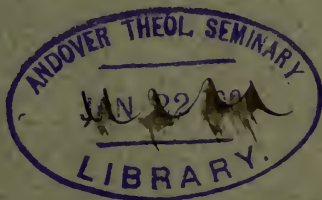

The School Committee have given the following estimate for the ensuing year : Schools, \$9500 ; for repairs on School-houses, \$1500.

The Roads have been under the care of one Highway Surveyor the past year, who has made a full report, which will be found elsewhere ; they ask for Highways and Bridges, \$7000 ; Sidewalks, \$1000 ; Removing Snow, \$500.

RED SPRING GRAVEL BANK.

An appropriation of \$3500 will be needed for this purchase.

DECORATION DAY.

The sum of \$175 should be appropriated for this purpose.

TOWN HOUSE.

Report of Overseers of Poor.

Agreeable to custom, we present the Annual Report of this department.

There has been but little change of consequence at the Almshouse since our last Report, and the expenses have varied but little from the year past. We have admitted thirteen, discharged but one, and have at the present time forty-three inmates,—a larger number than usual, and as a class they require more care, and can do less labor than is usually the case, making it necessary to employ more help, both in and out of the house.

We would again most respectfully call the attention of the voters of the town to the fact that it is very necessary to have a better supply of water for the use of the house. The subject was brought before the Annual Meeting last year, and it was decided to defer the matter until the present year. The Overseers now feel it their duty to have an article inserted in the warrant asking for an appropriation for the purpose. We have made some inquiries, and think a windmill could be procured and put in working order for the sum of \$500, including pipe and reservoirs.

The relief out of the Almshouse has been large, especially at the Lunatic Hospital, as we have more inmates there than ever before. A considerable part of this appropriation is paid out for other towns, which amount will be reimbursed to this town.

Report of the Chief Engineer

OF THE

Fire Department.

TO THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN :

Gentlemen, — In accordance with the Regulations of the Fire Department, I submit the following Report.

The force of the department consists of five Engineers, sixteen members of the Steamer Company, and forty-three members of the Shawshin Company at Ballard Vale.

The apparatus consists of one third-class steam fire-engine, and one hand-engine, with a hose-carriage for each ; also one four-wheeled horse hose-carriage, carrying 1000 feet of hose.

We have 1800 feet of hose in good condition, with hooks ladders and ropes at each engine-house.

There have been fourteen alarms of fire during the past year, as follows :

March 13, 1883. Barn of David Richardson. Total loss : Insurance, \$1200 ; Insurance paid, \$873.52.

April 14, 1883. House owned by David Richardson. Damage slight.

April 22, 1883. Woods at Frye Village.

April 29, 1883. Chimney in house of H. W. French.

April 30, 1883. Wood of G. W. Simmons, Ballard Vale.

May 2, 1883. Woods at Ballard Vale.

May 4, 1883. Woods at Ballard Vale.

May 8, 1883. Woods at Marland Village.

June 12, 1883. At Craighead and Kintz' works. Damage slight.

June 12, 1883. Bonfire.

June 21, 1883. House of Patrick Conway.

Aug. 14, 1883. Woods of J. H. Flint, West Parish.

Sept. 14, 1883. Out of town limits.

Nov. 19, 1883. Wood of George W. Simmons, Ballard Vale.

During the past year we have found several hundred feet of hose unfit for service, and it will be necessary to purchase new hose during the coming year.

I would again call your attention to the necessity of a proper means of heating the new engine-house. Last year there was an appropriation of two hundred dollars for a steam heating apparatus for heating the water in the boiler of the engine. The Engineers did not deem it advisable to expend that sum; but are of opinion that a heater should be furnished capable of heating the house and hose-tower when needed.

I would again especially call your attention to the insufficient supply of water in the centre of the town, and in the vicinity of our public buildings.

To make the department complete, we should have a light hook and ladder truck, for which we have ample accommodation in the new engine-house; also a pair of horses, to be kept in the engine-house, for use in this department when needed; at other times they could be used by the Town for other purposes.

I would recommend that \$2000 be appropriated for the running expenses of the Fire Department for the ensuing year, and that \$1000 be appropriated for the purchase of hose.

 Andover, GREETING :

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Andover, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet and assemble at the Town House in said Andover, on Monday, the Third day of March, 1884, at 12 o'clock, M., to act on the following Articles, namely :

Article 1st. — To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2d. — To choose Town Clerk, Treasurer, and Collector of Taxes, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, One member of the School Committee for Three Years, Constables, Highway Surveyors or Road Commissioners, Fence Viewers, One Trustee of Memorial Hall for Seven Years, and all other Town Officers.

Article 3d. — To see what action the Town will take on the following question : “ Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town ? ” The vote to be Yes or No, as provided in the Public Statutes, Chap. 100, Sec. 5.

Article 4th. — To see what action the Town will take in regard to unexpended appropriations.

Article 5th. — To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for the use of the several Departments the current year, to wit : Schools, School-houses, Highways, Bridges, and Sidewalks, Removing Snow, Town Officers, Fire Department, Miscellaneous, Abatement of Taxes, Printing and Stationery, Cemetery, Interest on Notes and Funds, County

Tax, State Tax, Discount on Taxes, Adjustment of State and Bank Tax, Street Lamps, State Aid, Decoration Day, Disabled Soldiers and Sailors Aid, Soldiers' Bounty, Town House, Hay Scales, Expenses of Almshouse, Relief out of Almshouse, Repairs on Almshouse, and Reservoirs, and Insurance Department.

Article 6th. — To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer to hire money for the use of the Town when necessary, upon the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 7th. — To see what method the Town will adopt for the collection of Taxes the current year.

Article 8th. — To see what compensation the Town will pay the Firemen for their services the current year.

Article 9th. — To see if the Town will accept and revise the List of names for Jurors, as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.
