NOT SURPRISED AT LATEST OUTRAGE

British Officials Expected Some Such German Act as Sinking of Britannic

GERMANS THINK SUCH ACTS BRING PEACE NEAR

Having Attacked Hospital Ship

London, Nov. 23.—(By Arthur S. Draper.)—That the loss of life when the great White Star steamship Britannic, being used by the British as a hospital ship was sunk by a German submarine in the Aegean Sea, was as small as announced was due in part to cool-headed seamanship, and in part to the comeamanship and in part to the com plete equipment of lifesaying apparatus on the vessel. The ship carried 48 life-boats and each of the specially-contructed davits lowered three boats sim ultaneously. The captain of the Britan-nic, C. A. Bartlett, is known as a re-sourceful and experienced seamen, and shipping men here give him full credit

'Apart from the feeling of rage at the diabolical contravention by the Ger-mans of the laws of war and humanity in the torpedoing of passenger ships without warning and hospital ships, the British regret this disaster, as the Britannic was built to replace the flifated Titanic and as an answer to the tated Titanic and as an answer to the building of the great German liners, the Vaterland and the Imperator. It is a sad coincidence that these two great liners built in Britain for trans-Atlantic traffic both failed to see New York. The Titanic went down on her maiden voyage to the United States, and the Britannic was requisitlened. and the Britannic was requisitioned a a hospital ship before she had under taken her first trans-Atlantic trip.

The Britannic was launched at Bel-fast in February, 1914. She remained uncompleted until the outbreak of the war, after which she was finished at a total cost of \$8,000,000. The high cost was partly accounted for by the fact that after the Titanic disaster the original design was altered and the Britannic was fitted with a double hull below the waterline, the inner shell sel's bottom



The vivid stories of romance, descrip tive of the sea, penned by the famous novelist, Jack London, who has made his last port, will live as a perpetual monument to one of the most virile and most widely known writers.

Sailor, gold miner, tramp, writer ocialist, lecturer and journalist, he had a remarkable career. His life was cut short in its prime, the late povelist having been born at San Francisco in 1876. His early love of adventure de-veloped among the marine population of San Francisco bay, but he soon lost of San Francisco bay, but he soon lost his ideal romance and replaced it, with real romance. In turn he became salmon fisher, oyster pirate, schooner sailor, fish patrolman, longshoreman and general bay-faring adventurer. CHINESE CASES CONTINUED TO-DAY

Till To-morrow

Officers of the Chinese Consolidated Officers of the Chinese Consolidated Benevolent association were in the box the city council to devise a scheme to this merthing in the police court, when the ript charge against ten Chinese was proceeded with, a new interpreter man Todd, foreseeing that the council was proceeded with, a few interpreter having been secured more acceptable to counsel. Hearing of textimony went on slowly on account of the necessity of interpreting the examination, and only two witnesses were in the box to-day, Charlie Bo, president, and Yung Ling Sake, secretary of the association.

A prefiminary objection was taken this morning to allowing Harry Hast-ings, the interpreter, to act, on the ground that he had been in touch with the witnesses on the other side.

This protest having been formally entered, and an assurance being given that other plans could be made if desired, testimony continued.

Replying to Thornton Fell, K.C., Charlie Bo said he understood that the telegram with regard to religious doc-trine in China was of great importance to all Chinese.

Then if that was so, why did you hold a secret meeting without notice being given on September 20?—It was merely for the phrasing of the message.

Later, of the two telegrams drafted one was submitted to the Chinese consul in Vancouver, who eventually re-sponded, but the message was delayed

In delivery.

The cross-examination turned into the channels to show how other Chinamen might have known of the intentions of the committee of management of the Consolidated Benevolent association, and it seemed that some infima-tion had appeared in the Chinese newspaper published in Vancouver and also on the notice board at the corner of Government and Fisgard streets. There, however, was an interval be-tween these dates. Witness explained the reason why

witness explained the reason why he had not replied to the first letter was that it was signed by "the repre-sentative of the whole of the Chinese colonists here," and as there was no such office he took no notice of it. However, after the second letter from Ho Tet Yen was received, notice of a meeting was posted. The Consolidated society represented 90 per cent of the Chinese, the others not having enough members to be represented, according to witness.

Magistrate Jay questioned the relevancy of some of the evidence submitted, saying that the dispute about the courtesy of witness to his correspondents was not material. The letters were then put in, and witness admitted knowledge that some members of the Benevolent association might have been members of the Chee Kong Tong, the Chinese Premason fraternity.

Tong, the Chinese Freemason fra-ternity.

Coming down to the time of the actual disturbance, witness denied that he described Ho-Tet Yen as a dog, being the writor of the letter. What he had said was that the criticism in the press (apparently referring to the Chinese newspaper here), was like the barking of a dog. After the outbreak occurredof a dog. After the cutbreak occurred some one cried to have the door-closed, another to have it remain open. He denied that he had invited Ho Tet Yery there in order to have a scene and insult him before the grown of the crown of the company of sult him before the crowd.

Bo denied that there as an as-sembled party within the hall. There was no politics in the Benevolent association. He had frequently been in the hall of the Chee Kong Tong, but had not seen anything like the pike ex-hibited there. He did not know whether the Chi-

nese newspaper, to which he had made reference as the publisher of the notice, was controlled by the Chee Kong Tong

in Vancouver.

The secretary of the association, Yung Ling Sake, was next called, and gave evidence as to events preceding the rict. He stated what happened as between the president and Ho Tet Yen, the former chiding the latter for claiming to represent the Chinese societies as a whole, as was claimed in the protest letter. Like the last witness, he heard the words "Da-da" "Strike, leat") shouted out before the struggle-





Although the innate conservatism of teachers the world over is proverbial, I think it may be conceded that a new country (such as ours) offers more hopeful possibilities for a really new breat in educational interest than the older countries, and accordingly I shall look forward with great interest to any propeals which our new government may make in this direction. FRANCE AND RUSSIA **ARE USING CHINESE**

War Plants and Free Fighters

Washington, Nov. 22.—France and Russia, the American government has learned, are importing thousands of Chinese and Indo-Chinese to work in muniting factorie; and arsenals to free their native workmen for military duty. The number already put to work in French plants is estimated at 25,000, with 30,000 more under contract by permission of the Chinese government for four years service in France. Russia has contracted 20,000, of whom 5,00 have reached the country.

Most of the Orientals are trained artisans, drawing wages in some instances as high as \$5 a day. Specially chartered ships are moving them to France, while Russis is transporting them by way of the Trans-Siberian railway.

Mr. Miller left Vancouver on Jene 23, 1914, on the Hudson Bay Company's gas boat, Fort McPherson, with instructions to establish at Herschel island a base from which other posts might be supplied. He had with him a crew of six. The first year they got as far as Peint-Barrow, where they were frozen in for twenty-two days. Being unable to make any headway they returned to winter in Teller Bay, near Nome. In July of 1915 they were able to get away, accompanying them being the big Hudson-Bay Company freight boat, Ruby. That year they reached Herschel island, where they established the base—the most northerly post of the left trading company—after unloading Mr. Miller left Vancouver on June 28, base—the most northerly post of the big trading company—after unloading there proceeding over to Baillie island, and there also establishing a post. The expedition wintered the boats at Kittigaznit, in the Mackenzie Delta. By June 16 this year, the ice clearing much erriler than usual, they started up the Mackenzie, going as far as Red River Crossing, where one of the older forts of the company is still in operation, and after leaving supplies of flour, groceries, etc., they returned to Herschel island. This point they reached on July 12.

Superior in appearance, habits and intelligence to the Esquimo proper he maintains that they much more resemble the Norwegian peasant or fisher-folk. The term "blonde" is used purely for comparative reasons, as in the sense in which the expression is used ordinarily it has no justification. Not once did he sea any of the tribe with any but black hair, and there is merely an "inclination to blue" in the eye-coloring. The skin, on the contrary, is no darker than any Englishman's might become under a season's exposure to the burning refection of the sun's rays off the sinys rays of the sinys rays of the single si

the men in their hunting expeditions. Hitherto their special weapon has been the bow and arrow, and men, women, and children alike are very expert in the use of this. Mr. Miller once put a bit of board with a knot about fifty feet distant from a twelve-year-old boy, who took quick aim, and struck the knot, the arrow going through the centre of the hole. With bow and arrow they hunt bear, cariboo, deer and fox. Dr. Anderson left with them a .22 rife and a .30 rife, and these they regarded with great pride. Trapping was unknown to them and Mr. Phillips, who was left in chargs of the Hudson Bay station at Fort Beacon, is initiating them at the same time how to trap so as to protect the game.

Big game is plentiful. Cariboo and deer abound. The native has not icarned the value of the fox fur, and there were many of the skins of the white fox, which is moderately plentiful, lying about, some left where the animal was killed, while in other cases they were being used as dish cloths, for towels, for floor mops, in fact for any household purpose where they were found useful. Red fox was more rarely seen, and there were only occasional silver and black fox.

They have their separate sleeping places, but a big common dining-room. The tribe amongst whom we were numbered 60 or 70. They all brought something to the common table, a bit of dried fish, cariboo, or whatever it might be. A head woman did the serving out, and everyone get a share supparently outle conone got a share, apparently quite con tent with what was given him. And the children were always well treated. In fact the more civilized races might take some lessons on child management from these people."

All the cooking utensils are of stone.
The mysteries of the cuisine are not difficult to learn. A long hollow stone trough, about four feet in length, fitted at intervals with pegs, filled with whale at vintervals with pegs, filled with whale or seal oil, constitutes the stove. On this are placed the stone pots in which the fish or meat is cooked. The stove stands on a low board table about four inches off the floor, and round this the diners sit, eating right out of the cook pot when their turn comes. The hollow horn of the musk ox forms the drinking cup. Up to the present the blonde Esquimo has had a few simple drinks—water, a simple sour wine made from the cranberry withen grows in a wild state on a low shrub, and tea, which is infused from the dried leaf of a shrub which is found commonly about the country. The last mentioned beverage is the favorite, and Mr. Miller evidently found a common sympathy with this race when he discovered their weakness for "the cup that cheers but
