PARCEL POST WEIGHT LIMIT

The weight limit within the Local, 1st, 2nd and 3rd Zones is seventy (70) pounds, within the other Zones it is fifty (50) pounds and the size limit eighty-four (84) inches for combined length and largest girth.

Packages of seed weighing 8 oz. or less can be forwarded anywhere in the U. S. at a cost of one and a half cents for each two ounces, or fraction thereof.

ASPARAGUS

One ounce to 50 feet of drill; 5 pounds to the acre.

Sow in March or April, in good mellow soil, after soaking the seed 24 hours in warm water, in drills one foot apart, and one inch deep. During the summer keep the soil mellow and free from weeds, thinning the plants to 4 inches apart. The following spring transplant into permanent beds that have been dug and highly manured.

The ground should be well manured and deeply spaded. The roots planted 2 feet apart, 1 foot apart in the row, and at least 6 inches deep. These will be ready to use in 1 or 2 years.

BEANS

Earliest varieties, ready for table in 40 days; 1 pound to 100 feet of drill; 1½ bushels per acre.

The soil best adapted to beans is a light, rich, well-drained loam; which was manured for the previous crop. Beans are extremely sensitive to both cold and wet and it is useless to plant them before the ground has become dry and warm. The largest returns will result from planting in drills from two to three feet apart and leaving the plants two to six inches in the row. Up to the time of blossoming they should have frequent shallow cultivation. Never hoe when the vines are wet, as the pods will rust and become discolored. For succession plant every two weeks.

These are more tender than the Dwarf beans and planting should be delayed about a week longer. Set a stout stake about 8 feet long, firmly in the center of each hill, leaving four plants to a hill.

The Bush Limas are quite desirable for the garden, as their cultivation does away with poles. These should be planted edgewise with the eyes down and two inches deep. Plant June 1.

One ounce to 100 feet of drill; 5 to 7 lbs., to acre in drills. The early turnip varieties are ready for the table in from 50 to 60 days from sowing of seed. The best results are obtained on a deep rich, sandy loam, in freshly prepared soil which should be pressed firmly over the seed. In dry weather soak seed 24 hours before planting.

BROCCOLI

The culture is the same in all essentials as for cauliflower, in fact, it is a good deal like cauliflower. It is grown most successfully where the season is long, cool, and rather moist. One of the most valuable features is that it withstands greater extremes of temperature than cauliflower.

CABBAGE

One ounce to 5,000 plants; 2 ounces to transplant an acre. Ready for table in from 100 to 160 days from seed, according to varieties.

For early summer use sow in hotbed in February or March. Before transplanting to the open ground they should be hardened off by exposing them gradually to the night air. For winter use sow in open ground in May or June, taking care in either case not to let the plants stand too closely, as this makes them "spindling." When five or six inches high, transplant in rows two feet apart one way, and 12 to 18 inches the other way, according to variety, burying to the first leaf, whatever the stem length. Hoe frequently, drawing the earth up about the plants until they begin to head.

Any good land if thoroughly and deeply worked will produce satisfactory crops. Sow as early as the ground can be worked, sow the smaller kinds in rows 16 to 18 inches apart. For field culture sow in drills 18 to 24 inches apart.

These are undoubtedly the most valuable of all the roots usually grown for stock. They are more nutritious than turnips and nearly all animals like them and are benefited by them.

Sweet corn being liable to rot in cold, wet ground should not be planted before May, or until the ground is warm; nothing is gained in time, and much is lost in quality by planting too soon.

One pound will plant 100 hills; 12 to 15 pounds to the acre in hills.

CUCUMBERS

One ounce to 50 hills; 2 to 3 lbs. to the acre. Earliest variety ready for table use in 50 to 55 days from seed. Main crop in 65 to 75 days.

As soon as the weather becomes settled and warm, plant in hills 4 to 6 feet apart each way, with 8 or 10 seeds in a hill, cover half an inch deep, smoothing the hill off with the hoe. Keep the soil well stirred, and when the plants are out of danger of insects, leave 3 or 4 plants to a hill.

CELERY

One ounce to 3,000 plants or 200 feet of drill.

Sow the seed (which is slow to germinate) in shallow boxes or hotbed, cover the seed not too deep. Keep the bed moist, almost wet, until the seeds germinate. When about four inches, thin out and transplant so that they may stand three inches apart, when the plants are four inches high, cut of the tops, which will cause them to grow stocky. The essentials to success in celery growing are rich soil and plenty of water. The best results are usually obtained from setting about the middle of June or the first of July.

GARDEN HERBS

Herbs delight in a rich, mellow soil. Those marked with an * are perennial. Sow early in spring in shallow drills, one foot apart; when up a few inches thin out; cut just before they come into full blossom, tie in bunches and hang up or spread thinly.

GARDEN PEAS

Culture—You will have the best results with early peas on light, warm soil, but the main crop will do better on a fairly heavy soil that will retain moisture. Avoid too much nitrogen fertilizer such as fresh manure, as that causes heavy vine growth at expense of pods. A plot prepared the fall before is best. Sow early kinds, as soon as possible in rows 2 to 3 inches deep and 2½ to 3½ feet apart, and for succession every two weeks until June 15th. The very earliest varieties, planted in August, will often give a good fall crop.

The taller varieties will do better if supported by bush or wire. Some plant in double rows (6 inches apart) and support the two together. The smooth sorts are hardiest, but wrinkled varieties are of better quality. Planting distances and depth depend on variety and type of soil. Those marked * are wrinkled and sweet.

ALFALFA

Alfalfa is a perennial plant of upright growth, sometimes 3 feet high. The nature of the leaves is somewhat like clover, although not as large. The flowers are a purplish blue and appear in sprays. The seeds are small, yellowish green, kidney shaped and of about the size of a pin head.

Suitable Soil—Alfalfa makes a strong and rapid growth on well-drained, rather heavy land, which is supplied with some lime, and where the sub-soil, while not necessarily sand or gravel, is porous. On sandy soil the growth is vigorous, when moisture is abundant but during drought it will suffer unless the roots reach water at a depth of 8 to 10 feet. The land should slope some, as alfalfa will not stand surface water.

Seed Bed—The land must be free from weeds and the ground must be thoroughly pulverized and well packed. Alfalfa will frequently fail if seeded on freshly plowed ground. If it is necessary to plow the ground before seeding, do it early, harrowing thoroughly and sow after a good rain has settled it.

Spring Seeding—Sow seed broadcast or with drill from March to June 15th, at the rate of 15 to 20 pounds to the acre.

Fall Seeding—Disk oat and wheat land as soon as the crop is cut, and then harrow or disk every 10 days until a suitable time for sowing before the 15th day of September, when you can sow as above. Cut for hay the next fall. This is the best time to sow for all except northern states, if you are sure of getting fall rains.

Nebraska Grown Seed—We are right in the center of the largest alfalfa seed-growing district in the United States. Nebraska grown seed has gained for itself a reputation of which we are proud. It is a good plan to inoculate your alfalfa seed with bacteria before sowing.

If seed germinates poorly, one must plant more seed or expect a thin stand. Small, shrunken seed will not produce vigorous plants. Weedy seed means the introduction into the field of plantain, dodder, thistle, mustard or some other pest, ready to take advantage of the fine fertile soil and undo the work of two years' preparation.

ANNUAL FLOWER SEED

General Culture—A rather light and moderately rich soil thoroughly spaded, is most desirable. That the tiny seedlings may be seen and the weeds removed, it is better to plant all flower seeds in rows. Sow the seed evenly in the rows, cover with the finest of soil, about three times the diameter of the seed, and press soil firmly over the seed. Keep covered with cloth or paper till sprouts appear. The soil should never become dry after the seeds have been swelled, for if it does, they will be pretty sure to fail. Do not grow the plants too thick; keep the weeds down and the surface of the soil well stirred with a hoe or rake during the summer, especially if the weather is dry. A great many varieties can be sown in the house, if desired, early, and afterwards transplanted. Most plants will continue to bloom much longer if the flowers are picked, and not allowed to form seed.

Sweet Peas should be sown as soon as the ground can be worked in the Spring. Soil should be thoroughly mixed with a good fertilizer. Make a trench 6 or 8 inches deep, but cover the seed only about an inch, as they come up, rake the dirt around the plant, so that by the time they have reached the top of the ground, the trench will be almost full. Furnish support early. Give them plenty of water, and keep the blossoms picked closely. If they produce seed pods, they will stop blooming.

Two Year Old Field Grown Roses Trimmed and Ready for Planting

As long as the rose exists it will retain its popularity with the human race.

In Preparing a Rose Bed. Select a sunny location guarded from cold north winds, if possible. Dig out the beds to a depth of two or three feet and about three feet in width; then refill the trench with a mixture of soil (any good fertile soil will do) and well rotted manure, making provision for good drainage if location is not naturally drained. Time should be allowed for this filling to settle, the final top surface being an inch or two below the edges of the bed. Do not raise the surface of Rose beds above the surrounding surface. They suffer less from drought when left level with the turf. In planting the roses be particular to press the soil firmly around the roots; and soak the bed thoroughly at the finish. The "Everbloomingers" may be set 18 inches apart the Hybrid Perpetuals about two feet. Protect in winter by covering bed at least six inches with leaves or manure.
