The question of sand conveying and apparatus for this work was also discussed, and the meeting concluded with an informal talk by Mr. Phillip Moran, of the Keystone Bridge Works, Pittsburg, Pa., on "The Use of Sandless Pig Iron." His experience indicated that this form of pig iron was cheaper, easier on the cupola and produced better castings.

RAILWAY SIGNALING CLUB.—The last regular meeting of the season was held at the Great Northern Hotel, Chicago, on April 25, about 25 members being present. A considerable portion of the time was occupied by a discussion of means for advancing the interests and importance of the club, and a discussion on topical subjects. The latter turned largely on the use of yellow for distant signal lights, as recently adopted by the New York, New Haven & Hartford R. R., and Mr. W. H. Elliott (C., M. & St. P. Ry.) and Mr. W. W. Salmon (Hall Signal Co.) referred to the difficulty in getting a thoroughly satisfactory shade of yellow. Mr. Salmon stated that yellow is used in France for a signal allowing a train to pull out from a side track upon the main track, and that mistaking a yellow distant signal for a white or red light would cause no trouble. In both cases it would mean that an engineman would slacken speed until he discovered the mistake, since a white light (being no signal) would indicate "stop," as would a red light. Mr. E. E. Russell Trautman (Associate Editor of Engineering News) thought it a great advance to have a distinctive distant signal at night, and one which would have but a single light. While the double lens distant signal used on the Chicago & Northwestern Ry. is practically successful, it introduces an element of uncertainty, as an engineman having seen the green light must watch the signal to see if, on nearer approach, the red light also shows, the latter not being visible so far as the green light. He never knows, therefore, whether his distant signal will show one or two lights.

Mr. A. M. Keppel, Jr. (Pennsylvania R. R.), read a paper on "Main Air Pipe and Connections for Electro-Pneumatic Signals and Switches" (Eng. News, April 27), describing the plant under his charge on the Pittsburg Division of the Pennsylvania R. R. In reply to questions, he stated that the Pittsburg plant includes 75 switches, and that although the galvanized pipe is used as a return for electric circuits, there has been no trouble from electrolysis.

A paper by Mr. W. H. Elliott on "The Inspection of Interlocking Plants" (Eng. News, April 27) was then presented, advocating the more systematic requirements for making and reporting inspections. He advocated the practice of monthly inspections, but also favored making extra inspections, so that an inspector never knew when his work would be checked up. Inspectors are required to make such reports as will prevent mere perfunctory examination and the general statement that the plant is "all right."

It was announced that the first volume of Proceedings would be issued in a few weeks. Two amendments to the constitution were adopted: (1) requiring all receipts and expenditures on the part of the secretary and treasurer to be endorsed by a member of the Executive Committee; (2) changing the time of the annual meeting from January to November. The next regular meeting will be held in September.

In the morning a number of the members visited Pacific Junction, on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Ry., to inspect the new signal and interlocking plant, under the direction of Mr. Elliott and Mr. Tilton. We shall describe and illustrate this plant in a future issue.

Signal wires, carried underground, are placed in 1/2-in. pipes filled with oil, and having a trap of 2-in. pipe to collect water, which can be pumped out. Home signals are operated by pipe, distant signals by wire, and dwarf signals by either method. The illustrations show the interlocking connections to switches and derrails, the built-up detector bar, and the oil pipe arrangement of signal wires.
