






SAY HINDUS IN **FIJI MISTREATED**

Commissioners Sent by Government of India Report

(Times Correspondence.) Sydney, Australia, May 16.—Condi-tions in the Fiji Island, whence New Zealand and Australia get their sugar, are in a bad way, according to the re-port of Pundit Schrema, a representa-tive of the Government of India sent out specially with two other Hindus to investigate the grievances of the Hindu coolies employed there. Recently Dr. Manilal, a Hindu law-yer, was deported from Fiji because

yer, was deported from Fiji because of his advocacy of the cause of the Hindus, and the New Zealand benchers refused him permission to prac-tice in New Zealand because of his

Thirty-six Cents a Day. Now the report of the Indian mission confirms his charges.

Natives. The Australian natives of the "back blocks" are still holding their own, according to the Australian Aborigines Protection Department, but elsewhere contact with the whites is ruining them. They are the oldest race in the world and capable, ac-cording to Government inspectors, of being civilized in several generations. One native, Europeanized, is a man of exceptional genius, says the reports.
