

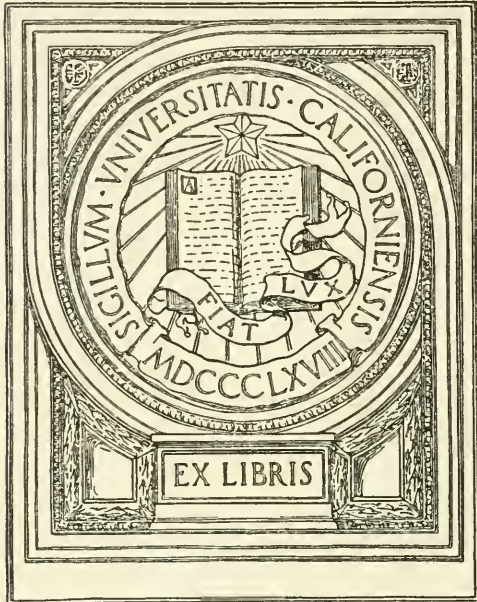

PREFATORY NOTE TO THIRD ISSUE

The present issue has been revised and brought to date.

Some of the topics treated in the material added since the Second Issue of the List include:

Restriction of immigration.—The documents relating to the recent legislation which resulted in the passage of a law regulating the immigration of aliens to the United States, approved Feb. 10, 1907, are noted on pp. 111–112 of this List.

Nature and tendencies of Immigration.—Among the new publications are to be noted Hall's "Immigration and its effects on the United States;" Grose's "Aliens or Americans?" "The Incoming millions." The subject is also discussed by Wells in "The future in America."

Personal experiences among immigrants are Braun's "Immigration abuses;" Steiner's "On the trail of the immigrant."

The subject of *Japanese immigration*, which has recently occupied public attention is treated in a number of magazine articles and in speeches in Congress. These are noted on pp. 90–94 of this List.

PREFATORY NOTE TO THE SECOND ISSUE

The present issue is mainly a reprint from the plates of the first. It has, however, been made to include the publications which have been added to the Library since the first issue by the substitution of recent titles for some of the early and less important works.

The articles in periodicals, Congressional documents, consular reports, etc., have been brought to date.

Among the new publications there are to be noted:

Immigration in its general aspects in the principal countries of the world.—Whelpley's "The problem of the immigrant," in which are reprinted his articles in the "Fortnightly review," vol. 77, pp. 317-326 and the "North American review," vol. 180, pp. 856-867.

Restriction of immigration.—The publications of the Immigration restriction league, noted on pages 28 and 29 of this List; Ward's "The immigration problem" and the same author's essay in the "North American review," vol. 179, pp. 226-237, advocating an educational test; Whelpley in "World's work," vol. 8, pp. 5254-5259, the "Fortnightly review," vol. 77, pp. 317-326, and the "North American review," vol. 180, pp. 856-867, looking upon immigration as an international affair and an agreement among nations as desirable; Ernest Crosby in the "Arena," vol. 32, pp. 596-602 favorable to immigration; McLaughlin in a series of articles in "Popular science monthly," vol. 66, pp. 243-255, 357-361, 531-537, arguing that certain social and political ills are not attributable to the immigrants, describing the method of inspection of immigrants, and advocating a standard of physique as an effective means of preventing undesirable immigration.

Immigration and the poorer classes in cities.—Hunter's "Poverty;" Riis's "The battle with the slums" and "How the other half lives." Consult also numerous articles in the periodical "Charities," published by the Charity organization society, New York.

Two articles by Rambaud in the "Revue de Paris," June 1 and 15, 1905, are of exceptional interest. Bibliography.—The Report of the British Board of trade, published 1893 (noted on page 22 of this List), contains a list of books on immigration into the United States.

PREFATORY NOTE TO THE FIRST ISSUE

The primary purpose of this List is to show material on the history of immigration to this country, with discussions on the economic influence of immigration. The List, however, takes in some works outside of this scope. This is a consequence of noting all the works contained in the section of the shelves devoted to immigration. There are therefore found treatises on emigration from one foreign country to another, as well as political and economic studies based on conditions abroad; handbooks issued by Western states to encourage settlement, which naturally are mere expositions of the resources of the states in question, etc.

The List, is arranged as follows:

List of books, 181 titles; References to articles in periodicals, 259; Congressional documents, 100; Reports of the Commissioner of immigration, etc., 50; Treasury department decisions, 31 entries; and Consular reports, 103 entries.

The *history of Congressional investigation and legislation* concerning immigration is summarized in Senate report no. 1333, 52d Congress, 2d session, which is a general report on proposed restriction of immigration. A list of Congressional documents from 1788-1903 is given on pp. 95-109 of this List. Prior to 1882 it was a question only of encouraging immigration. In that year a law was passed placing some restrictions on immigration. In 1883 a report was presented providing for a commission and joint commission on immigration. A report known as the "Ford committee report" which dealt with contract labor, etc., forms House report no. 3792 of the 50th Congress, 2d session. The testimony taken by the Committee was printed as House miscellaneous document no. 572 of the 50th Congress, 1st session. As a result of investigations in 1890 a voluminous report was published as House report no. 3472, 51st Congress, 2d session. In July, 1892, a report by a Committee which investigated the general subject of immigration and naturalization together with testimony taken was printed as House report no. 2090, 52d Congress, 1st session. The next important report is that issued as Senate report no. 1333, 52d Congress, 2d session. Senator Lodge's report, which advocated making illiteracy an obstacle to immigration, forms Senate report no. 290, 54th Congress, 1st session. The report on the McCall bill, which

forbade the admittance of illiterate males over 16 years of age, is printed as House report no. 1079, 54th Congress, 1st session. The conference report on this bill forms Senate document no. 118, 54th Congress, 2d session. The veto of this bill is printed as Senate document no. 185 of the same session. In 1902 a lengthy report was made by the Senate committee on immigration, which with the testimony taken, was printed as Senate document no. 62, 57th Congress, 2d session. The Act of March 3, 1903, which is characterized as a systematic codification of the various laws relating to immigration, is printed in the Statutes at large, vol. 32, part 1, pp. 1213-1222. The text of the laws down to 1893 is contained in the Annual report of the United States superintendent of immigration for the year ending June 30, 1893. Various editions of the immigration laws are noted on page 29 of this List. A digest of immigration laws and decisions was published by the Bureau of immigration in 1899 as Treasury department document no. 2108. Vol. 15 of the Reports of the Industrial commission, chapter 11, is devoted to "Immigration legislation and its workings."

The laws of foreign countries regarding immigration are treated in Chandèze's "De l'intervention des pouvoirs publics dans l'émigration et l'immigration au XIX^e siècle." Vol. 15 of the Reports of the Industrial commission gives the English text of laws of foreign countries affecting immigration and emigration. *Current statistics* of immigration to the United States are given in the Reports of the Commissioner of immigration. General statistics of immigration of foreign population, based on census reports down to 1900, are given in vol. 15 of the Reports of the Industrial commission. Tabulated statistics showing the number, nationality, sex, age, occupation, and destination, from 1820-1903, are published in the "Monthly summary of commerce and finance" for June, 1903.

Richmond Mayo-Smith's "Emigration and immigration" is a general study of the history of the economic phases of immigration. This work is a summarized history of immigration, with chapters on the economic gain by immigration, the social effects of immigration, and restrictions of immigration, and discusses special methods of regulating immigration. "Immigration and its economic effects," based on a study of conditions in various industries, accompanied by papers on the foreign immigration in New York City and the agricultural distribution of immigrants, is treated at length by John R. Commons in vol. 15 of the Reports of the Industrial commission, pp. 293-743.

A statement of the investigation into the character of immigration made by consular officers of the United States is published in House executive document no. 157, 49th Congress, 2d session, and some of the papers contained in this document are reprinted in "Consular reports," vol. 22, no. 76, April, 1887.

Bromwell's "History of immigration to the United States" is a compendium of statistics on the general subject of immigration up to 1850. Kapp's "Immigration, and the commissioners of emigration" is an exposition of various phases of immigration, particularly as represented by conditions in New York down to 1850.

The subject of alien immigration into Great Britain has been the subject of investigation by a Royal Commission, which made a voluminous report in 1904, printed as Parliamentary papers ed. 1741, 1742, 1743, noted on page 24 of this List.

Writers favoring the *restriction of immigration*, noted in the List of books on immigration, pp. 13-49, are Atehison, Chetwood, De France, Henry George, Strong, Swank, and Walker; favoring immigration is John P. Altgeld. Cadwalader Biddle considers such methods of restriction as will prevent the landing of immigrants likely to become public charges. Philip C. Garrett advises the exercise of caution in obstructing the flow of immigration.

Periodical literature is prolific in discussions of the question of immigration. Among the *articles favoring restriction* may be noted: Boyesen, "Forum," vol. 3, pp. 532-542; Godkin, "Nation," vol. 45, pp. 518-519; Bemis, "Andover review," vol. 9, pp. 251-264; Fox, "Contemporary review," vol. 53, pp. 855-867; Powderly, "North American review," vol. 147, pp. 165-174; Round, "American social science association Journal," vol. 26, pp. 66-78; Coxe, "Forum," vol. 7, pp. 597-608; Round, "Forum," vol. 8, pp. 428-440; Chetwood, "Arena," vol. 2, pp. 268-277; Lodge, "North American review," vol. 152, pp. 27-36, 602-612; Walker, "Forum," vol. 11, pp. 634-644; Walker, "Yale review," vol. 1, pp. 125-145; Cook, "Our day," vol. 11, pp. 42-47; Wood, "American journal of politics," vol. 2, pp. 512-524; Fisher, "Forum," vol. 16, pp. 560-567; Williams, "American magazine of civics," vol. 8, pp. 64-68.

Roebling in the "American magazine of civics," vol. 9, pp. 235-245, thinks unrestricted immigration produces low wages. Hall, in the "North American review," vol. 165, pp. 393-402, favors the reading and writing test. Chetwood, "Arena," vol. 27, pp. 254-260, favors rigid exclusion. McLaughlin, "Popular science monthly," vol. 62, pp. 230-236, favors increase of head tax, but disfavors the educational test. Bishop in the "International quarterly," vol. 7, pp. 238-240, thinks more stringent restriction is necessary. Matson in the "Outlook," vol. 77, pp. 461-464, recommends colonization of immigrants in the West.

Croswell, "North American review," vol. 164, pp. 526-536, is opposed to any restriction. Schurz in "Harper's weekly," vol. 42, p. 27, is unfavorable to an educational test. Semner in the "Independent," vol. 50, p. 77, is opposed to any further restriction. Claghorn in the "Atlantic monthly," vol. 86, pp. 535-548, thinks immigration is to be encouraged rather than discouraged. Falkner in the "Political science quarterly," vol. 19, pp. 32-49, thinks that it has been shown by statistics that there has been no deterioration in recent immigration.

In the "North American review," vol. 156, pp. 1-8, Senator William E. Chandler favored suspension of immigration for one year on account of the Chicago exposition and danger from cholera. In the "North American review," vol. 156, pp. 220-227, Senator Henry C. Hansbrough replies to this article in opposition. In the "Forum," vol. 16, pp. 560-567, Sydney G. Fisher discusses what he considers the injurious effect of immigration on literature. In the "Yale review," vol. 1, pp. 125-145, Francis A. Walker wrote favoring a money test.

The subject of *Polish, Hungarian, and Slav immigration* is considered by Chélard, Warne, and in articles by Edward A. Steiner, in the "Outlook," vol. 73, pp. 555-564, and vol. 74, pp. 1040-1044.

Russian immigration is discussed in articles in the following magazines: "Forum," vol. 15, pp. 183-190; "World's work," vol. 7, pp. 4471-4479, 4555-4567.

In the body of the List some reports of State immigration bureaus are noted, but no account is taken of such reports contained in the legislative series of the different States. For instance, in the New York legislative documents there are to be found all the reports of the Commissioners of immigration from 1847 to 1893.

The annual reports of the National board of health, 1879-1885, consider to an extent the introduction of contagious diseases into the United States by aliens, immigrant inspection, and related subjects.
