

Well, unlike many other sites, you can...

...verify the references that suppor a claim.

...ask for a reference when you find a "suspicious" claim.

...and provide reliable sources to support an existing claim.




Hypothesis: [citation needed]


Most readers are not aware of this crowdsourced reliability checking system.


By making it both more prominent and easy on mobile we can:

- Increase the perception of reliability.
- Increase the reliability (more users adding/requesting citations).
- Keep users engaged with new mobile microcontributions.

Verify references








Reference counter


References are grouped into a single counter. Something like "[11][12][13]" provides little value further than indicating there are 3 references for the parafraph.


Options

Users can view the current references or add new ones. Other actions are possible (e.g. remove citations) but they are not considered for simplicity.

Request references







Communicate the "Citation needed" concept.

Like "thanks" this can be a core and unique Wikipedian concept to build our social vocabulary. We need to further explore, but possible representations include:










Mobile-desktop integration


Users that connect to the desktop can get a notification that reminds them the possibility of providing a citation for the claim they requested one for.


Provide references











Input and explore facilities

Adding a link iis a non-trivial multi-step process. We can provide shortcuts to "paste from clipboard" and open a new window/tab to make the process more fluent on mobile.

Smart defaults

References are not only a link, but the link provided by the user can be used to prefill the reference information and save the user from extra typing.

Users can edit this info to make corrections.
