I. Description of Incident

An observer in London observed a watermelon-shaped object of white light estimated to be as high as 1,000 feet then disappearing behind some buildings. Object was slow moving and was sighted at 0300 for 3 minutes.

II. Discussion of Incident

This report is very brief. Nothing is known about the reliability of the observer, local air traffic, beacons on water towers, etc. Therefore, no real evaluation can be attempted although the description sounds like the landing light on an incoming plane.

III. Conclusion

Insufficient information.

After interrogating the two airmen who reported the unidentified object, I discovered that two jet aircraft from McGuire Air Force Base were airborne between the hours of 2227, 11 December 1952 and 0012, 12 December 1952. Both airmen insisted, however, that the sighting occurred at exactly 0025 hours and 0030 hours.


I would regard Airman [REDACTED] as being a fairly reliable witness or observer, and would give his report a C-3 rating. I do not regard Airman [REDACTED] report as being as reliable as the one rendered by Airman [REDACTED]; but since both reports coincide I would also advise that his report be given a C-3 rating.
