John Bradford continued its publication to March 31, 1802, at which date he placed his son Daniel Bradford in charge, and purchased and conducted himself, the Kentucky Herald, which he edited for seven years entirely separate from the Gazette, to the conduct of which he returned on 26 September, 1809. He then sold his interests to Thomas Smith, who associated John Bickley with him in its management. In 1814, Fielding Bradford junior, son of one of the original proprietors, secured control, and associated with him in its management, John Norvell, and remained in possession until 1825, when it again passed into the possession of John Bradford. In 1835, his son Daniel Bradford again became its proprietor, associating with him in its control his nephew, Thomas Bradford. In 1840, Joshua Cunningham, formerly a foreman in the office, purchased the Gazette, which, owing to the failure of health and loss of patronage, he finally ceased issuing in 1848.

Late in that year Peter Freneau was admitted to partnership, under the firm name of Freneau & Williams, which continued to the year 1811. Beginning in January, 1811, the Gazette was published by Peter Freneau & Co. to the end of the year; and, in January, 1812, J. Elliott and Samuel Richards, two practical printers, who formed the Company with Freneau, printed and published the Gazette to the end of the year 1814. From the first of July, 1815, to the close of 1816, the Gazette was printed by Samuel Haveland Skinner, and published by Ebenezer Smith Thomas, a nephew of Isaiah Thomas. In January, 1816, Samuel Haveland Skinner and Joseph Whilden, under the firm name of Skinner & Whilden, became its printers and publishers to the end of 1819, when Skinner withdrew, leaving the sole conduct of the Gazette was absorbed by The Courier in 1837, of which the News and Courier of the present day is the direct successor.
