It is a seedling of Richmond and General Jacqueminot. Filing his application for a patent under the new Plant Patent Law on July 1, 1930, Mr. Spanbauer was granted Patent No. 2 on

The buds are well formed and the color, which is predominantly crimson, is retained until the flower is fully developed. It has abundant foliage and is vigorous in habit of growth, producing extra-long stems without pinching. We have given Senior the severest tests under all conditions and find it the best year-round red rose we have ever grown.

SOUVENIR (A. N. Pierson, Inc.)

This golden yellow sport of Talisman was found in 1930. The color is a beautiful shade of yellow, suffused at times with a slight flush of pink, but this tinge only adds to its attractiveness. It is dark enough to hold well under artificial light, and the color is lasting under all conditions. Souvenir is a big, noble flower. As with all roses the petalage varies with conditions and seasons, averaging from 43 petals in the summer months to 53 during the early winter.

Souvenir is a better grower than Talisman. We know it will be a big producer of cut flowers but it has not been flowered through a season in order to record the flowers cut. It has a much heavier, stronger neck as well as stem, and that improvement was needed to carry this large, full flower. Souvenir is the best yellow rose that we know today.

E. G. HHLL (E. G. Hill Co.)

Dazzling scarlet, deepening to a deeper pure red as it opens. Very fragrant. It produces long stems naturally and the foliage develops freely and is rich dark green in color. A good producer and with unusually good keeping qualities. This rose is constantly making new friends and in certain sections of the country it has become the standard red rose. Grow it a few degrees cooler for the best results.

HOLLYWOOD (Scittine & Di Francesco)

A sport of Premier Supreme and considered better than its parent by many growers. It is slightly deeper pink in color than Supreme when first opening but becomes brighter as the flower develops. The buds are large

and well shaped and have excellent keeping qualities. It is a free grower with good foliage; in fact, it has all the desired points of a commercial rose.

JOANNA HILL (Jos. H. Hill Co.)

The blooms are clear yellow, deepening at the center, and hold their color under artificial light. It produces strong stems without pinching and is marvelously free in bloom. According to the reports we have received on this rose from different parts of the country we are convinced that it has a better per square foot production record than any other variety grown commercially.

PREMIER SUPREME (Zieger & Sons)

One of the best of the Premier sports and for several years the leading dark pink rose. The

color is deep rose and both bud and flower are of magnificent form. It is a free clean grower and has taken the place of Premier and Matchless.

On November 1 the average flower had 53 petals, which is about 10 more than during the summer months.

Souvenir is a better grower than Talisman. That it will be a big producer of cut-flowers we know but we have not flowered it through a season in order to record the flowers cut. There is a much heavier, stronger neck as well as stem, and that improvement was needed to carry this large, full flower. Souvenir is the best yellow Rose that we know today.

We can graft Souvenir on Odorata at the same price for plants as on Manetti but the supply will be smaller and this grafting on Odorata to order only.
