Recognition Granted

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| Canada | Sending envoys to confirm Kiev's stance on nuclear weapons, arms control, CSCE, and other international agreements. |
| Poland | Expressed hope Ukraine will abide by CSCE, arms control, and human rights agreements. |
| Russia | Suggested diplomatic recognition will be conditioned on Ukrainian respect for human and minority rights, open borders, and responsible controls over nuclear weapons. Has designated an ambassador. |

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| Australia | Watching Ukraine's interrepublic relationships and control of nuclear weapons. |
| Austria | Will act in line with EC countries. |
| Czechoslovakia | Will recognize in the near future. |
| Estonia | Waiting for official vote count. |
| Finland | Will open consulate initially and subsequently recognize Ukraine. |
| France | Will act in concert with EC. |
| Germany | Sending special envoy to discuss debt repayment and nuclear arms issues. |
| India | Will establish ambassador-level mission. |
| Israel | Plans to open consulate. |
| Japan | Monitoring Ukrainian position on nuclear proliferation and economic reforms. |
| Romania | Has declared readiness to establish relations but issue of territories claimed by Bucharest remains an irritant. |
| South Korea | Will follow lead of "other Asian countries." |
| Sweden | Wants Kiev to declare support for CSCE, disarmament, and nuclear-free status. |
| Switzerland | Waiting for federal cabinet vote. |
| Taiwan | Speeding up its efforts but announcement will come "at an appropriate time." |
| UK | Will consult Allies. |
