"We have got to watch the interests of the ratepayers as a whole, and it is your duty to go out and get the gen-eral public solidly behind the Associ-ation," Alderman Sangster, the chair-man, told the delegation. "The Es-timates Committee will hold its first inteeting next Thursday and the Asso-ciation's grant will be discussed as early as possible." J. C. Pendray, president of the De-velopment Association, Frank Higgins, KC, and J. D. O'Connell presented the Association's case. Mr. Pendray pointed out that the

Mr. Pendray pointed out that the Association could not plan its year's work properly if it did not know in the near future exactly what finan-cial backing it could'expect from the city. The total revenue of the As-sociation last year, he said, was \$16,500. City in Real Estate Business. "The city needs advertising now as

City in Real Estate Business. "The city needs advertising now as it never did before" he declared. "The Corporation has been forced into the real estate business and it must have people here to buy land. Victoria has everything necessary for the building of a big city. All we need is people. People will bring indus-tries and advertising will bring peo-nle."

Mr. Pendray produced for the ben-efit of the aldermen a large number of publications which, as a result of the work of the Association, carried articles about Victoria written by Mrs. Shaw. "As soon as we drop advertising we drop out of the world," affirmed Mr. Thomson, pointing out that Victoria, on account of its geographical posi-tion, lay more or less out of the di-rect line of trade. Mr. Thomson told of the excellent work accomplished by the Association last year and pointed to the enormous amount of publicity it had secured free from the great railway companies.
