

MOVIE QUESTION

NEAR-BY RESIDENTS SAY NO; BUSINESS MEN SAY YES; TRUSTEES DIVIDED

There was an unusual amount of oratory, gesticulation, and personal insinuation at the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale last evening, when the hearing of the protests against the operating of a moving picture studio at night on the Dr. Charles Bachman property on East Windsor Road, came up for hearing.

It seems that Dr. Bachman has been the owner of the studio for some eight years at this location, and the question of whether it has been really in active use all the time is one that opinions differed upon last evening. But, at any rate, since its installation, residence property in close proximity has been purchased and dwellings erected thereon, and now it comes to pass that several weeks ago a very active moving picture company took possession of the (Continued on Page 2)

COMMERCIAL STREET

BOARD OF TRUSTEES VOTES TO DENY PROTEST AGAINST OPENING STREET

The protest against the opening and improving of a street to be known as Commercial street, located in the western part of the city of Glendale, was denied by vote of the trustees of the City of Glendale at last evening's meeting.

This improvement comprises the forming of a street across the lots at the southwest intersection of Broadway and Central avenue, and also the opening and improving of a new street beginning at a point on Broadway 900 feet east of the San Fernando Road and extending in a northwesterly direction to a point on the San Fernando Road south of the old winery.

The action of the board at last evening's meeting means that proceedings for the opening of the street will go on as rapidly as possible.

Busy Thoroughfare

The San Fernando Road is one of the busiest highways in all the Southland. Many thousand dollars worth of ranch products and manufactured commodities pass over it every day. One can stand beside it in the middle of the day and see large trucks innumerable whirl by laden with watermelons, cantaloupes and casabas from the wide fields in the upper San Fernando Valley devoted to this culture, boxes of peaches, pears and other fruits from the orchards, great piles of baled hay from the meadows and manufactured goods of many kinds from the Burbank factories. And this traffic seems to be increasing rapidly, as well as the number of pleasure autos constantly passing in both directions.

GLENDALE'S FAME

KNOWN FAR AND WIDE FOR ITS WONDERFUL GROWTH AND PROGRESS

Oma Fish of the Chevrolet agency received a letter a few days ago from his son, Nurle, who is employed on Rankin's cattle ranch of 20,000 acres about forty miles from Bakersfield, in which he remarked how Glendale was advertised throughout the state for its wonderful growth. He heard it commented on in the isolated neighborhood where the ranch is located and enclosed a clipping from a San Francisco paper which a friend of his who knew he was from Glendale had handed to him. It is headed, "Glendale Proposes Sewer Bond Issue," and reads as follows:

"Glendale's city trustees have decided to conduct a campaign of education on the city's sewage disposal problem. A bond issue for the installation of sewers and septic tanks is considered as the only alternative to annexation to Los Angeles, thereby gaining an outlet to the sea. It is understood that construction of a large tourist hotel is held up pending settlement of the sewerage problem."

Nurle writes his parents that he likes the life on the big ranch, where 5000 cattle are kept and require constant attention.

A garage and a one-room addition thereto, for a temporary residence for E. W. Richardson, is being constructed at 210 West Laurel by T. H. Addison, to cost \$300.

TRUSTEES' MEETING

PATTERSON AVENUE AND COMMERCIAL STREET PROTESTS ARE DENIED

The board assembled at 8 o'clock, August 19, 1920, Trustees Bartlett, Henry, Robinson, Shaw and Stephenson being present.

The hearing of protests against the opening of Patterson avenue was called up at this time and Judge Lowe addressed the board favoring the proposition. The protests filed against the improvement were read and on motion of Trustee Henry were denied.

The hearing of protests against the opening of Commercial street was taken up; no one appearing to address the board on this subject and protests having been read at a previous meeting, on motion of Trustee Stephenson, the protests were denied.

A communication was read from W. S. Traphagen and a number of other residents on Louise street north of Doran street, requesting that the provisions of the ordinance prohibiting the use of sidewalks for roller-skating and similar devices, be enforced. On motion of Trustee Henry the City Marshal was instructed to enforce the ordinance generally throughout the city.

Communication was read from Los Angeles Automobile Trade Association stating that a committee of that association desires to meet with a committee of the Board of Trustees of Glendale to discuss the local fire ordinance. On motion of Trustee Stephenson, the Chairman of the Board was requested to appoint a committee consisting of the Fire Marshal, Superintendent of Buildings and a member of the Board of Trustees to meet with the committee named in the communication. In accordance with the resolution, the chairman appointed Trustee Henry to serve as a member of the committee.

Mr. H. H. Davenport presented to the trustees deeds covering portions of a number of lots in Tr. 314 in the City of Glendale, for alley purposes. On motion of Trustee Bartlett it was ordered that the same be accepted. J. N. McGillis presented a request for permission to hold a political meeting at the corner of Brand and Broadway, Monday evening, August 23, 1920. Communication referred to the City Manager with instructions to inform Mr. McGillis that a permit is not necessary.

The chairman of the board announced the appointment of the following members of the committee on zoning the city: E. F. Parker, Mrs. A. A. Barton, Mrs. A. P. Bartlett, L. T. Rowley, C. W. Ingledue, F. H. Vesper and Mr. Hill.

A communication was read from George W. Haines, desiring to be informed as to whether the city is willing to sell a small tract of land owned by it just north of where Colorado (Continued on Page 12)

When he had reached the Chevrolet agency he started to cross Broadway, passing between two autos that were standing by the curb. Just as he stepped out from between the autos a machine driven west by L. Ross of 536 West California avenue, struck and knocked him down. Mr. Ross applied his brakes instantly and soon brought his car to a stop, after Mr. Wilson had been pushed forward, face downward, for a short distance. O. W. Tarr helped him up and took him quickly to Dr. Young's office where it was found that his face was badly bruised, especially above the right eye, but the injuries were not serious. Mr. Tarr took him to his home after his hurts were dressed and bandaged.

WARSAW'S DEFENSE STRENGTHENED

POLISH COUNTER OFFENSIVE IS SUCCESSFUL; GERMANS REPORTED CO-OPERATING WITH BOLSHIEVIKI

WARSAW, Aug. 20.—According to official Polish communique, the Poles are using another great army in a converging drive against the Russian center. The army defending Warsaw on the north has been relieved and is being used on the offensive.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The Polish encircling movement between Denblin and Brest Litovsk has taken the Russians in the rear, completely cutting off the retreat of the Russian army north of Warsaw, according to dispatches from the Polish capital today. The Polish counter offensive continues successfully along the entire battle front except in a small section in the Lemberg district, dispatches said. The Poles have taken a great quantity of ammunition and prisoners.

BERLIN, Aug. 20.—Polish military officials claimed to have recaptured Brest Litovsk according to advices from the American Mission at Posen.

WARSAW, Aug. 20.—German citizens in the invaded area are cooperating with the Bolsheviki, according to a Polish communique today. The Reds are employing terrorists methods in an effort to subdue the anti-Bolshevik population. The Poles have pushed the enemy back 80 to 100 miles from Warsaw.

SUFFRAGE SEEMS SAFE

SPEAKER WALKER OF TENNESSEE LEGISLATURE MAKES NO EFFORT TO FORCE RECONSIDERATION

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 20.—The lower house of the Tennessee Legislature met and adjourned today without an effort being made to force reconsideration of the Federal Woman Suffrage amendment. Speaker Walker did not move to reconsider. Suffragists said this indicates that Walker did not muster sufficient strength to attempt to overthrow the ratification at this time.

MEETING OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS

PRESIDENT WILSON SENDS CALL FOR CONFERENCE TO SECRETARY SIR ERIC DRUMMOND

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—President Wilson has issued a call for a meeting of the League of Nations to be held at Geneva on November 15, it was announced at the State Department today. The call has been sent to Sir Eric Drummond, Secretary of the League.

CLERK UNDER ARREST

CLYDE JOHNSTON IN COUNTY JAIL FOR ROBBING SAFE IN JUDGE CHESBRO'S COURT ROOM

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—Clyde Johnston, clerk in Judge Chesbro's court, was lodged in the county jail here today, following his indictment and arrest in connection with the robbery of a safe in Judge Chesbro's court room of some \$30,000 some days ago. Johnston was held on \$30,000 bail.

HUNGER STRIKERS RIOT

TWO HUNDRED PRISONERS IN MARYLAND PENITENTIARY PROTEST AGAINST FOOD SERVED

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 20.—Seventy hunger strikers rioted in a dormitory of the penitentiary here early today. Nearly 200 prisoners had been on a hunger strike for two days protesting against the quality and quantity of food given them. They succeeded in doing \$10,000 damage to the prison before being subdued by streams of water from fire hose.

U. S. ADVISES POLAND

MUST NOT REPEAT HER ADVANCES INTO RUSSIA IS THE STATE DEPARTMENT WARNING

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—Poland has been warned by the United States not to repeat her advances into Russian territory if the drive of her army is successful, it was officially stated here today.

GLENDALE PARTY OF FOUR BRING HOME EVIDENCE OF PROWESS

Perry Rentfrow, Ray Galvin, James Farrell and George E. Clayton arrived at home today from a ten-days' hunting trip, hot, tired and dusty, but proudly carrying with them in their auto a three-point buck, which was laid low by Mr. Rentfrow's unerring rifle, and fully a hundred golden trout which had been caught in the mountain streams. They went up to Cottonwood Lakes, 250 miles on the slopes of Mt. Whitney, travelling by auto to Lone Pine and then by horse and pack train twenty-five miles up the mountain side to their destination, where the weather was decidedly cold. They ascended to a height of 12,000 feet. The fishing was excellent, but deer were very scarce. There were no accidents of any kind to mar the enjoyment of the hunters and fishermen.

CHIEF'S REQUESTS

TWO NEW POLICEMEN WANTED—NEW AUTOMOBILE—NO DOG CATCHING

Chief C. E. Stanley appeared before the Board of Trustees of the city of Glendale at last evening's meeting and asked that he be furnished with two more policemen, one to serve as a night motor policeman, and the other to be on duty as a regular policeman. He also asked that a new automobile be furnished the Police Department, stating that the one now in use has not sufficient speed to serve the purpose for which it is intended. Its worn out condition also makes an unnecessary expense to keep it in repair.

Mr. Stanley also asked the board to relieve the Police Department from the embarrassment and humiliation of catching dogs throughout various parts of the city. He said as conditions are at present one of the policemen will be in a remote part of the city inquiring about a stray dog when he is needed to attend to some important duty as pertaining to the law and order of the city.

The board seemed to consider Chief Stanley's requests in a favorable way but said it would be impossible for them to take any decisive action until a provision is made for the additional expense in the annual budget.

HELPED IN WAR

J. H. MURPHY, NEW RESIDENT OF GLENDALE, SERVED COUNTRY AT HOME

J. H. Murphy, who has recently come with his wife to Glendale to live, buying the Donnell place at 117 East Acacia avenue, is a man of considerable note. He was manager of the Prest-o-lite Company in Indianapolis, Ind., for a number of years and also helped to put out the first successful electric starters for automobiles. He came to California four years ago to rest, but the government importuned him to oversee the fitting of submarines building at Long Beach and San Pedro with storage batteries, and soon he was up to his eyes in work. He finally had charge of all this kind of electrical work for the army and navy, both, along the coast and in Arizona. When the war was over his old company impressed him into service again to shape up their work on this coast and he has been hard at it until just recently.

Mr. Murphy's father was John W. Murphy, for many years senior partner of the big wholesale house, the Murphy-Hibben Dry Goods Company. Mr. and Mrs. Murphy are both greatly pleased with Glendale as a home city.

Mrs. A. R. McPhail, accompanied by her infant daughter, Mary Jane, returned yesterday from Parkerville, Kan., where she was called five weeks ago on account of the serious illness of her mother, Mrs. Jane Barber. The mother's condition became so improved that Mrs. McPhail thought it safe to leave her bedside and return to her home in Glendale. Mr. McPhail, who was in Kansas attending to business affairs, is now in Spokane, Wash., but will soon return to his home in this city. The McPhails reside at 318 Ivy street.

PERMITS \$322,017

AUGUST ALREADY FAR EXCEEDS ANY PREVIOUS MONTH IN CITY'S HISTORY

This wonderful month of August already shows permits far in excess of any previous entire month in the city's history. Up to last night with just sixteen working days, the record showed a total valuation in permits of \$322,017. Included in this are the Glendale Research Hospital buildings, \$66,000, and Mattison B. Jones' four-room business building at the corner of Wilson avenue and Brand, \$3000. The remaining \$253,000 is for residences, garages, additions and remodelings. So far, 110 permits have been issued this month, sixty-nine of them for residences, ranging in price from \$1000 to \$7750.

property and has been making wild west scenes during the night hours. As there was some firing of revolvers, loud calling, with a sprinkling of music and dancing, the residents living in that locality claimed it disturbed their rest, and appeared before the Board of Trustees a week ago with a protest asking that the nuisance be abated. After hearing the pro and con on the question the board decided to postpone the hearing until last evening, when there appeared at the City Hall a fair representation of both sides.

Attorney Wilson, of the law firm of Jones, Wilson & Stephenson, appeared in behalf of the moving picture company, and Messrs. Pelley, Heacock and Howes, and Mesdames Tight and Howes represented the protestants. Trustee Stephenson announced at the opening of the hearing that on account of a member of his law firm being attorney for one of the sides, he would not take any part in the discussion, and asked to be relieved from voting on the question when put to a vote.

Attorney Wilson, on behalf of Dr. Bachman and the moving picture company, explained that the firing of revolvers would not be necessary in the production of their work, and that much of the noise about which complaint had been made at the previous meeting could be avoided, but he insisted that it would be necessary at times to do night work. Messrs. Pelley, Heacock and others explained that it would be impossible for the studio to be in operation at night and not disturb the peace of nearby residents.

After considerable heated discussion, and a number of personal insinuations, a vote on the question was called for by Chairman Shaw, which resulted in a division of the board. Trustees Henry and Robinson voting in favor of having the protest denied, and Trustees Bartlett and Shaw voting against the denial. The question now remains just where it was before action was taken by the board at last evening's meeting.

A petition signed by 250 business men of Glendale was presented at the opening of the hearing, asking that the section in which the Bachman studios are now located, be declared a moving picture zone, and that the company now operating there be allowed to proceed with its work. Later in the evening an ordinance was placed on first reading designating that moving picture companies must not operate in the residence section of the city later than 9 o'clock p. m.



U. S. Oasis May Die

TIA JUANA, Lower California, Aug. 20.—(United Press).—Passage of this famous gambling and racing center, long the mecca of American sportsmen and tourists, loomed today as the outcome of peace negotiations between the Mexican Federal government and Governor Estaban Cantu, Lower California chief executive through several Mexican revolutions.

Along with Mexicali, across the border from Calexico, Tia Juana, only seventeen miles from San Diego, has grown in importance as the center of racing, drinking and gambling, until it has become internationally famous.

Now the prosperous American concessionaires are facing the problem of disposing of property worth millions of dollars in the way of liquor stocks, gambling halls, and other sideshows of the sporting world.

Under the rulership of Governor Cantu, both the state government and concessionaires have enjoyed tremendous profits, particularly after January 16, 1920. Now Governor Cantu is faced with political extinction, while owners of large liquor stocks fear their property will be confiscated by the Mexican Federal government.

Americans here point out that the virtually independent rule of the province by Governor Cantu under which drinking and vice resorts flourished, has been a thorn in the side of the de la Huerta government for months. The de facto government, following the flight of President Carranza, placed rigid restrictions on resorts along the Texas and Arizona border. Cantu, however, refused to follow central government orders to close Tia Juana and Mexicali.

Thousands of tourists have annually visited here, some of them avowedly on "slumming parties," others to escape the great American drought. During the "hundred days" of racing here last winter, sportsmen from all parts of the country, including all classes of followers of the turf sport, made this their headquarters.

Mexicali has enjoyed similar "wide open" conditions. The "Owl," famous gambling resort of that city, is known to gamblers as one of the most unrestricted houses in the world.

Now, however, that the rule of the Federal government appears to be about to extend over this territory, old timers are sadly shaking their heads and murmuring, "It is bound to come."

"Passing of another oasis," seems a fitting characterization of the latest change in Lower California.

Length of Animal Life


Domestic animals seldom attain the age that Nature allows them. We grudge them their nourishment, over-tire them, and do not give them proper shelter. And then we take from them their milk, fleece, hide, flesh, in fact everything. How can you ever grow old when the butcher is waiting for you at the stable door with his knife? Useless to speak of these poor victims of our need: to give us long life, they do not live out their time. Supposing that an animal is well treated, that it suffers neither hunger nor cold, that it lives in peace without excessive fatigue, without fear or knacker or butcher; under these good conditions, how many years will it live?

A dog, at twenty or twenty-five years, can no longer drag himself along; a pig is a tottering veteran at twenty; at fifteen at the most a cat no longer chases mice—it says goodbye to the joys of the roof and retires to some corner of a granary to die in peace; the goat and sheep, at ten or fifteen, touch extreme old age; the rabbit is at the end of its skein at eight or ten; and the miserable rat, if it lives four years, is looked upon among its own kind as a prodigy of longevity.

The pigeon may live from six to

ten years; the guinea fowl, hen and turkey, twelve. A goose lives longer; it is true that in its quality of goose it does not worry. The goose attains twenty-five years, and even a good deal more. The goldfinch, sparrow, birds free from care, always singing, always frisking, happy as possible with a ray of sunlight in the foliage, and a grain of hemp seed, live as long as the gluttonous goose, and longer than the stupid turkey. These very happy little birds live from twenty to twenty-five years.

As to man, if he leads a regular life, he often lives to eighty or ninety. Sometimes he reaches a hundred or even more. But should he attain only the ordinary age, the average age, as they say, that is about forty, then he is to be considered a privileged character as to length of life. And besides, for man, my dear children, length of life is not measured exactly according to the number of years. He lives most who works most. When God calls us to Him, let us take with us the sincere esteem of others and the consciousness of having done our duty to the end; and, whatever our age, we shall have lived long enough.—Jean Henri Fabre in "The Story Book of Science."

ORDINANCE NO. 392

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE REGULATING THE INSTALLATION, ALTERATION AND REPAIR OF INSIDE AND OUTSIDE ELECTRICAL CONSTRUCTION AND PROVIDING FOR THE INSPECTION OF THE SAME AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 85 AND ALL ORDINANCES AMENDATORY THERE-TO.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.
Any person, firm or corporation desiring to install, alter, repair, add to, connect with or change any inside or outside electric wiring, connection, fixture, appliance, apparatus, machinery or work within the City of Glendale shall before doing so, make application in writing to the Superintendent of Buildings for and obtain a permit therefor; provided, that any necessary repairs to electric motors, generators or appliances, necessitating no new wiring, or no alterations to old wiring, or regular repairs necessary for proper maintenance of electric irons, heaters, sockets, or switch parts, shall not be deemed to be alterations or repairs, necessitating a permit within the meaning of this ordinance; but nothing herein shall be construed to relieve any person, firm or corporation from the necessity of obtaining a permit before altering or adding to any inside electrical wiring.

SECTION 2. WHEN PERMIT ISSUES.
When the fee herein required is paid and not before, the Superintendent of Buildings shall issue to the applicant a permit which shall state the kind of work to be done and the location by street and number of the building where the work is to be done. Such permit shall be without effect as to any work not therein described or as to any place other than therein specified. If the work authorized by such permit is not begun within ninety (90) days from the date thereof, such permit shall thereupon and thereafter be null and void; and before doing any further work at the location designated in such permit, a new permit must be obtained, in like manner as the first, and only upon payment of the fees specified in this ordinance.

SECTION 3. BUILDING PERMIT, WHEN NECESSARY.
When by any ordinance of the City of Glendale, in force now or hereafter, a building permit is necessary, the permit herein provided for shall not be issued until the building permit has been first obtained.

SECTION 4. EXTRA INSPECTION.
For the inspection of electrical apparatus or for extra inspection necessitated by defective work, or for any inspection service rendered for which no fee is herein prescribed, the Superintendent of Buildings shall charge and collect a fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) per hour for the time actually consumed in making the inspection. The minimum fee for such inspection shall be fifty cents (\$.50).

SECTION 5. DOUBLE FEE.
Any person, firm or corporation, who or which shall commence any electrical work in the City of Glendale, whether the same be new or alterations to old work, without first obtaining a permit therefor, as in this ordinance provided, if subsequently allowed to take out such per-

mit, shall be required to pay therefor double the fee herein provided for such permit.

SECTION 6. FEES.
The Superintendent of Buildings shall charge and collect for the use and benefit of the City of Glendale the following fees in advance for permits, inspections, and services:
For issuing permit, \$.50.
For minimum inspection of ten or less fixtures or outlets at which current is issued or controlled, \$1.50.
For each fixture or outlet over ten fixtures or outlets at which current is issued or controlled, \$.05.

FOR WIRING OR INSTALLING OF MOTORS OR GENERATORS:
For each motor of not more than 3 horse power, \$1.25.
For each motor of more than 3 and not more than 8 horse power, \$1.75.
For each motor of more than 8 and not more than 15 horse power, \$2.25.
For each motor of more than 15 and not more than 50 horse power, \$2.75.
For each motor of more than 50 horse power, \$5.25.
For each generator of not more than 5 kilowatts, \$3.00.
For each generator of more than 5 and not more than 15 kilowatts, \$5.00.
For each generator of more than 15 kilowatts capacity, \$10.00.

SECTION 7. INSPECTION AND CERTIFICATES.

Upon written notice being given, the Superintendent of Buildings shall within twenty-four (24) hours cause to be inspected all work done pursuant to any permit issued as herein provided and when such work is found to conform to the provisions and requirements of this ordinance, he shall issue a certificate to that effect. No such certificate shall be issued until the work conforms fully and in all respects to the provisions and requirements herein provided.

SECTION 8. CONCEALED ELECTRICAL WIRING.

The contractor shall test all concealed work upon completion of same. No work shall be covered or concealed until the certificate hereinbefore provided for shall have been issued, and the Superintendent of Buildings' notice of inspection and approval has been posted at the service switch outlet. All plumbing and other pipe and tube work must be in place on the work to be concealed before the electrical wiring is inspected. No such wiring shall be considered as completed until such piping and tube-work is in place. All wires under buildings shall be considered as concealed within the meaning of this ordinance. No job shall be considered as completed until the back plastering, if any, is completed.

SECTION 9. PIPES.

After inspection, no pipe or other metal work shall be placed nearer than three (3) inches to any electric work without first notifying the Superintendent of Buildings so that



ORDINANCE NO. 390

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE PLANTING OF TREES IN THE PUBLIC STREETS, ROADS, AVENUES, OR PUBLIC PLACES OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE; PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER OF THE SELECTION THEREOF; AND REGULATING THE PLANTING, DIGGING OUT, REMOVAL, OR TRIMMING OF ANY SUCH TREES; REPEALING ORDINANCES NUMBERS 75 AND 88.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale do ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to set out or plant, dig out, remove, trim, mutilate, destroy, or in any way injure any tree growing in any part of any public street, road, avenue, or public place in the City of Glendale, without first obtaining permission so to do as hereinafter provided; provided however, that nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prevent the owner of any property in the City of Glendale from parking the street parkway in front of such property with lawn, shrubs, or flowers, or caring for and maintaining the same.

Section 2. The planting and caring for all trees in any part of any public street, road, avenue or public place in the City of Glendale, and the digging out, removal, and trimming of any of the same shall be at all times under the supervision of the Public Welfare Department of the City of Glendale, Division of Forestry, subject to the authority and control of the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the City Manager in conjunction with the City Forester, to prepare from time to time and submit to the Board of Trustees a list of trees that he would recommend for planting upon the streets, roads, avenues, and public places of the City. The Board of Trustees, upon receipt of the said list, shall set a time for a Public hearing and consideration of the same, not earlier than two weeks after date of the presentation of said list, and cause notice of the said hearing to be published twice in a newspaper circulated in the City of Glendale. Upon such hearing, the Board of Trustees shall declare such of said trees as meet with their approval to be approved for planting in the streets, roads, avenues or public places of the City.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the City Manager in conjunction with the City Forester to prepare from time to time and submit to the Board of Trustees a list of trees, the planting of which upon the streets, roads, avenues, and public places of the City of Glendale he would recommend be prohibited. The Board of Trustees, upon receipt of the said list, shall set a time for a public hearing and consideration of the same not earlier than two weeks after the date of the presentation of such list, and cause notice of said hearing to be published twice in a newspaper circulated in the City of Glendale. Upon such hearing, the Board of Trustees may amend or revise said report and confirm or reject said report in whole or in part, and after confirmation thereof no such tree or trees as are set forth in said report, as such report has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall thereafter be planted in any of the streets, roads, avenues or public places of the City.

Section 5. It shall be lawful for the property holders representing a majority of the frontage upon both sides of any given street, road, avenue, or public place, or portion thereof not less than one block in length, to select any approved variety of tree or trees for planting in said street or portion thereof and to present their choice by petition to the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees upon receipt of said petition shall set a time for a public hearing and consideration of the same, not earlier than two weeks after date of presentation of said petition and cause notice of said hearing to be published twice in a newspaper circulated in the City of Glendale. Upon such hearing, if it is determined that the said trees are satisfactory, the Board of Trustees may by resolution designate such tree or trees to be the only kind to be planted in such street or portion thereof, and may also prescribe the distance apart such trees are to be planted and thereafter no other kind of trees shall be planted in said street or portion thereof.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the City Manager, upon the order of the Board of Trustees, or at such times as he may deem it advisable, to present to the said Board a plan for the planting of trees in any street, road, avenue, or public place, or portion thereof not less than one block in length, within the City of Glendale. Said plan shall set forth the variety and number of trees to be planted on said street or portion thereof, the distance apart said trees shall be planted, and the location thereof, and all other necessary details in connection therewith. The Board of Trustees upon receipt of such plan shall set a time for a public hearing, which hearing shall not be held earlier than two weeks from the filing of said plan and cause notice of said hearing to be published twice in a newspaper circulated within the City of Glendale. Upon said hearing the Board of Trustees may approve said plan as presented or may order such changes therein as in the judgment of the Board may be deemed advisable. Said plan, after approval by the Board, either as submitted or changed, shall become the plan for Tree Planting upon the said street or portion thereof and all trees planted upon the said street or portion thereof shall be of the kind shown on said plan, and shall be planted in accordance with the said plan; provided that should it be found that slight deviations from the said plan, as to location of trees,

are necessary, the same may be made under the direction of the City Forester.

Section 7. The City Manager may, from time to time, present to the Board of Trustees a list of trees growing in any public streets, roads, avenues, or place, or portion thereof, which trees are not of a kind approved under the provisions of Section 3, hereof, or have not made satisfactory growth, or for other reasons should be removed, stating the kind and location of such trees, with his recommendation that the removal of said trees be authorized. The Board of Trustees upon receipt of such list shall set a time for a hearing thereon, not less than two weeks after receipt thereof, and cause notice of said hearing to be published twice in a newspaper circulated in the City of Glendale. Upon such hearing the Board may authorize the removal of any or all the trees mentioned in said list.

Section 8. Any person, firm, or corporation desiring any permit to set out, or plant, dig out, trim, mutilate, or destroy or remove any tree growing in any part of any street, road, avenue, or public place in the City of Glendale shall make application therefor to the City Manager, who shall cause an investigation to be made in each instance. If upon such investigation it appears that the proposed act is authorized by a resolution of the Board of Trustees passed under the provisions of Section 5, Section 6, or Section 7, hereof, the City Manager shall grant the permit applied for. If such proposed act is not so authorized, the City Manager shall within ten days after the filing of said application report the same to the Board of Trustees, together with the results of such investigation, submitting therewith his recommendations in regard thereto. Upon receipt of such application and report the Board of Trustees may grant or deny said application or set a time for a public hearing and consideration of the same, not earlier than two weeks after the date of the presentation of said application and report. Upon such hearing, if the Board of Trustees should grant such application, the City Manager shall issue a permit in accordance therewith. For each permit for the removal or change of location of any tree planted in accordance with a plan adopted under the provisions of Section 5, Section 6, hereof, the sum of two dollars (\$2.00) shall be charged and collected for the use of the City of Glendale, and a separate permit shall be issued for each tree in such case.

Section 9. That Ordinance No. 75 entitled "AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE TRIMMING, PRUNING, CARE AND REMOVAL OF SHADE AND ORNAMENTAL TREES, SHRUBBERY AND PLANTS, IN AND UPON THE STREETS, PARKS, PLEASURE GROUNDS, BOULEVARDS, ALLEYS, OR PUBLIC PLACES OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE" be repealed and that Ordinance No. 88 entitled "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE PLANTING OF TREES OR SHRUBBERY IN THE PUBLIC STREETS, AVENUES, OR PUBLIC PLACES IN THE CITY OF GLENDALE AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER OF SELECTION THEREOF" be repealed.

Section 10. Any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than three hundred dollars (\$300.00) or by imprisonment in the County Jail of the County of Los Angeles for not more than ninety (90) days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 11. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Glendale Sentinel-Progress, a weekly newspaper published and circulated in the City of Glendale, and thereupon and thereafter it shall be in full force and effect.

That the grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns, shall have the right to construct and maintain such traps and manholes as may be necessary to afford proper access to the said pipes and pipe lines for cleaning and maintaining the same, and said traps and manholes shall at all times be kept flush with the surface of the highway and so located as to conform to any order of the Board of Trustees of said City in regard thereto, and not to interfere with the use of the highway for travel, water mains or permanent culverts along said street. The grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns, shall have the right, subject to such regulations as are now or hereafter may be in force, to make all necessary excavations in said highway for the construction and repair of said pipe lines, traps and manholes.

That the pipes to be laid and maintained under said franchise shall be of steel, of good workmanship and of an internal diameter of not less than twelve (12) inches nor more than sixteen (16) inches.

That the grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns shall furnish and sell to the City of Glendale, or to any person or company operating a distributing system and maintaining the same in the City of Glendale, now or hereafter, gas for domestic and manufacturing purposes, and that the gas so furnished shall be furnished and sold at wholesale rates to said City of Glendale, or other person or company, above referred to, and that the gas so furnished shall be of good quality, free of injurious ingredients and of sufficient purity to be suitable for domestic use or manufacturing use, and that the grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns, shall, upon request made by the City of Glendale, or by any person operating a distributing system now or hereafter in said City of Glendale, and upon payment of his, its or their reasonable charges for making the connection and for furnishing gas, furnish to such person, company or the said City of Glendale an adequate supply of said gas for domestic or manufacturing use, or for both such purposes.

That in event the said grantee, his, its or their successors or assigns shall in fact convey oil through said system of pipe lines said City of Glendale and all persons residing therein shall be entitled to receive from said grantee of this franchise an adequate supply of oil for domestic and manufacturing purposes, that the oil so to be furnished by said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns shall be of the same purity and grade as the oil furnished by said grantee, his, its or their successors or assigns to other customers along said pipe line system and at the termini thereof, and that the grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns, shall, upon request from and by said City of Glendale, or by any person or company operating a distributing system now or hereafter in said City of Glendale for the distribution of oil and upon payment of his, its or their reasonable charges for making the connection and for furnishing such oil, furnish to such person or company or the said City of Glendale an adequate supply of said oil for domestic or manufacturing use or for both such purposes.

That all pipes shall be laid not less than two feet under ground, and, unless the Board of Trustees of said City shall otherwise direct, shall be laid along the sides of the highways and shall be within five feet from the curb lines in said street, and shall not be nearer than three feet to the macadamized portion of said road; and in the event that it is necessary to cross any portion of macadamized road, cement gutter or culvert, the same shall be done in such manner as not to disturb the foundation thereof, and in event the same cannot thus be done, the said crossing shall be made under a special permit to be granted by the Board of Trustees of said City upon application therefor, said application to be accompanied with a drawing,

specifications and explanations, showing the necessity for the same. That during the laying or repairing of any such pipes, any trench or excavation made for such purpose shall, from sunset to sunrise, be barricaded and protected by lanterns placed at distances of not more than one hundred feet apart, along such trench or excavation, one of which shall be placed in the center of any cross street fronting on said San Fernando Road, at the point where said work is in progress.

That every pipe line constructed, maintained or repaired under the provisions of this franchise shall be constructed, maintained and repaired in accordance and conformity with all of the ordinances, rules and regulations now in force and that may hereafter be adopted and prescribed by the Board of Trustees of said City of Glendale.

That the work of laying or repairing such pipes or other appliances shall be conducted with the least possible hindrance to the use of said highways for the purposes of travel, and as soon as the laying or repairing of any pipe or appliance is completed, all portions of the highways which have been excavated or otherwise injured thereby shall be placed in as good condition as the same were before the laying of such pipes, to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees of said City of Glendale. That any damage or injury suffered by any person, by reason of any excavation being improperly guarded during said work, or by any cause whatever, in connection with construction, laying or repair of said pipe lines, or pipe, shall be borne by the grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns.

That the City of Glendale reserves the right to change the grade of said street or any portion thereof over which this franchise shall be granted, and the grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns shall at once change the location of all pipes and other appliances laid under said franchise so as to conform to such change of grade. That if any portion of said highway shall be damaged by reason of leaks in any pipe laid under said franchise, or by any other cause, the grantee of such franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns, shall, at his, its or their own expense repair any such damage and put said highway in as good condition as before such leak, or other damage, to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees of said City.

That if the grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns, shall fail to comply with any of the instructions of said Board of Trustees with respect to the location of any portion of said system of pipes and pipe lines, or the repair of any damage to highways, within ten days after the service of written notice upon said grantee, his, its or their successors or assigns, requiring compliance therewith, then said Board of Trustees may immediately do whatever work is necessary to carry out said instructions, at the cost and expense of said grantee, his, its or their successors or assigns, which costs, by the acceptance of said franchise, said grantee, his, its or their successors or assigns agree to pay upon demand.

That the work of constructing and laying said system of pipes and pipe lines, shall be commenced in good faith within not more than four months from the granting of said franchise.

That the said grantee of said franchise, his, its or their successors or assigns shall, during the life of said franchise, pay to the City of Glendale, in lawful money of the United States, two per cent of the gross annual receipts of such grantee and his or its successors or assigns arising from the use, operation or possession of said franchise. No percentage shall be paid for the first five years succeeding the date of said franchise, but thereafter such percentage shall be payable annually.

And it shall be the duty of the grantee of said franchise and of his or its successors or assigns, to file with the Clerk of said City of Glendale at the expiration of six years from the date of granting said franchise, and at the expiration of each and every year thereafter, a statement, verified by the oath of the manager or presiding officer of said grantee or his or its successors or assigns, showing in detail the total gross receipts and gross earnings collected or received by said grantee or his or its successors or assigns during the preceding twelve months, arising from the use, operation or possession of said franchise, and within ten days after the time for filing the aforesaid statement, it shall be the duty of said grantee and his or its successors or assigns to pay to the City Treasurer of the City of Glendale the aggregate sum of the said percentage upon the amount of the gross annual receipts arising from the use, operation or possession of said franchise, and if the amount paid is incorrect, in the judgment of the Board of Trustees, they may order the payment of such additional sum as they may find due hereunder, and if not paid, the same may be collected by suit. And any neglect, omission or refusal by said grantee or his or its successors or assigns to file said verified statement, or to pay the said percentage of the said gross annual receipts at the times or in the manner hereinbefore provided, shall ipso facto work a forfeiture of said franchise and all of rights thereunder, to the City of Glendale.

That said grantee or his or its successors or assigns shall not sell, transfer, assign or lease said franchise or any part thereof, or any of the rights or privileges granted thereby, except by a duly executed instrument in writing filed in the office of the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale, and nothing in said franchise contained shall be construed to grant to said grantee or his or its successors or assigns any right to sell, transfer, or assign or lease said franchise or any of the rights or privileges thereby granted except in the manner aforesaid.

the said grantee, its successors or assigns through the pipe line for the construction of which this franchise is granted be disposed of directly or indirectly to any competitor of said grantee or its associated or subsidiary companies, operating in said City of Glendale, and be sold therein, except by the consent of the Board of Trustees of said City.

 said wires may be properly inspected and protected. In such cases all requirements of the Superintendent of Buildings as to placing of the wire or work, or as to the insulation thereof, shall be fully complied with.

SECTION 10. TEMPORARY WORK.

When a permit to install work of a temporary character for a time to be specified in such permit not in any case to exceed thirty (30) days shall have been issued by the Superintendent of Buildings, a strict compliance with the rules for permanent work will not be exacted, provided the character of the work is entirely safe for the period designed in the permit. No temporary work or alterations shall be allowed on live circuits unless protected by proper switch and fuse.

SECTION 11. STATE LAW.

Except as otherwise herein provided, regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, as embodied in their "National Electric Code" of 1918, and all California State Laws governing electric wiring and apparatus are hereby adopted as the rules and regulations for installing and using electrical wiring connections, appliances and apparatus in said City.

SECTION 12. CONDUIT, OR GREENFIELD-METAL MOULDING SHALL BE USED AS FOLLOWS:

All wires in or on all buildings or other structures which shall hereafter be constructed in Fire District No. 1, in the City of Glendale; all wires in or on all buildings, residences, or other structures which shall hereafter be constructed in the City of Glendale for the use of more than two families; all wires in or on all buildings, to-wit: schools, theaters, churches, public garages, hospitals, or sanitariums and all manufacturing plants or any other building or structure hereafter erected in the City of Glendale deemed impracticable or unsafe in the opinion of the Superintendent of Buildings to be wired otherwise, which wires are used for light, heat or power, shall be encased in approved metal conduit, armored cable or metal moulding.

Ordinary black or galvanized pipe shall not be approved for use as conduit.

SECTION 13. HEATING CIRCUITS.

All heating devices consuming more than 500 watts per hour shall be on separate circuits, using No. 10 B. & S. gauge wire or larger.

All heaters consuming 1500 watts or over per hour shall be placed on 220 volt circuits. All wiring for heating devices shall be in conduit. All residences where more than 3 circuits are needed must have 3 wire services.

SECTION 14. UNLAWFUL TO DO WORK WITHOUT OBTAINING PERMIT, ETC.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation as principal, agent, officer, servant or employee, for himself or itself, or for another person, firm or corporation to maintain or use any electrical wiring, installation, or equipment or any wiring, installation or equipment contained in underground conduits, until the same shall be made to conform to the requirements of this ordinance; or
 To hinder, impede or interfere with the Superintendent of Buildings or his assistants in the discharge of his duties under this ordinance, or to refuse, fail or neglect to comply with and to conform to any of the provisions or requirements of this ordinance; or
 To maintain or use or suffer or permit to be maintained or used upon premises owned or controlled by him or it, any electrical wiring connections, fixtures, appliances, apparatus, machinery or work, which does not conform to the requirements of this ordinance, or to any work for which by this ordinance a permit is required without first obtaining such permit.

SECTION 15.

The provisions of this ordinance do not apply to Central Stations.

SECTION 16. CITY NOT LIABLE.

This ordinance shall not be construed to relieve from or lessen the responsibility of any person, firm or corporation owning, operating, controlling, or installing any electric wiring, connections, fixtures, appliances, apparatus, machinery, equipment or work, inside, outside, overhead or underground in the City of Glendale for damages to any one injured by defect therein, nor shall the City be held as assuming any such liability by reason of the inspection authorized herein or certificate issued as herein provided, or by reason of any of the matters or things herein provided for and regulated.

SECTION 17.


Ordinance No. 85, entitled "AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE, CREATING THE OFFICE OF CITY ELECTRICIAN, PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT AND BOND OF SUCH OFFICER AND PRESCRIBING HIS POWERS AND DUTIES, AND ESTABLISHING RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR INSTALLING, CONNECTING, WIRING OR OTHERWISE PUTTING IN PLACE ELECTRICAL WIRES, EQUIPMENT OR APPARATUS IN THE CITY OF GLENDALE" and all ordinances amendatory thereto are hereby repealed.

SECTION 18. PENALTY.

Any person, firm or corporation as principal agent, officer, servant, or employee, who or which shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed Three Hundred (\$300.00) dollars or by imprisonment not to exceed three months in the County Jail of Los Angeles County, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 19.

The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and cause the same to be published once in the Glendale Sentinel Progress, a weekly

rado street joins San Fernando Road and desiring that the city fix a price for the same. Referred to City Manager.

Demands were presented and referred to the Finance Committee. Later, the Finance Committee reported back approved and on motion of Trustee Stephenson warrants were ordered to be issued in payment of the same.

The City Manager reported in regard to the application for a permit to establish a "Rest Home" on Verdugo Road, that in connection a committee of citizens was present to protest against the granting of the request. Mr. Joseph Kirkby addressed the board in regard to the matter and on motion of Trustee Stephenson, the request for a permit was denied.

The hearing of protests against the operation of the moving picture establishment on Windsor Road was taken up and petitions signed by 157 residents of the city and over 200 business men, were presented favoring the denial of protests. Trustee Stephenson stated that owing to the fact that a member of the firm with which he is connected had drawn up some papers in the case, he would therefore refrain from discussing or voting on the proposition. A number of speakers addressed the board favoring both sides of the question. A motion made by Trustee Henry and seconded by Trustee Robinson that the protests against the operation of the moving picture establishment referred to, be denied, resulted in a vote as follows:

Ayes: Trustees Henry Robinson, Noes: Trustees Bartlett, Shaw. Not voting: Stephenson.

Boiling Steel In Oil

Cincinnati is one of six places in the world where steel is strengthened by being boiled in oil. At a plant in Carthage, a steel shaft weighing 30,000 pounds, the largest piece ever subjected to the new method, went through the process of being strengthened. It was a "hollow bored tumbler shaft" for use in dredging gold in California, costing about \$17,000. The great shaft was first suspended in an upright furnace until heated to just below the melting point and dropped it into a huge well of oil, where it boiled and sputtered, throwing out clouds of oily mist.
