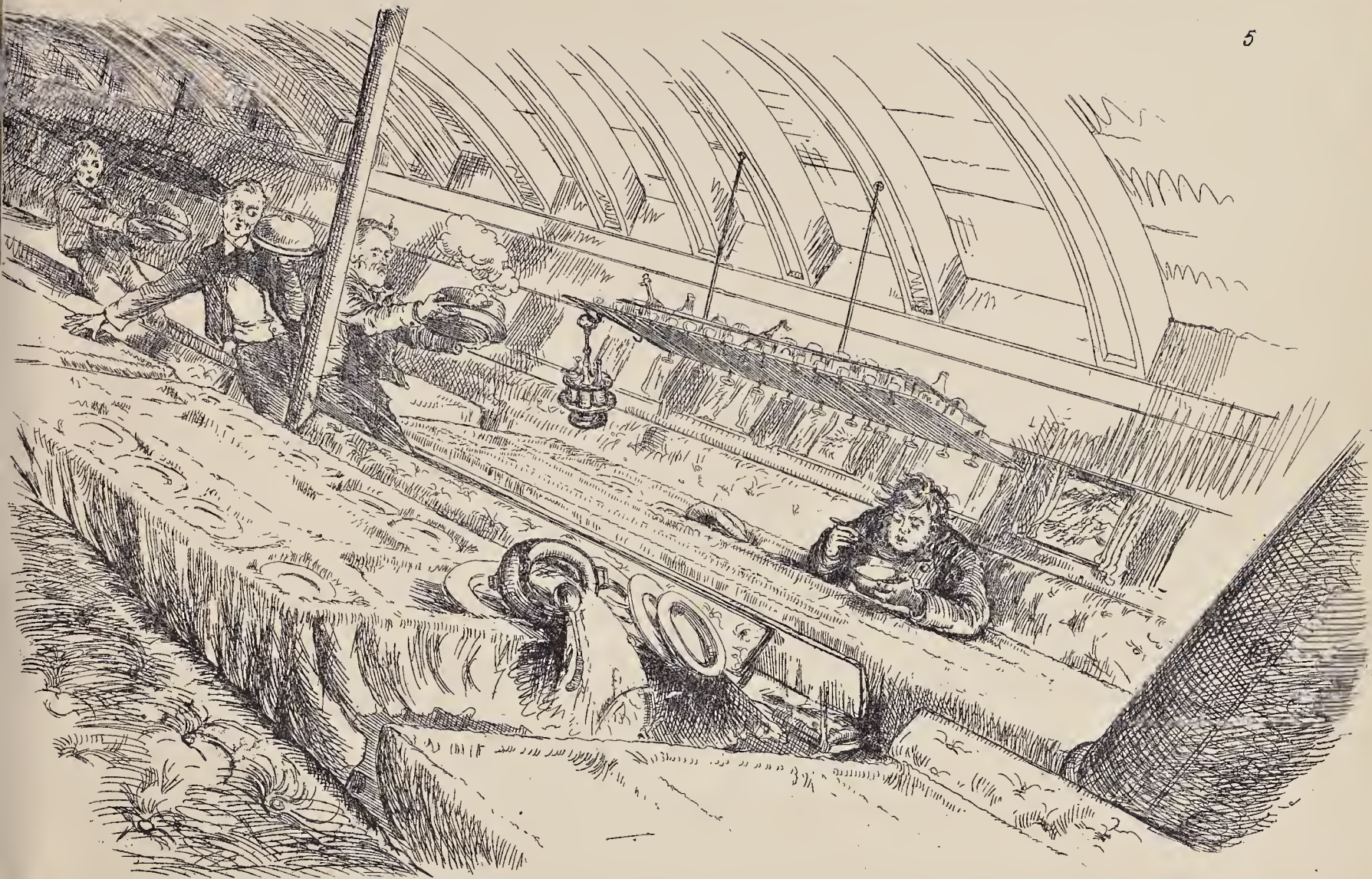
SAILING DOWN THE MERSEY.

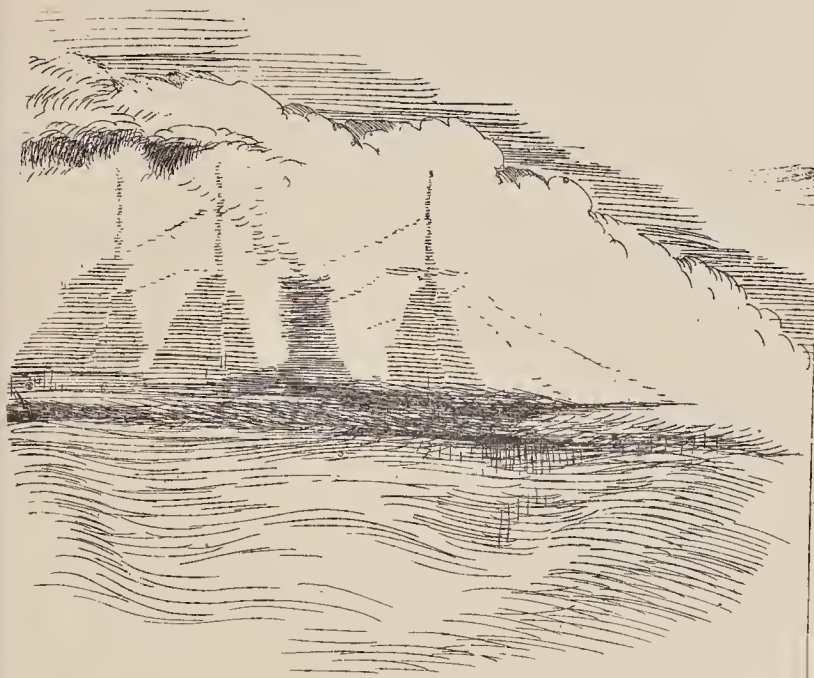

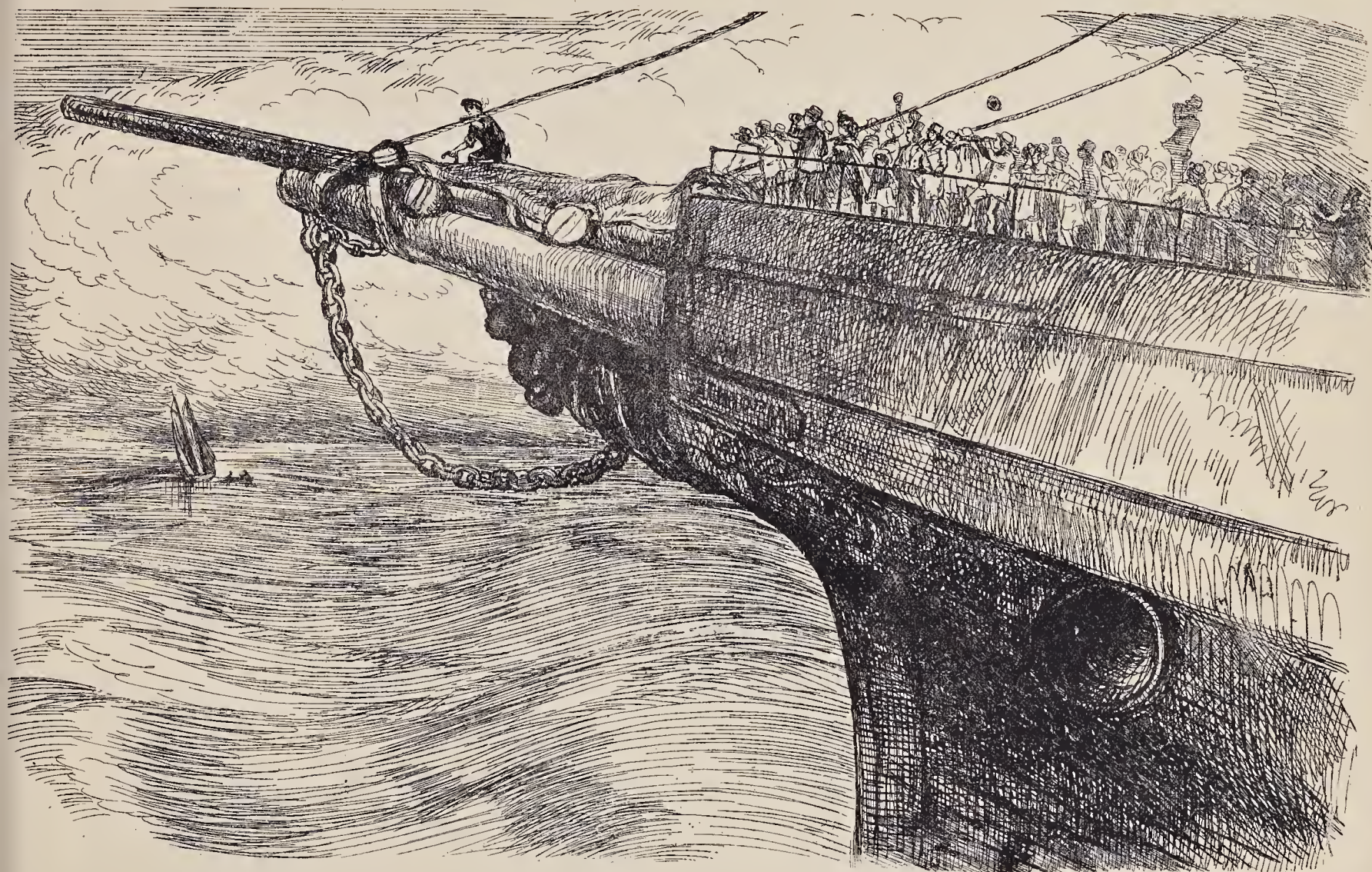

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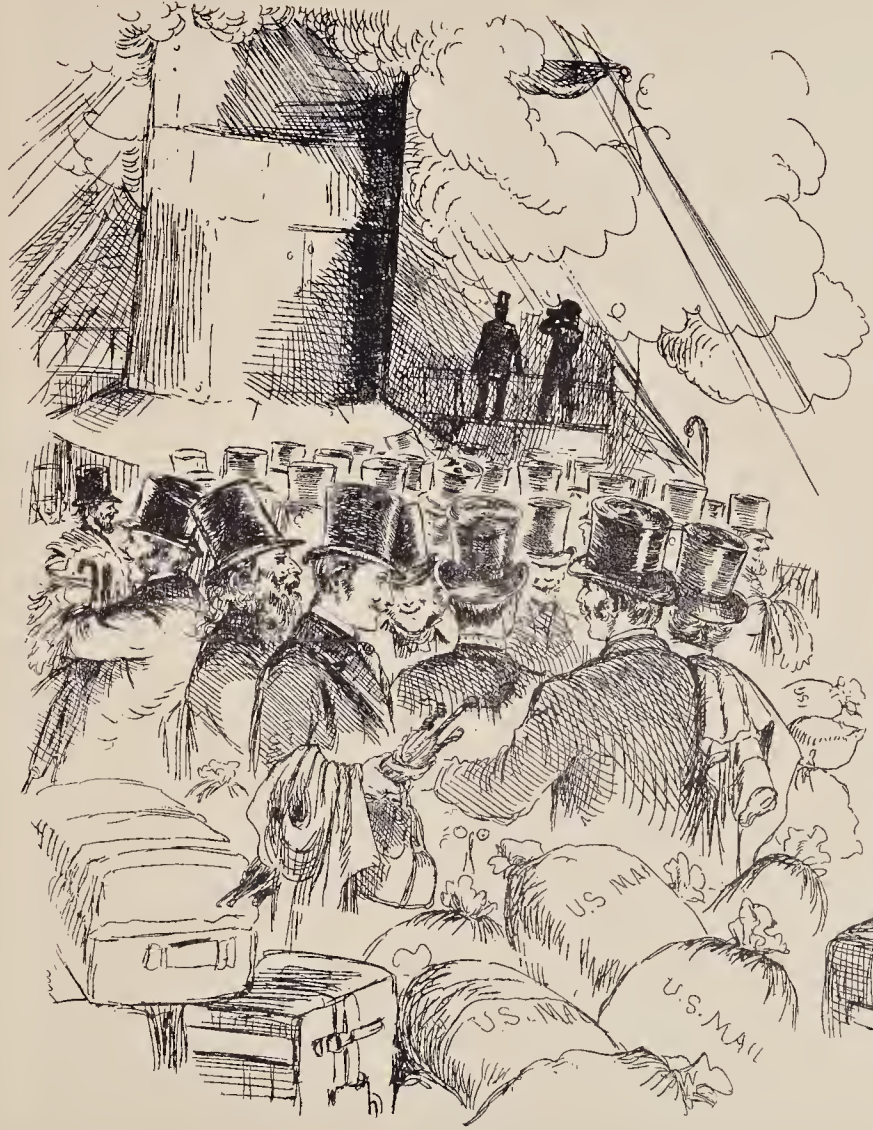
PILOT BOAT IN SIGHT.

- (1.) *Sudden appearance of stove-pipe hats on the deck,—a sure sign that the voyage is at an end.*



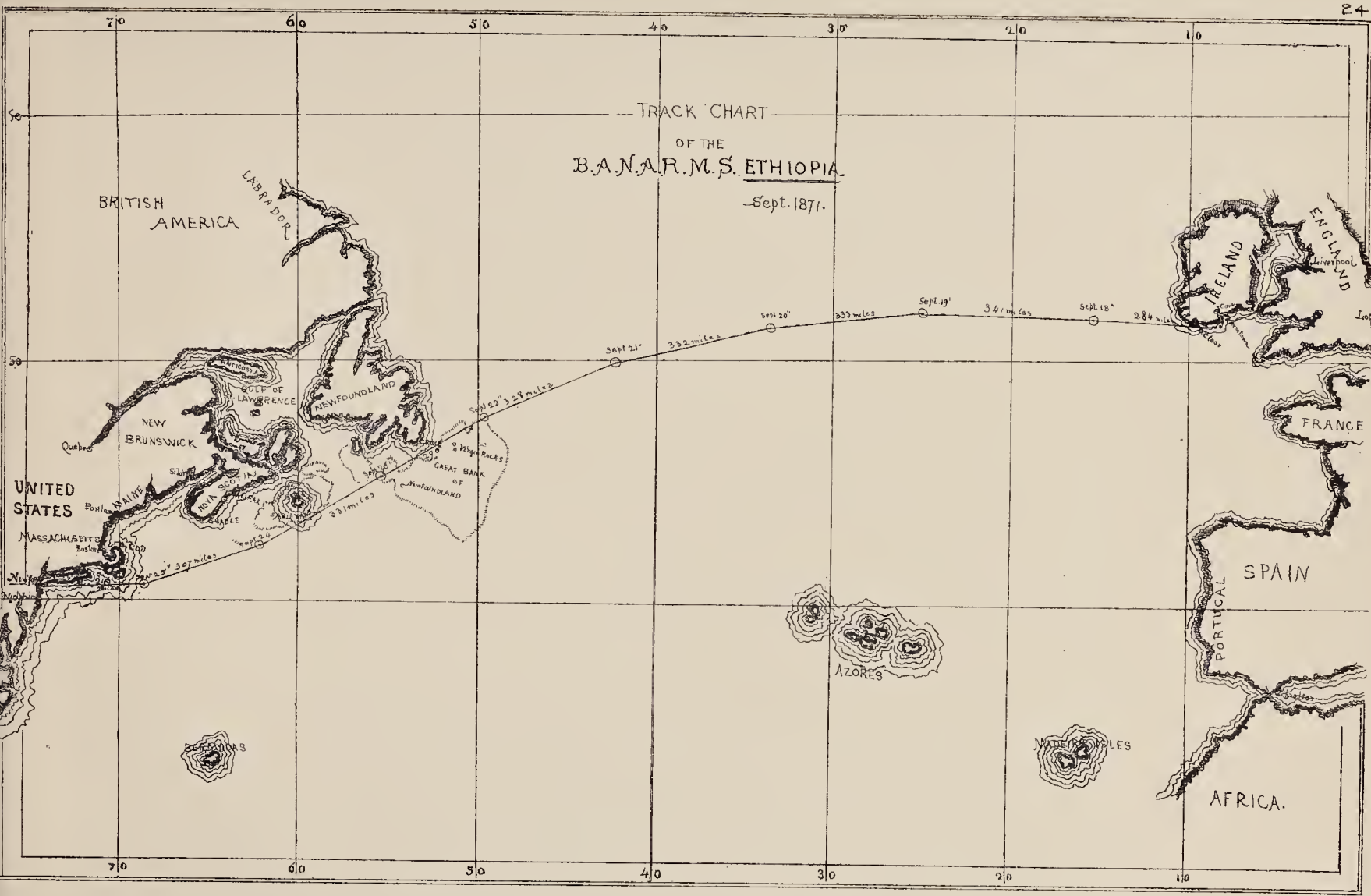

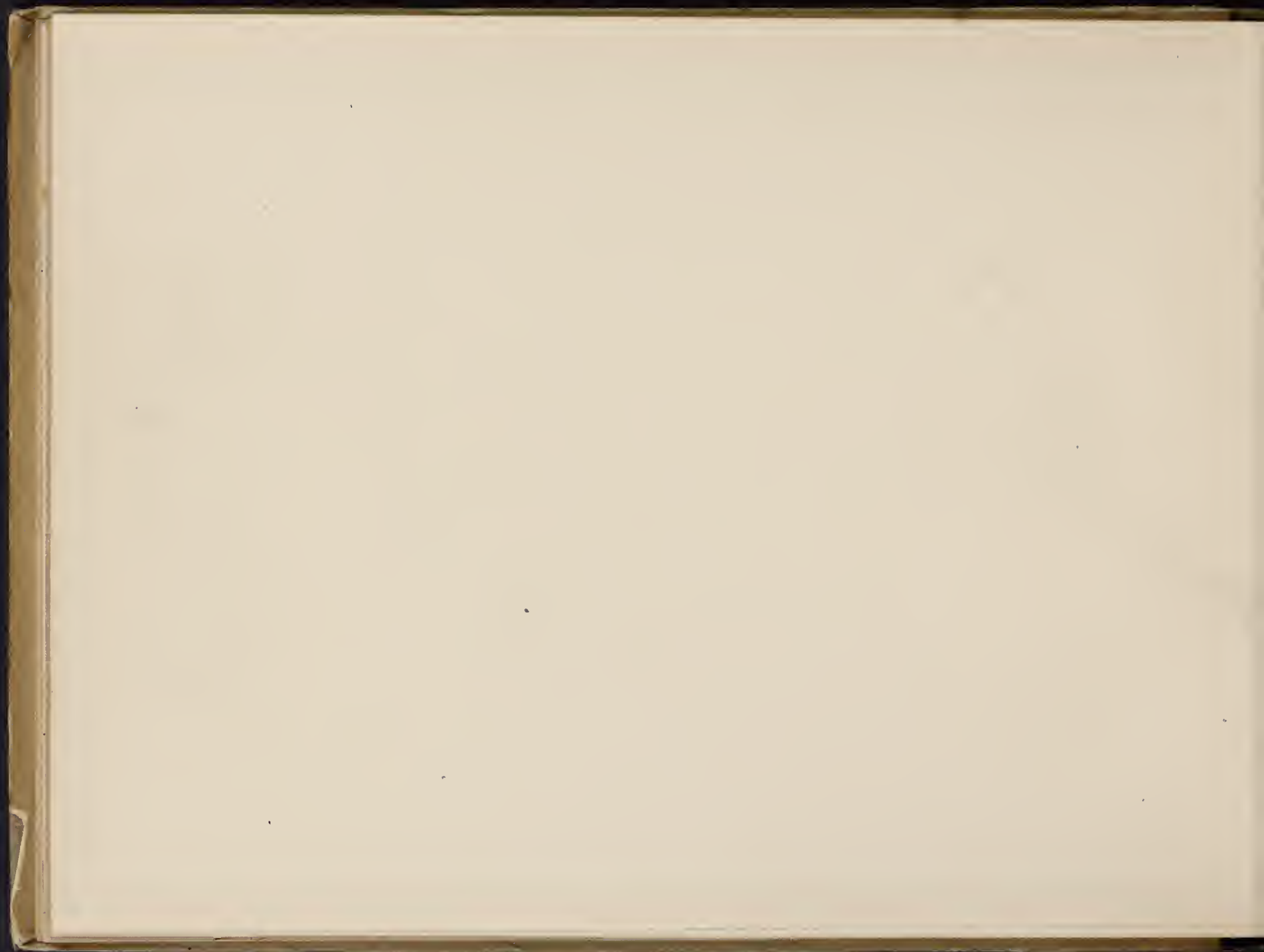
The charming Miss Belle Tobias, having lost her twenty-fifth trunk, with no mark upon it, her numerous admirers gallantly offer to hunt it up.

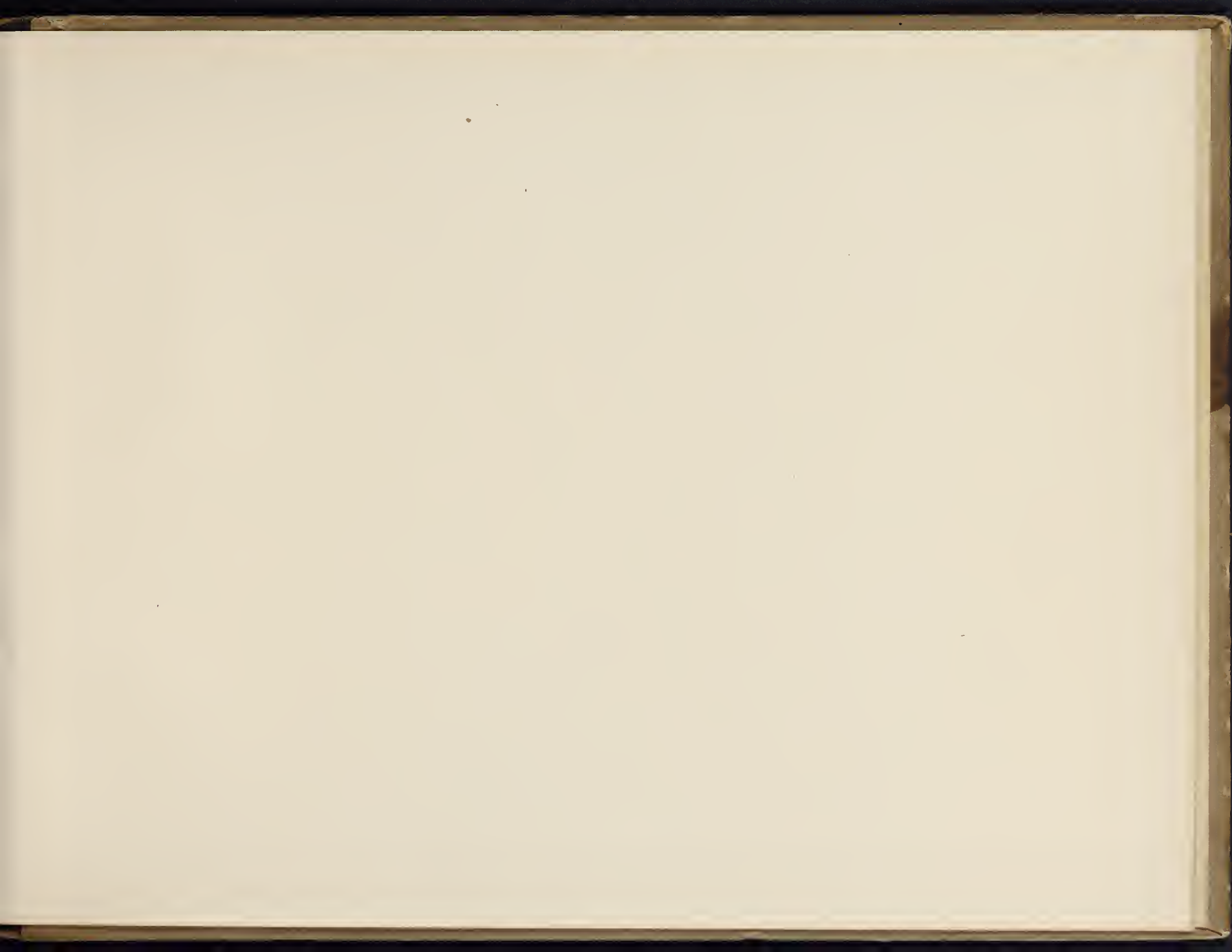


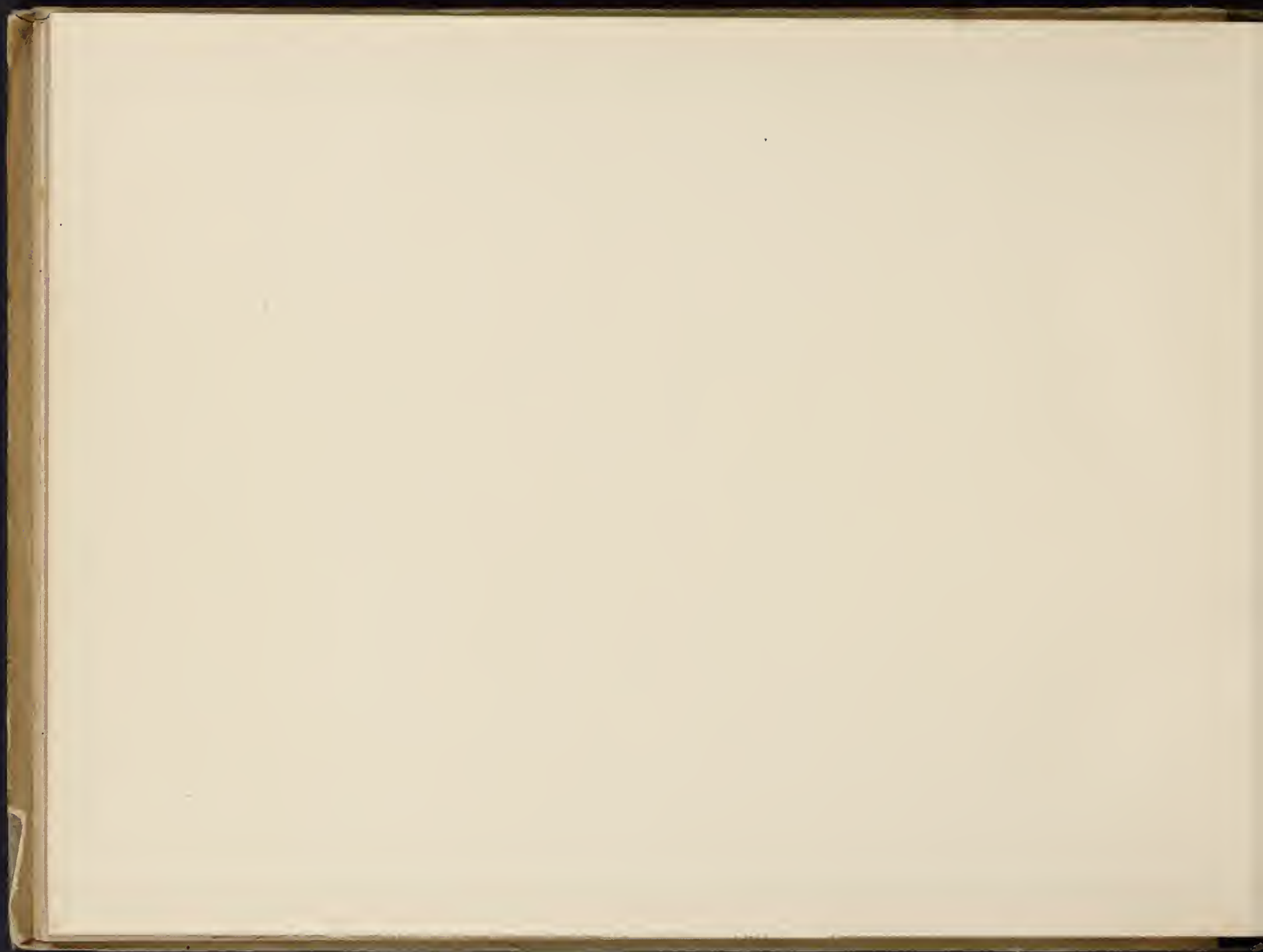
CHART OF THE RUN OF THE SHIP.
