Ottawa, Nov. 14. (Special)—The annual report of the inland revenue department for the inspection of weights and measures and gas and electric light, for the year ending the 30th of June last, was published and distributed to-day. The revenue for weights and measures was \$37,132, compared with \$59,483 for 1895. The expenditure was \$69,896 as against \$71,040 for the previous year, Commissioner Minit in his report says the expenditure might be lessened without affecting the efficiency of the service by reducing the assistant inspectors. The revenue collected for gas and gas meters was \$17,824, as compared with \$17,202 for 1895. The expenses were \$21,335, against \$20,773 for 1895.

Jones held several positions in this city, but some time ago he started in the stationery business at 62 Amsterdam avenue, where he lived. He was frequently heard of and claimed to be a very advanced man. In this city, he was recognized as a North of Ireland Irishman, but as the alliance was not sectarian in its principles, Jones' religion was 400 Jar to his becoming a member. The last heard of him in this city was about ten weeks ago, when he left here telling his friends he was going to Ireland to secure some property which had been left to him through the death of a relative.

SATOLLI'S REPORT.

On the Actions of Bishop Keane Late of the Catholie-University.

London, Nov. 13.—Cardinal Satolli has presented to the Pope his report on religious factions in the United States. Although this document is destined not to be published, it is nevertheless perfectly well known what it contains. Cardinal Satolli makes a veritable accusation against Bishop Kenne and the Catholic University of the United States at Washington. He accuses Bishop Kenne of baving in several public speeches uttered opinions which bordered on heresy, and says that to accord with Archbishop Ireland he endeavored to acclimatize a neocatholicism (New Catholicism) on American soil. Cardinal Satolli says the university at Washington had become the place where the most bold and risky theories were putforward. Fortunately, he says, the removal of Bishop Keane has cut short the evil at its root, but the bishop left behind dangerous disciples in the persons of numerous professors of this university, and the Cardinal advises the Pope to deprive them of their offices.

Well Known Musical Director Under Care of Doctors.

New York, Nov. 14.—An inquiry into the mental condition of Achille Tomasis to be made by Dr. Flint and a sheriff's jury by order of the supreme central. Pittsburg, Nov. 12.—The Commercial Gazette says: After many futile attempts, the bolt and nut mannfacturers of the country will organize a combination better known as a selling pool. Joshua II. 



By means of an invention of Dr. Thomas McKendrick, a noted expert in electro-thereuties of Glasgow, Scotland, it is possible for the deaf to hear music. To accomplish it the deaf person must dip his hands into a tub of water. A phonograph is used for supplying the music. The sound waves are directed to a regular telephone transmitter. The transmitter connects with a series of batteries under the tub, connecting therewith. The harmony is carried to the brain through the hands.

The principle on which Dr. McKeedrick based his idea is one which is but little understood. Water is one of the best conductors of electricity known. Dr. William Harvey King, an electrotherapeutical expert of New York, who has studied Dr. McKendrick's discovery, said in the New York Herald a few days ago that the great difficulty which I wal always baffled experimenters in this line was that the batteries used did not produce the perfect rhythmical vibrations necessary.

"We have made this experiment with

"We have made this experiment with the Faradic battery," said Dr. King. "but, to speak technically for a moment, the long period of cessation between the 'make' and the 'break' destroys the rhythm, and consequently the sensation is not transmitted. The European expert has prepared a special battery, the secret of which he still retains."

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
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
