WIFE SOLD FOR PINT OF BEER.

The Purchaser Went Down with the Cruiser Maine in the Harbor at Havana.

John Hanley, of 198 Nelson street, New York, who, prior to his discharge from the United States navy in March, 1890, on a pension of eight dollars a month, had been a policeman and a street inspector, was recently before Magistrate Brenner, in the Butler street court in Brooklyn, on the complaint of his wife, Margaret, for non-support.

"How is it that you signed your name to the complaint as Margaret Hanley Hamilton, when your husband's name is Hanley?" Magistrate Brenner inquired, as the woman, whose neck was ornamented with a red white and blue ribbon, took the stand.

"Well, your honor," she replied, "eight years ago my husband, who was then in the navy, sold me for a pint of beer to his shipmate, John Hamilton, and I lived with Mr. Hamilton until he was blown up with the Maine in Havana harbor a year ago."

Further inquiry brought out the fact that there are three Hanley and two Hamilton children in the family, and that the latter got a share of the money awarded by the government to the families of the Maine victims, and that Hamilton, who must have been a thrifty sailor, five years ago gave to Mrs. Hanley \$5,000 with which she purchased the Nelson street house.

Magistrate Brenner dismissed the complaint, telling the couple to go home and behave themselves.

"You'd better not come into my part of the house," said Mrs. Hanley to her husband, and opening her satchel and taking out a small American flag, she waved it defiantly in his face and remarked: "Jack Hamilton went down with the Maine, and I'll stick to my colors."

TWICE DECLARED TO BE DEAD.
Judge Johnson, of Milwaukee, Hands Down a Decision in the Julius Luebke Case.

For the second time within a year Julius Luebke has been pronounced legally dead, and he is dead so far as the state of Wisconsin is concerned in his property, although he may be alive. If he should appear in Milwaukee tomorrow he would still be dead, though by certain legal proceedings he could be restored to legal existence again.

Judge Johnson is the man who this time discovered that Luebke was dead, and as a result must be paid to the Wisconsin Trust company by the Wisconsin Fire & Marine Insurance company bank. Judge Mann, in the probate court in Milwaukee held that Luebke was dead, but the banking company did not think the evidence was strong enough, and wanted two persons to say it was so before they would believe it.

Julius Luebke was a traveling man well known throughout the northwest. On January 31, 1891, he deposited \$85,000 in the Wisconsin Fire & Marine Insurance company bank. One day the following spring he started out on his trip, but was heard from in Colorado, where he bought a ticket from Denver to some little town.

Just at this point all trace of him was lost. Nothing further was ever heard from him, though the most diligent search possible was made to find him. The Wisconsin Trust company was appointed administrator of his estate January 11 last, the probate court not caring his money until a higher court had confirmed the decree, and now for a second time he has been declared dead.

KIPLING'S NURSE.
Furnishes the Famous Novel - She May Be the Heroine.

Rudyard Kipling may now be expected to write a book with a trained nurse as its heroine, or one of its leading figures, if one of the stories told about his illness is true. When Mr. Kipling first became ill and his condition had not taken a serious turn, he amused himself constantly by questioning the trained nurse about her profession. He seemed never weary of what she told him about its responsibilities and variety, says the New York Sun. His conversations with her on this subject put him into possession of all the information concerning the case, and he can now write a story about the profession if he cares to. The young woman attending him was engaged in nursing the greatest story teller in the world. But it was the nurse who was called upon to tell of her profession for his entertainment and presumably for the profit of him and the public if he puts his information into a story.

This Year is Numerak.
Yale mathematical professors have been discussing a popular way of writing the year 1890 in Roman numerals. According to the present system it would be written MDCCCXXXIX. This is a bewildering array of figures and many of the Yale professors favor writing it MCM.

CHOATE IN LONDON.

Impression Made by the New United States Ambassador to England.

The debut in London of Mr. Joseph H. Choate as a public speaker at the recent banquet of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom, has been an event of much importance. While his speech has been much admired as straight utterances from a self-respecting nation, there is a tinge of disappointment in many quarters.

"We have had the intellectual and spiritual best of America with us for many years; but we have not had the mass of Americans with us, and we had no right to expect them. The feeling still exists in millions of minds in the United States that we are guided solely by our selfish interests and interests."

Paris show to open on time. Work on Exposition of 1900 progressing rapidly and favorably.

Commissioner-General Plead, of the Paris exposition, writes to the New York office of the commission that the big show will open on time in 1900. The recent strike, he says, did not interfere with the preparatory work, and order is now emerging out of the chaos of the construction period.

The city of Paris has given \$2,500,000 to the exposition and a French railroad the sum of \$500,000. The buildings will cover not less than 300 acres. The American exhibit will occupy 225,000 square feet of space. A grand entrance arch will rise at the junction of the Place de la Concorde and the Quai de la Conférence. Through this superb gateway 60,000 persons can pass in an hour.

Of all the buildings of the exposition the manufactures building will be the most spacious. Three acres of new ground have been made by filling up the Seine. Unexpected demands for space necessitated this.

The prospects for great success in the American exhibit are very promising. More than \$1,000,000 will be spent by American makers of electrical machinery in their exhibit alone. In all 57 nations will participate in the great fair.

HEROIC ACT OF A BULLDOG.
Tears Burning Clothing Off a Little Girl, Thus Saving Two Lives.

A 12-year-old bulldog, McGinty, which was raised in the fire department at Lima, O., where its owner is employed, saved the life of his little mistress and the mother who witnessed it believes her own self the other afternoon. The little girl, Marie Williams, was washing windows at her home when her dress took fire. She screamed, but before the mother could reach her the dog was there, tearing the blazing clothing from the little girl's body.

The dog leaped between the mother and the girl to prevent, it seemed, her from attempting to put out the flames, which completely destroyed her apron, dress and skirt. Her body was only slightly burned, but the mother says she would have been cremated had it not been for the dog.

Menick as a Surgeon.
It is said that Emperor Menelik of Abyssinia, who has for a long time given great attention to western civilization, has recently turned his interest to the fitting himself for the work of a physician. He spends a large part of his time in a hospital watching with keen interest the surgical operations. The emperor often expresses astonishment at the skill of the surgeons, and is most pleased when he can be of some service to them, holding a limb or roll of bandages. He is at present planning to build an immense hospital at Adis Ababa, the capital of his nation, and when it is finished he intends to take the entire control of the surgical department.

Raising Sunken Steel.
It is proposed to use electromagnets for recovering a large load of steel rails which was sunk in the Ohio river, says the Electrical World. A crane boat will be equipped with waterproof magnets capable of lifting 4,000 pounds each. The work will be done by the Langdon Electric company, of Pittsburgh.

Detroit Will Not Celebrate.
Detroit has abandoned the idea of a bi-centennial exposition and wisely decided to dedicate with imposing pageantry a memorial building instead.

Sunday Contracts Lawful.
Contracts made on Sunday may be enforced in Minnesota, according to a decision of the supreme court of that state.

QUEER RESULT OF A SNEEZE.

Took Two Physicians to Fix Up Railroad Passenger Who Succeeded Shoulder Out of Joint.

Traveling on a Pennsylvania railroad train from Trenton to New York, a passenger met with a strange accident late on Monday night, but thanks to the presence of two Newark physicians on the train, he was relieved before he had sustained serious injury. The train left Trenton at ten minutes to 11 o'clock. Just before it drew out of New Brunswick a man from New Jersey, seated in one of the forward cars, began to sneeze violently.

Suddenly he became deathly pale, and the next instant the other passengers were startled by a cry of agony. The young man had half risen from his seat, and it was noticed that his right shoulder had been drawn far up out of place, until it looked grotesquely misplaced. He begged that a doctor be brought, explaining with difficulty that he had dislocated his shoulder by sneezing. One of the passengers went through the train searching for medical aid, and finally came upon Drs. H. C. H. Herold and David L. Wallace, of Newark.

They directed that the man be carried into the baggage car, where a couch was constructed with mail sacks. It took some time to get the shoulder back into place, and during the operation the young man suffered excruciating agony. Whisky and hypodermic injections of morphia had to be administered, says the New York Herald. By the time the train reached Market street, Newark, the young man had begun to recover. The Newark doctors left the train, forgetting to learn their patient's name, and now know nothing about him save that he came from Jersey City.

NEW COALING STATIONS.
Question of Their Location to Be Determined by the Secretary of the Navy.

Under the naval appropriation bill the bureau of equipment is authorized to spend \$100,000 for coaling stations at different points where they may be desired. The location of these stations is wholly in the discretion of the secretary of the navy, but he will not be guided by the recommendations of Rear Admiral Bradford, chief of the bureau of equipment. The admiral has not yet made any recommendations, but it is known that he believes there should be some good coaling depots at Manila and San Juan, Porto Rico, also at Guam. Besides these he believes there should be a very large coaling depot in the vicinity of Shanghai, China, to supply the United States vessels cruising in the North China sea and in Japanese waters. It is also probable that a coaling station and depot will be located somewhere on the Maine coast. There is no such station north of Cape Cod, and naval officers have reported the need of one above that point. Portsmouth, N. H., is being urged as such a station, but some point on the Maine coast seems to be preferred, which can be reached easily by the large vessels of the navy. There is water enough at Portsmouth, but the channel reaching the naval station is somewhat difficult for large vessels to navigate.

MUST STAY IN AMERICA.
Families of Officers and Enlisted Men in the Philippines Cannot Join Them There.

From this time on the families of officers and enlisted men of the army will not be permitted to accompany them to Manila. Secretary Alger has received a cablegram from Gen. Otis in which he said that Manila was not a safe place for officers' families. Great difficulty is experienced in caring for those now there, and their safety is one of the chief causes of anxiety. Gen. Otis suggested that families of the officers should remain in the United States.

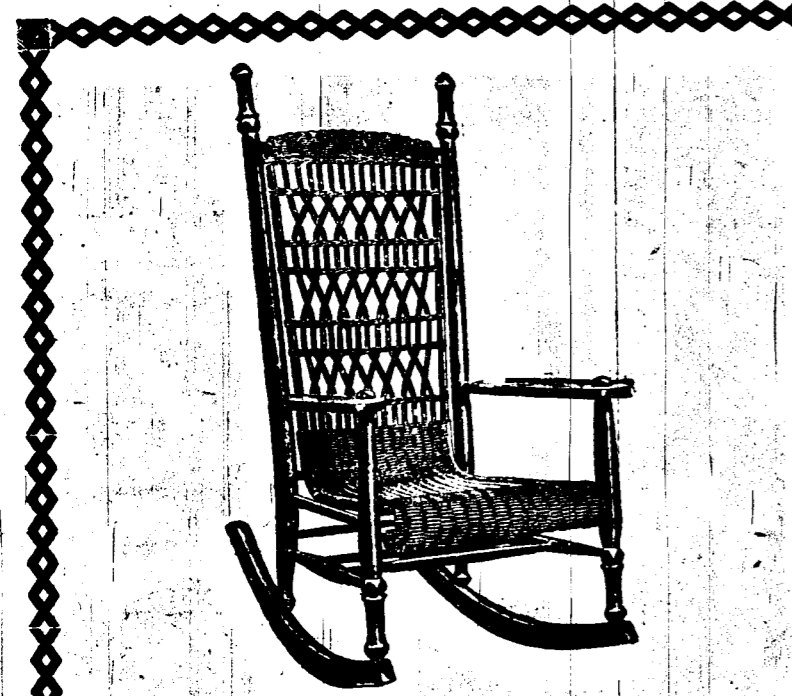
After Secretary Alger received this advice he issued an order to the commanding general of all the military posts throughout the United States, in which he incorporated the cable dispatch from Gen. Otis, and added that under such conditions no more families of officers or enlisted men would be permitted to accompany the troops to the Philippines. The families of commissioned and noncommissioned officers, for whom quarters are legally provided, will be permitted to retain their quarters at the posts from which the troops depart.

RURAL FREE DELIVERY.
Post Office Department to Extend the System, \$300,000 Having Been Appropriated for the Purpose.

During the fiscal year which begins July 1 the post office department will extend the rural delivery system to a considerable degree, \$300,000 being available for that purpose. Illinois will come in for a good portion of the sum allowed, which is double that appropriated last year.

In his last annual report First Assistant Postmaster General Heath shows this service has worked satisfactorily, and there is a general desire on the part of the people to have it continued. This service is yet in its experimental stage, but the reports received from the districts in which it has been established show the number of pieces of mail handled has increased, and the farmers have been enabled to get the newspapers every morning.

Labouchere's Will.
Henry Labouchere, in his latest attack on the house of lords, divides the members of that body into three classes - the "mentals," the "ornamentals" and the "detrimentals."
