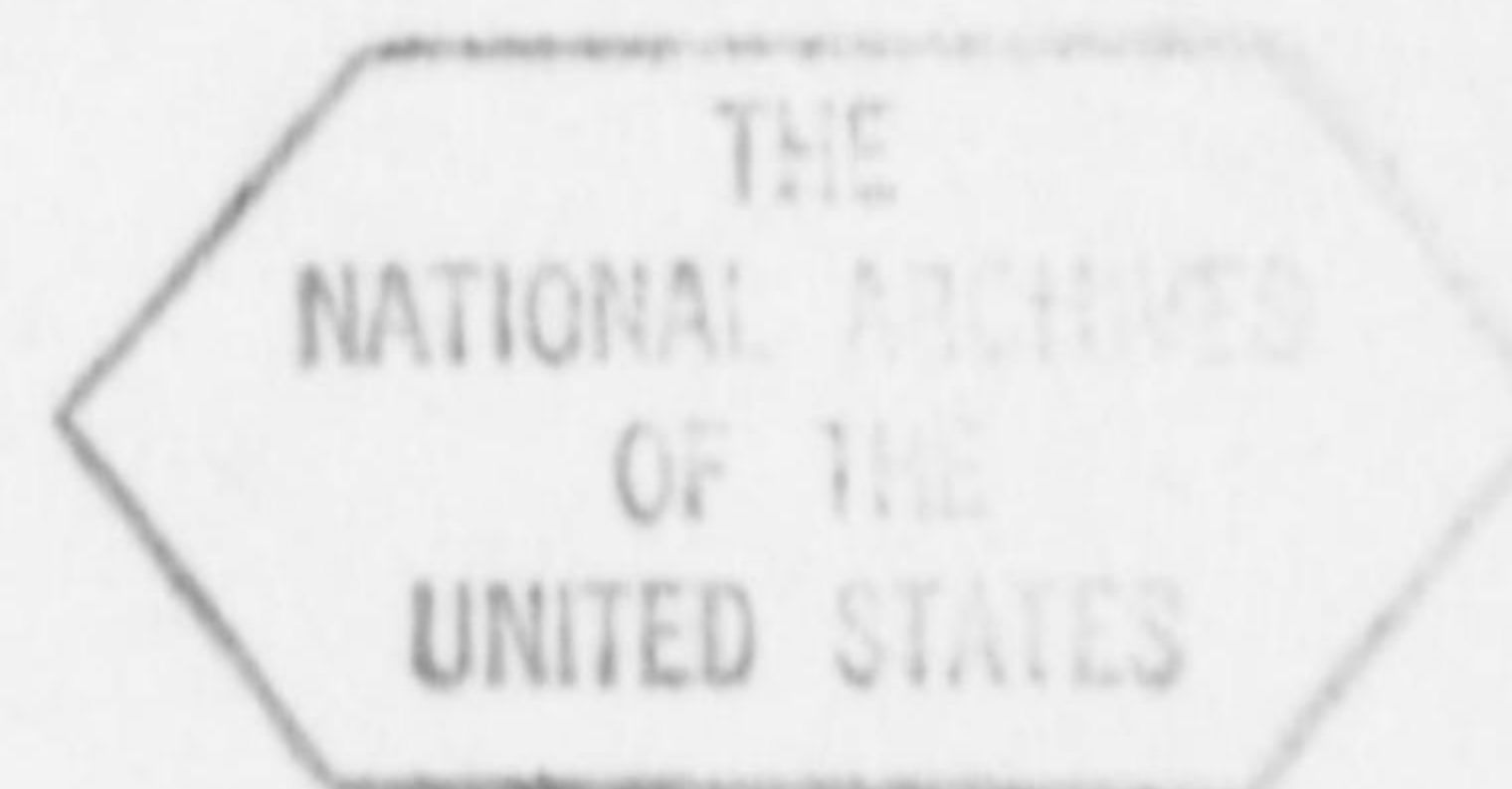

SUBJECT: National Police Reserve Training Program,  
Fourth Phase

1. The fourth phase of National Police Reserve Training will begin on 8 October 1951 and continue until 19 January 1952. Concurrently, training of approximately 8,000 new recruits will be conducted under a separate program. Upon completion of these programs, the recruits will be integrated into existing units.

2. The approved Master Program for the fourth phase of NPR training is attached as inclosure 1. The training prescribed in this program is based on a 44-hour training week for 13 weeks, the period 24 December 1951 to 5 January 1952 being a holiday period. Inclosure 2 lists NPR units and CAS staff divisions having primary interest in training programs for these units.

3. Each CAS staff division will prepare detailed training programs for the unit or units in which it has primary interest. These programs will follow the format of those published for Third Phase, National Police Reserve Training Program, except number of hours will be shown in one column, rather than four as used in Third Phase Program. CAS staff divisions will have the further responsibility of selecting and editing appropriate references to be translated into Japanese. Because of the limited personnel available for translating and the time required to publish and issue training instructions in Japanese, references will be held to the minimum believed to be absolutely essential.

4. Unit Training Program will include:

a. For all units, 10 hours instruction in Motor Convoy operations and shuttle movements to be concurrent with training in marches and bivouacs, or tactical training.

b. For all Engineer Units, and one squad from each Patrol Company, Information and Patrol Platoons, and each company in Ordinary and Special Regiments, 102 hours instruction in the use and defense of mine fields, obstacles and demolitions. This instruction is in addition to the hours prescribed for all personnel except medical under "Common Subjects." The program covering the additional demolitions training will be prepared by Operations Division for all units except Engineer.

5. Operations Division is the coordinating agency for CAS on training programs. Other CAS divisions will deliver to the Operations Division on or before 15 September 1951, completed training programs for which they are responsible.

Section I

General

1. Authority. This training program is issued under authority contained in National Police Reserve Rule Number 4, dated 12 February 1951.

2. Training Objectives.

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- a. To develop and maintain the maximum proficiency in the individual as a member of the National Police Reserve.
- b. To maintain proficiency of individuals in subjects in which they were trained in previous phases.
- c. To integrate the individual into and to perfect the functional performance of battalions and smaller units.
- d. To perfect the skill and techniques of individuals and teams in the use of all weapons issued to the NPR.

3. Allocation of Time. Training prescribed in this program is based on a 44-hour training week covering a period of 13 training weeks, a total of 572 hours. Subjects are divided into three general groups and time is allocated as follows:

- a. Weapons Training:
  - (1) 132 hours for all units except medical. This will include familiarization firing of all weapons not previously fired for record.
- b. Common Subjects:
  - (1) 156 hours for service group and service type units, except medical.
  - (2) 194 hours for patrol companies, ordinary regiments and special regiments, except medical units.
  - (3) 136 hours for all medical units.
- c. Unit Training:
  - (1) 276 hours unit and technical training for all service group and service type units (except medical).
  - (2) 238 hours unit training for patrol companies, ordinary regiments and special regiments, except medical.
  - (3) 428 hours unit training (including technical training) for medical units.
- d. 8 hours "open time" have been allowed for make-up training required by loss of training time due to unprogrammed activities.

4. Holiday Period. The period between 24 December 1951 and 5 January 1952 will be a holiday period, and a maximum of one-half of the personnel at any one time during this period can be expected to be absent. The remaining personnel will be utilized in camp administration, guard, police, and security. Minimum training during this period should include physical training, dismounted drill, organized athletics, and such subjects for review as desired by unit commander.

5. Special Instructions.

a. Operating headquarters, units, and detachments or elements thereof which are actively engaged in administrative and logistical operations will accomplish at least one-third of the weapons training scheduled in paragraph 3 a above. In addition, personnel of such units will be training to perform their primary duties and to maintain and protect themselves under such conditions as might conceivably exist for such personnel. Insofar as the urgency of performance of their primary missions permit, personnel of such units will be given a minimum of four hours weekly training in such subjects as are applicable to them and are not practiced in their daily performance of duty. The remainder of their training will be accomplished "on-the-job."

b. Training in technical and specialist subjects will be conducted as a part of the unit training. Separate programs cover these subjects for each type unit.

c. For service group units, approximately one-half of the unit training time will be devoted to "on-the-job" training in the performance of normal service functions.

6. Continuity of Training.

a. In scheduling training, arbitrary boundaries between phases are to be avoided. Subjects must be integrated and identified with the unit mission. This may entail concurrent basic, individual, specialist, and small unit training. The objective is to attain, thru logical progression, the maximum teamwork and effectiveness for the time expended.

b. Hours of instruction prescribed herein have been reduced to a minimum but are considered adequate to include the review of previous instruction and to introduce new material. Proficiency is attained thru subsequent application provided by integrated training. Once a subject is introduced, it should be reviewed and applied at every opportunity.

7. Conduct of Training.

a. Training within the unit will be conducted in accordance with current doctrines and procedures. Commanders must supervise and conduct instruction to insure that material is carefully prepared and presented in an understandable, interesting, and enthusiastic manner.

b. The quality and thoroughness of training is directly proportional to the amount of active and personal supervision on the part of commanders and their staffs. First priority must be given to the primary mission of training; administrative work must not interfere with this mission..

c. Emphasis will be placed on practical work rather than on theoretical instruction. Lectures and conferences will be kept to a minimum to bring out briefly the points to be demonstrated and applied or to show the relation between the subject introduced and other subjects.

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d. Throughout the entire program, suitable and timely training will be given to selected personnel in order to prepare them to instruct others. Schools for instructors will include theoretical instruction in tactics and techniques of units and weapons, in order better to prepare instructors for the actual conduct of training. Commanders may take advantage of the availability of specially qualified instructors to conduct group instructions of several units. Normally however, because of considerations of the principles of leadership, unit commanders must conduct and supervise the training of their own units.

e. Every effort will be made during this phase of training to maintain the maximum physical condition of personnel. This program includes only a minimum number of hours to be devoted to physical training. Full use will be made of marches between training areas, and movements during operational problems to condition men for speed, cross-country, and distance marching.

8. Equipment. Information on the availability of additional equipment will be published as it becomes known.

9. Modification. Commanders implementing this program may modify it to make the best use of existing facilities, to conform to conditions of the training situation, or to facilitate the attainment of objectives stated. The time allotted to subjects will be followed as closely as possible. Modification as authorized does not include the omission of subjects herein or the addition of other subjects.

10. Bivouac. Where suitable areas are available, 2 separate overnight bivouacs will be conducted during the last 4 weeks of the program. The field bivouac will be conducted as part of an assumed operational situation. Where possible, training in dispersion and concealment from observation will be stressed, and local security measures will be taken when these do not interfere with scheduled training.

11. Safety. Realism in training will be achieved without sacrifice of reasonably safety precautions. Common sense is a basic principle of safety in any training program. Most accidents attributed to training can be prevented by proper supervision and inspection of equipment and training aids.

12. Progress Records and Reports.

a. A record of the status of training will be kept by each battalion, separate company, and similar type unit, using NFR Form 100, modified as necessary.

b. During this phase of training, Chiefs of Regions and Service Group and Commanding Officer, Camp McKnight, will submit monthly training reports by camp, in duplicate, on NFR Form 101 to be issued.



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13. Inspections and Tests. Attainment of prescribed standards must be judged through inspections and tests. Inspections determine the progress of training and indicate the subjects to be stressed to attain the training objective. These inspections and tests will be prepared and conducted as proscribed by Chiefs of Regions and Chief of Service Group.

14. Night Training. At least one-third of all operational training and training in movements will be conducted during hours of darkness, stressing individual and unit night discipline. Time off during daylight hours will be allowed to compensate for training conducted at night.

15. Recruit Training. Recruit training for newly enlisted members of the NPR will be conducted by separate basic training companies in each camp during the same period as the training provided herein. A separate program is published for this purpose.

16. Officer Schools. A program for locally conducted schools for the training of officers will be published as a separate training directive.

17. Maneuvers. During this phase the unit against unit maneuver method of tactical training will be featured during the unit training periods. Aggressor opponents will be developed and used.

18. Each numbered company in each ordinary and special regiment and each patrol company will select one squad which will receive additional training in mines and booby traps, obstacles and demolitions, and defense of obstacles and mine fields.

SUBJECT: National Police Reserve Training Program, Fourth Phase

1. The fourth phase of National Police Reserve Training will begin on 8 October 1951 and continue until 19 January 1952. Concurrently, training of approximately 8,000 new recruits will be conducted, <sup>under a separate program.</sup> Upon completion of these programs, the recruits will be integrated into existing units.

2. The approved Master Program for the fourth phase of NPR training is attached as inclosure 1. The training prescribed in this program is based on a 44-hour training week for 13 weeks, the period 24 December 1951 to 5 January 1952 being a holiday period. Inclosure 2 lists NPR units and CAS staff divisions having primary interest in training programs for these units.

3. Each CAS staff division will prepare detailed training programs for the unit or units in which it has primary interest. These programs will follow the format of those published for Third Phase, National Police Reserve Training Program. CAS staff divisions will have the further responsibility of selecting and editing appropriate references to be translated into Japanese. Because of the limited personnel available for translating and the time required to publish and issue training instructions in Japanese, references will be held to the minimum believed to be absolutely essential.

4. Unit Training Programs will include:

- a. For all units, 10 hours motor convoy and shuttle movements.
- b. For Engineer units, Patrol Companies, Information and Patrol Platoons, and Ordinary and Special Regiments, 102 hours instruction in the use and defense of mine fields, obstacles and demolitions. This instruction is in addition to the hours prescribed for all personnel except medics<sup>h</sup> under "Common Subjects."

5. Operations Division is the coordinating agency for CAS on training programs. Other CAS divisions will deliver to the Operations Division on or before 15 September 1951, completed training programs for which they are responsible.
