New York, Jan. 8.—The response of the police and fire departments to the call was prompt, and within an incredibly short time nearly 300 firemen, ambulance surgeons and trainmen were in the smoke and steam filled tunnel working heroically to get the bodies of the dead and wounded passengers from the wrecked trains.

J. H. Franklin, manager of the Harlem division of the New York Central railway, made the following statement concerning the wreck: "We are investigating thoroughly, but we are first taking out the injured, and having them cared for, and until that is done the investigation cannot proceed quickly. As far as can be learned the wrecked train was stopped by the block system because of something wrong ahead. I have not yet found out what was the matter, ahead. A flagman jumped off

the train and was taking back a 'red lantern'hid a railroad torpedo. He put the torpedo on the track and waved the lantern to the engineer of the coming train. Whether the engineer saw the flagman, saw the lantern, or heard the torpedo, if it went off, I don't know, and the flagman says he does hot know."

The railroad officials said the wreck did not take fire.

FRAUD FRUSTRATED.

Scheme by Which Farmers Would Have Lost About \$35,000.

ANXIOUS TO PREVENT UNFOUNDED REPORTS

New York, Jan. 8.—The King's health is all that can be desired, and court officials speak without reserve, cables the London correspondent of the Tribune. He refers constantly to the subject himself and seems to be bent upon preventing a revival of the sinister rumors which cost the tradesmen heavily when they were insuring the coronation stocks.

What was once known as "The Prince of Wales set" has been restored to favor, if it were ever in danger of being excluded from the court, and the Queen welcomes at Sandringham all the King's old friends.

The King is described by officials as following closely his mother's manner in dealing with public business. He makes it a matter of conscience to read every document carefully and to ask information if he does not fully understand. He takes every detail of the business of reigning as seriously and methodically as she was in the habit of doing, and uses many of her characteristic expressions.

KAISER'S SPEECH

At Opening of the Prussian Diet-A' Gloomy View of the Economic Situation.

Associated Press.)

Berlin, Jan. 8.—The speech from the throne, read by the imperial chancellor Count von Buelow at the opening of the Prussian Diet to-day, took a gloomy view of the economic situation. It pointed out that the revenue from the staterailreads in 1901 falls considerably short of the estimates, and the whole results of the financial year disappointing. In the budget for 1902 the revenue is estimated below that of the current year, but the balance between the revenue and experientiative is to be maintained without having recourse to a league.

The speech announced legislation providing for the housing of state workmen and officials earning small salaries. Considerable credits are demanded for the extension of the state railways and the promotion and construction of light railroads.

Emperor William's speech concluded with pointing to the necessity of a measure against the agitation in the Polish districts in eastern Prussia and declared that the upholding of the political and economic position of the German element there was a necessity for the self preservation of Prussia, and promised that the government would fulfik its duty in cultivating the German natianal spirit in that region and in combating, with firmness, all tendencies hostile to the state.


