THE BOERS HAVE RETREATED

Hamilton Gained Important Hill and Botha's Men Evacuated Their Position During the Night.

LORD ROBERTS TELLS OF OPERATIONS

Burghers Fought in a Determined Manner All Day--Natal Army in Touch With Roberts's Force--Wakkerstrom Has Surrendered.

(Associated Press.)
London, June 14.—Lord Roberts's engagement with Gen. Botha terminated, as was expected, by the Boer commander-in-chief retiring from his positions. Beyond driving Botha from the capital nothing much seems to have been done. Roberts does not mention the capture of prisoners or guns or the infliction of loss. Perhaps the most important feature revealed by to-day's official dispatch is the announcement that the army of Natal is at last in touch with Roberts's troops. The accomplishment of this move, though long delayed, should considerably accelerate the pacification of the Transvaal. That it is already bearing fruit is evidenced by the submission of the Wakkerstrom district to Gen. Lyttelton. A dispatch from Buller says Gen. Clery encountered no opposition in his march from Ingogo to Laing's Nek, which he now occupies. Gen. Dartell marched through Laing's Nek on the 13th, on his way to Charlestown. The press dispatches say Charlestown was destroyed previous to its evacuation by the Boers, but that no damage was done at Wakkerstrom. In the Orange River colony affairs seem to be returning to the same status as obtained previous to the cutting of the line of British communications.

Mr. Schreiner appears determined to adhere to his Resignation of Premiership in spite of the pressure brought to bear on him by Sir Alfred Milner, the British high commissioner, and it is announced from Capetown that Milner has sent for Sir John Gordon Sprigg, the former Premier, who is understood to be trying to form a cabinet. A dispatch from Capetown says: "At the opening of parliament Mr. Schreiner will explain that he resigned because he was unwilling to remain in office supported by the opposition, believing his influence greater with the moderate Afrikaners when a private member than as Premier by the grace of the Progressives. Nevertheless the leaders of the Afri-

is slightly higher than the one we captured. The great extent of country which has been covered under modern conditions of warfare renders progress very slow. "Details of the casualties have not reached me, but I understand they are moderate in numbers. The only further casualties reported to-day are two officers wounded."

RETIRED DURING THE NIGHT

London, June 14.—The war office has issued the following report from Roberts, dated Pretoria, June 13th, afternoon: "The enemy evacuated their position during the night and retired eastward. "Buller's force and mine have afforded each other mutual assistance. Our occupation of Pretoria caused numbers of the Boers to withdraw from Laing's Nek and Buller's advance to Volksrust made them feel their rear would shortly be endangered."

WAKKERSTROM SURRENDERED

London, June 14.—Gen. Buller reports as follows: "Headquarters at Laing's Nek, June 14th, morning.—Gen. Lyttelton yesterday received the formal submission of the town and district of Wakkerstrom, the enemy is believed to have completely evacuated."

Nothing Destroyed.
London, June 14.—The Daily Express correspondent telegraphs from Machadodorp, 140 miles east of Pretoria, under the date of June 10th, in connection with the capture and destruction by the Boer general, Dewet, of 3,000 suits of clothing from the British, that the soldiers complain much of cold. CANADIANS AGAIN.

Toronto, June 14.—The Evening Telegram's London correspondent cables that the Standard correspondent at Pretoria says the Canadians figured prominently in forcing Commander Botha to evacuate his position, as referred to in the war office dispatches this morning.

FALLING BACK.

London, June 14.—Lord Roberts reports to the war office under the date of Pretoria, June 13th, as follows: "Methuen advanced to Koningspruit yesterday and found all quiet. Kroonstad is strongly held. Methuen returned to-day to Rhenoster River, where the railway is being repaired. "We were engaged all yesterday with Botha's army. The enemy fought with determination and held our cavalry on both flanks; but Ian Hamilton, assisted by the Guards Brigade of Polo-Carew's division, pushing forward, took the hill in his front, which caused the enemy to fall back on their second position to the eastward. This they are still holding. It

MRS. GLADSTONE DEAD.

London, June 14.—Mrs. Gladstone, widow of the late Wm. E. Gladstone, the English statesman, died at 5 p.m. to-day.

Mrs. Wm. Ewart Gladstone was 88 years of age, and had been slowly sinking for some time past at Hawarden Castle, the family seat.

She was the oldest daughter of the late Sir Richard Glyne, bart., of Hawarden Castle, and was married to Mr. Gladstone in 1838. He died on May 19th, 1898.

She was a woman loved and admired by the vast circle of those who came in connection with her in her busy and varied life, and had great influence over her husband's actions.

Resignation Imminent. Expected That the Premier Will Vacate His Post To-Night.

A Conference With the Governor—Vancouver Liberals Uphold His Honor.

It is altogether probable that this evening will see the termination of the administration under which British Columbia has existed since last spring, when Joseph Martin was entrusted with the task of forming a government. All of the ministers are back in town and at a caucus which is to be held this afternoon a decision will probably be reached.

The Premier arrived last night and Hon. Smith Curtis on the Garland this morning. The latter minister came down from his constituency via Spokane and Seattle.

The question of what attitude the Ottawa government will assume toward the Governor still occupies a great deal of attention. Special dispatches from Ottawa to the Times to-day, however, indicate that nothing will be done until the Legislature meets, when through the votes and proceedings, the Dominion authorities will be made acquainted officially with the result of the election.

The tenth annual meeting of the donors and subscribers to the Royal Jubilee hospital will be held on Friday, June 23rd, at 4 o'clock, at the city hall.

Two Victorians Wedded. Ernest Wardale Bradley and Miss Amy F. Carter Married Last Evening.

June has become the acknowledged month of nuptials in this city, and although but fourteen days have gone by a great many couples have been made one in the holy bonds of matrimony.

Mr. and Mrs. Bradley will make their future home at 35 John street. Upon leaving the residence of the bride's parents last evening they were not spared the usual shower of rice which has been looked upon for generations as symbolic of best wishes for happiness and prosperity.

Another small army of Japanese and Chinese arrived this morning from the Orient on the steamer Duke of Edinburgh, a vessel of the N. P. fleet—under charter for only the one trip across the Pacific. There were 420 of the Asiatics on the steamer when she landed, of which number 330 Japanese and 11 Chinese were destined for Victoria.

The big barge Georgian, which left here last week to load Coon coal for the north, is reported a wreck at Union. She had loaded 200 tons of coal and when the steamer Queen City passed yesterday she was lying half submerged with the coal still on deck.

British ship Windsor Park, which arrived at San Francisco from Australia last week, had a most remarkable voyage. After weathering a cyclone, during which the vessel was in hard straits, all hands were called upon to fight death face to face for eight days jetting a burning coal.
