What the Liberal Government Has Done in Four Years' Work

### Land and Agriculture.

In 1917 the Government passed the Land Settlement and Development Act, to grant loans enabling farmers to extend their erations in production. To take over from private owners land held out of production and sell it to bona fide settlers.

The Land and Settlement Board was instrumental in forming Tattle clubs in 1919, resulting in the distribution of 908 cattle and 205 sheep supplied on extended payments.

As a result of the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, to which ents were passed, B. C. now holds first place in Canada for healthy herds. In certain sections the reactors to tuberculin tests have decreased from 35 per cent, to 3% per cent. Financial assistance has been given to Live Stock Associations

And, as a result of demonstrations given under the Department of Agriculture 65 silos have been creeted.

Under the Oliver Government, British Columbia lands are dis-posed of on the basis of use by actual settlers only.

Half a million acres have been taken up by genuine settlers in the last three years.

### Public Works

Large sums of money, averaging \$2,600,000 annually, have been spent in the construction and reconstruction of highways in British Columbia, and the physical nature of the country makes it necossary to spend increasingly large sums every year in order that the vast matural resources of the Frovince may be adequately developed and suitable transportation afforded existing and prospective settlers.

### Mines and Fisheries.

Sane and Progressive Mining Legislation wisely administered. Government Mining Engineers in field-Mining roads and trails constructed-Aid in development of mining properties.

British Columbia's iron ore resources demonstrated and Iron and Steel Industry encouraged.

Prospectors protected and assisted-Higher standard of work-conditions for coal and metal miners.

Every safeguard known to mining science provided underground workers

In administration of Fisheries Department adoption of policy, of Perpetuation of Salmon of Pacific as well as broader industrial detempment of Fisheries.

# Taxation Department.

This Department has been reorganized and put on a business

All persons entitled to pay Personal Property Tax or Income Tax are now obliged to make proper returns to the Department.

Mining Companies, Coal Companies and Canneries were brought under the Income Tax Act. Previous to this administration they did not pay income tax.

Arrears outstanding nearly 20 years when this Government came into office have since been collected and a business system of collection put in force.

An audit system in connection with returns for personal prop-erty and income tax has been established, with wonderful results.

Up to November 4, 1920, no less than 72.134 accidents have been dealt with since the Workmen's Compensation Act came into force in 1917. Compensation has been paid to workmen amounting to over \$2,300,000,00. New claims are being filed at the rate of 70 per day, and claims are being adjusted on an average of from five to seven days after the reports are received from all parties concerned.

### To Returned Men.

# The return for the fiscal year 1918-19 showed that 114 returned men had been employed in permanent positions, and 109 in tempor-ary positions. In other words, in that year 90 per cent, of the va-cant positions went to returned men. Compared with other western provinces, this percentage is about double Saskatchewan's case, and more than double in the other cases. A report from the Civil Ser-vice Commissioner, bringing the matter down to quite recent date, showed that out of 187 appointments made, 89 went to returned men, 81 to women and juniors, and only 17 to civilians. That is to say, 34 per cent, were returned men. In March, 1920, the record of the Civil Service Office shows that 203 men had been reinsflied, not a single man unplaced, and the increases in subries had gone overseas have had their former, or else better, positions restored to them, excepting only a few who did not desire to return to Govern-ument employ. The return for the fiscal year 1918-19 showed that 114 returned

ment employ. The record of appointments to the Civil Service for the past four years shows that out of a total of 598 adult male appointments and reinstatements made, 526 were returned men and only 72 were civilians. It should be noted that, owing to the high salaries paid in industrial enterprises, there have been more changes in the Civil Service than ordinarily. Since Jahuary, 1918, 141 men have been sworn in as Provincial Constables. Of these 129 were returned citizens. Out of 80 other appointments to branches of the depart-ments, 73 went to returned citizens. Of the remaining seven, four were functor appointments not acceptable to veterans. OUT OF 16 APPOINTMENTS AVAILABLE TO RETURNED CITIZENS, OLV 3 WENT TO CIVILIANS.


