or June after introduction of the budget early in April.
It appears, the newspaper comments, that the Prime Minister and the Chancellor of the Exchequer have decided it is possible to introduce a budget of £250,000,000, which would allow a considerable remission of taxation, and thus afford a favorable opportunity for appealing to the country.
The tide of unemployment is still flowing, the ranks of those without work registered at the labor exchanges throughout the kingdom, which were close to a million on January 21, having increased by 60,000 in the course of the week just passed. These figures are exclusive of those who are working on short time.
As many of the South Wales mines are closing down owing to virtual cessation of coal exports to France and elsewhere, the labor situation is bound to become worse.
After hearing proposals by mine owners and the men for future regulation of wages, the Miners' Federation conference sort the proposals to the coal districts for local consideration. The Federation announced its intention to fight any arrangements for reduced wages on the ground of reduction of output, maintaining that the miners have no control over the circumstances arising out of the Spa agreement, which resulted in France becoming flooded with coal, while German industries are denuded and British export trade has stopped. The Federation will urge pooling of profits for stabilization of the industry.
Winston Spencer Churchill, new Secretary for the Colonies, will inherit the estate of Lord Herbert Vane-Tempest, his cousin, who died from injuries received in a railroad collision near Abermule, Wales, January 26, according to The Daily Mail. The estate, Garron Tower, Antrim, is said to yield £5,000 annually. Political circles, says The Daily Mail, are eagerly discussing the possibility that Mr. Churchill will now aspire to become the leader of a political party and ultimately Prime Minister.

NO ENCOURAGEMENT FOR OIL SEEKERS

Government Orders Relative to Fort Norman Area

Edmonton, Jan. 29.—The only way to get into the North this coming Spring and Summer, by any route, will be to qualify for, secure and carry clearance papers from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. There will be no such thing as booking passage without them, and there will be no open door to the oil country on any other terms. No flying machine of any type will be permitted to leave for the Mackenzie territory without clearing the police, or without each of its passengers being certified by a medical officer as physically and mentally fit to make the trip. These orders were officially confirmed here, Staking Suspended.
Dawson, Y. T., Jan. 25.—Special parties that have been outfitting here preparatory to rushing 600 miles over the snow with dog teams and toboggans and supplies to stake oil lands in the Fort Norman district, will probably abandon or defer their trip because of telegraphic advices from Ottawa, received by Gold Commissioner G. Mackenzie, that the Federal Government had suspended, until further notice, privileges for staking or otherwise acquiring oil lands in the Northwest Territories.
The Gold Commissioner has passed the notification on to several interested parties, notably one of many men which had received Hootalinqua en route from Victoria, on behalf of British Columbia investors.

OPPOSITION TO TRADE AGREEMENT

London, Jan. 29.—The draft of the Anglo-Russian trade agreement which Leonid Krasin, Soviet representative in England, submitted to the executive council at Moscow is encountering strong opposition on the part of Tchitcherin, Litvinoff and their associates. The London Times says it learns.
The extremists, the newspaper declares, insist that full political recognition of the Soviet Government first be forthcoming.
Krasin, however, does not lack support in his stand for the acceptance of the trade agreement immediately on the ground that it may lead to further negotiations.
He always has been close to Lenin, the Soviet Premier, and defeat of the plan would suggest the waning of the Premier's powers, according to The Times.

FURTHER TROUBLE PREDICTED IN EAST

Philadelphia, Jan. 29.—Men will still have to face death fighting for or against the stability and continuity of the decision made in the treaty of Sevres with respect to Palestine, Syria and Mesopotamia. Dr. Wm. Westermann, of the University of Wisconsin, declared last night before The Philadelphia Public Ledger Forum, in an address on the peace conference.
Dr. Westermann was chief of the Near Eastern division of the American Peace Commission.
"Yet the four results of the Turkish treaty and other negotiations which accompanied it, and are virtually a part of it, are, on the whole, to be rated as a gain to the Greeks, to the Arab peoples, to the Jews, to the Turks themselves, and to the world at large," he continued.
Dr. Westermann charged the United States with being directly responsible for the plight of Armenia "by default of service."
Pointing out America's weakness of position in dealing with all Near Eastern affairs, as it had not declared war on Turkey, he deplored the nation's refusal to accept a mandate for Armenia.
Speaking of the policy of "no tangling alliances," he said: "Caution justified at the turning of the nineteenth century has become a counsel of cowardice in the twentieth century. . . . When boldness, confidence in the strength of our own political integrity and active support of a new political ideal might have saved Armenia, and with it the Near East, we held back. President Wilson is not responsible for this. We are; we, the people of the United States."

JAPAN REPLIES TO NOTE FROM STATES

Tokio, Jan. 29.—The Japanese answer to the note of the United States Government concerning the recent killing of Lieut. Warren H. Langdon in Vladivostok has been forwarded to Washington.
According to information here, the reply does not discuss the question of Japanese occupation of Siberia. It reiterates regret over the shooting, and calls attention to the measures already adopted to prevent the recurrence of such an unfortunate incident. The communication emphasizes the completeness and impartiality of the investigation into the shooting now in progress, which, it says, will be followed by such reparations as the circumstances call for.
Although the shooting was an outgrowth of the presence of Japanese troops in Vladivostok, the Japanese apparently think it should be treated as a separate and distinct question, not connected with Japan's policy with regard to Russia.
The authorities denied the statement published by The Asahi Shimbun to the effect that the police had decided to show greater surveillance over American visitors, who, the newspaper asserted, were busily engaged in investigating industrial and military conditions.
American visitors, the authorities declared, were welcome in Japan, and would not be molested.

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PRESENTING THE BILL.

In spite of a very determined objection to do anything of the kind the French Premier has permitted the Allied Supreme Council to present Germany with her bill and the terms upon which she must liquidate her obligations.

The sum which Germany must pay by way of reparation is a staggering amount; but it does not represent anything like the cost of the damage done in France and Belgium. Nor does an agreement upon the amount and the manner of payment guarantee that Germany will accept the terms which are now to be presented to her.

The consummation of this agreement upon reparation is a fortunate ending to what had all the appearance of developing into a breach between Great Britain and France.

IS IT FEASIBLE?

If a dispatch from Ottawa correctly interprets the opinion of the Minister of Justice it will be necessary for the Legislature of British Columbia to ask the Dominion Government to take a plebiscite upon the question of whether or not the importation of liquor into this Province shall cease.

That appears to be the meaning of the Doherty Act although such a plebiscite would seem to be possible only in territory in which prohibitory law is operative.

But the interesting point upon which the lay mind may feel inclined to speculate is the feasibility of a plebiscite in this case which could be interpreted as differentiating between the Provincial Government as an importer for use and the private citizen.

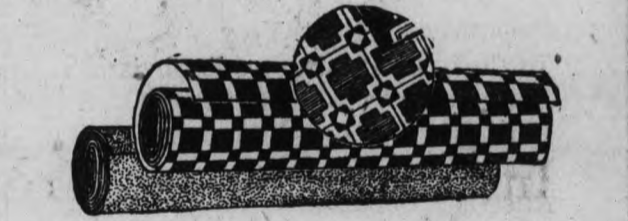

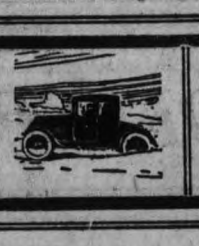

What The Experts Say

One way of discovering the source of lost compression, whether it is through the valves or piston rings, is to feel the crank-case after the engine has been running.

If the leak occurs near the rings, the crank-case will be unusually warm, due to the presence within of hot gases, while if the rings fit well and the leak occurs through the valves no heat in the crank-case will be noticeable.

In replacing electric headlight bulbs, adjust them so that a point or beam of light strikes the ground ahead.

If the bulb is placed too far from the reflector, a dark spot will appear in the light, and if the bulb is too close to the reflector the result will be too wide a light and one which will not penetrate the darkness any great distance away.

A small amount of gasoline, if left standing a considerable length of time even in a closed tank, will lose its igniting efficiency because of chemical changes and evaporation.

Besides the numerous patent carbon removers on the market, a good way and a simple one to clean carbon from cylinder heads and tops of pistons is to pour denatured alcohol into the cylinders through the spark plug openings after the engine is run enough to make it warm.

Run the engine for a few minutes after the application.

The alcohol softens the carbon and tends to free it from the metal surfaces, aided by within the cylinders.

NEW OLDSMOBILE REACHES VICTORIA

Four-cylinder Type Made in Canada Arouses Great Interest

A new Oldsmobile four-cylinder car which reached the city yesterday to the order of Kilpatrick-Moryson, constitutes a new departure in Oldsmobile manufacture. It is a miniature of the big 8-cylinder Oldsmobile in every way, and is the first of the 4-cylinder type turned out by the Canadian concern at their Oshawa plant.

The new four-cylinder type applies to roadsters and touring cars, and another news item of interest is that the factories will in two or three months' time turn out an 8-cylinder five passenger car.

The 4-cylinder roadster is built on the European plan of body, which means that the back deck opens up for two emergency seats. In San Francisco, where this new car has just arrived, no less than 1,500 people visited the show rooms in the first four days to inspect the model. Vancouver had a demonstration yesterday, when the show rooms there were crowded.

The car weighs 2,800 pounds, and is built on sturdy lines. A remarkable point about the car is its lack of vibration, according to experts who have investigated the matter. The new model seems to be entirely free from this, no matter what speed is taken.

FUR DEPARTMENT LOOKS TO TIME OF RETURN HERE

C. H. French Foresees Day Hudson's Bay Co. Returns Fur Headquarters Here

The fur headquarters of the Hudson's Bay Company, located for so many years in the well-known building on Wharf Street, will be transferred to Vancouver by midday on Monday next.

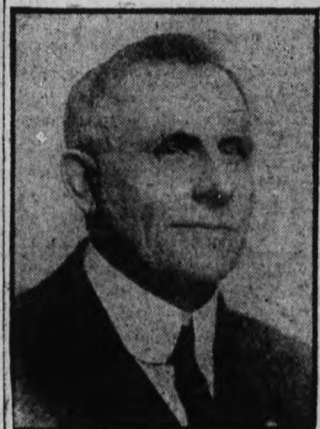
The building will not be vacant for more than a very short time, however, as it will become the temporary receiving station for the handling of goods for the new department store on Douglas Street, and will be so used until the new building is in full operation.

The lands department of the Hudson's Bay Company will be located here, in the Pemberton Building. In an interview to-day Mr. French, the local manager, said:

"In 1843 the Hudson's Bay Company found it necessary for the better handling of the fur trade, to build a fort and establish its Pacific Coast headquarters at the southeastern end of Vancouver Island, because there was then no overland railroad or commercial communication established between Winnipeg and the coast."

"Winnipeg was the centre of activities on the east side of the mountains, while Victoria became the centre of activities on this coast, owing to the fact of Victoria being the point at which ocean-going crafts landed their cargoes for distribution by smaller boats to the west, north, east and south."

"At that time this section was officially known as the 'Western Department' and was divided into six districts named Oregon, Thompson River, Cariboo, New Caledonia, Fort

Simpson and Victoria, all having a central point from which they were managed, while in turn all six districts took their instructions from the head of the department, Victoria.

Many Changes Since
"In the course of time all districts lost their identity by having the posts in them closed. In cases where only one or two posts remained in a district they were put under the management of the adjoining district so as to allow of one district being closed. New Caledonia was the last to lose its identity, while to-day, mostly on account of overland transportation, all the remaining posts on the Pacific Coast are grouped into one district, with Victoria as the head. The Western Department has also disappeared, Winnipeg being the executive office."

"These changes are simply what should be expected as the country develops from a purely fur trade organization to that of a full-grown commercial organization."

"During the past few years the Western Arctic trade has grown to very considerable proportions, so much so that the company, instead of chartering a vessel to carry supplies to the far north as in the past has now built a fine auxiliary schooner, the 'Lady Kindersley,' to carry on the trade. Practically all of the supplies are shipped from the East, and Vancouver is, for the purpose of an assembly point, somewhat better situated than Victoria, as the cars can be unloaded right alongside the supply ship. This is the principal reason for the transfer of the fur trade headquarters to the Mainland."

"As the Pacific Coast grows in population, I can see that more and more goods imported from Europe will arrive in ships, and it is them, that will be the main reason for the transfer of the headquarters to the Mainland."

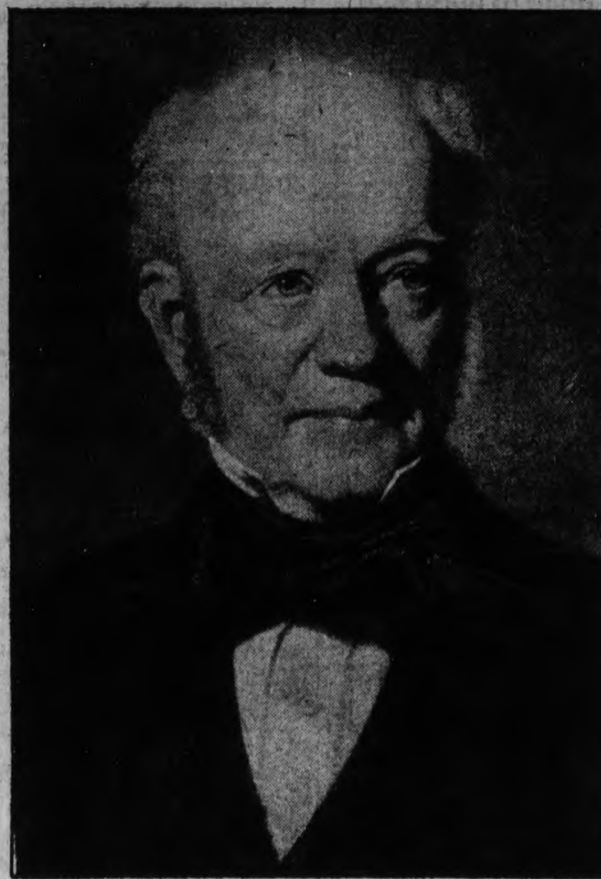

Reproduction of Historic Painting Housed Here for Many Years, To Be Removed to Mainland



An interesting incident of the removal of the Fur Department of the Hudson's Bay Company to Vancouver is the transfer of the famous portrait of Sir George Simpson, one of the most successful Governors ever controlling the policies of the Honorable Company of Adventurers. Mr. French said that the portrait was one of the most treasured possessions of the fur department, and would accompany the Pacific Coast headquarters wherever located. "Even if we were to go to Prince Rupert, that picture would go with us," was his dictum, when it was suggested that Victoria city might wish to see such a historical moment stay here, possibly in the care of the enlarged lands department of the company.

This portrait of Sir George Simpson is one of four painted in 1843 at the conclusion of his historic tour around the world. Three of these paintings were sent to Canada, the fourth being given to the great Governor's relations.

Of the three distributed in Canada, one was hung in the Victoria headquarters, one at Moose Factory and the other at York Factory. With the closing of Moose Factory that portrait came into the possession of the

Winnipeg offices, where it is one of the most prized possessions of the prairie headquarters, and with the transfer of the Victoria painting to Vancouver the only copy remaining where originally hung will be that at York Factory.

Far-Sighted Statesman
Sir George Simpson was the able statesman-governor who had so much to do with curbing the ravages which the liquor traffic had been working, prior to his tour, among the Indians of the north. His interest in mitigating the troublesome fighting and murdering caused him to make a special trip to the Russian-Alaskan headquarters at Sitka, where he induced Governor Ekholm to agree to a convention whereby, for the first time in history, involuntary protection from alcoholism was afforded for the benefit of native tribes.

Up to the company into effect of this agreement, in 1843, the Russian-Alaskan Company had made liquor sales a principal source of traffic with the Indians of the north, and the Factors of the Hudson's Bay Company had, in similar manner, supplied liquor to the natives in the course of ordinary trade.

BALZAC A PARADOX, LECTURER DECLARES

Professor Ashton Describes Author in Address Here

The bewildering contradictions found in "Balzac, the Man," were admirably described in a lecture delivered by Professor Ashton, head of the Department of French in the University of British Columbia, under the auspices of Victoria College at the High School last night.

In Balzac, said Dr. Ashton, one found side by side masterful genius and petty vanity; greatness of intellect and childish egotism; generosity and selfishness; fastidiousness and vulgarity. Descriptions of Balzac varied according as the biographer was friend or enemy. How great was the variation Dr. Ashton showed by lantern pictures, some of them representing Balzac as short, pudgy, vulgarly over-dressed, ill-groomed and with a repulsive expression of self-satisfaction radiating from his features. Other pictures showed the author as a picturesque, handsome man, inclined to stolidity and with a keen, humorous expression which harmonized with the anecdotes told of his gallantries and pleasantries.

Balzac, said Dr. Ashton, was at once a realist and a mystic, a positivist and a symbolist; a dreamer and one who delighted in facts. The lecturer traced Balzac's early life, recounting his continual struggles against debt and poverty. Dominant above all else, he said, was the energy of the man—a mental as well as a physical force which impelled him onward in the face of many disappointments and gave him strength to work up the last hours of his life. In the course of the lecture the audience was shown some proofs of Balzac's manuscript—proofs which explained clearly why the author was the despair of printers. Dr. E. Paul, Principal of the College, introduced Dr. Ashton and announced that the next lecture would be by Professor Eastman on February 18.

PARTY POLITICS BEST

Gives Elector Definite and Established Policy, Says J. J. Shallcross.

Party politics is better than any other kind yet devised for expressing the will of the majority in government. J. J. Shallcross told members of the Conservative Women's Educational and Social Club last night.
