TRAINS COLLIDE ON RAILWAY PIER

Score of Persons Injured, Some of Them Fatally, at Berkeley

(Times Leased Wire.)

Berkeley, Cal., Feb. 12.—A score of persons were injured, some fatally, when a Berkeley train on the Key route pier, about two miles from the shore, telescoped an Oakland train which had stopped for signals early to-

the front car of the Berkeley train were severely shaken up and slightly were severely snaken up and signif-injured. A dozen men in the smoker were crushed and mangled. Several were unconscious when they were taken out of the wreck.

The pier at the point where the

wreck occurred is just wide enough for two tracks, and consists of piles with ties laid across them, there being no solid platform except a very narrow

passage way.

Panic prevailed among the women in the front part of the Berkeley train and in the Oakland train, but cooler Tokio, Feb. 12.—Seeing retaliation in heads prevented a rush that undoubt-

The injured were taken from the Oakland smoker and stretched on the ties of the inbound track. Both trains were heavily loaded with men and women going to San Francisco to work.

Hundreds climbed out of the windows and doors of the cars as soon as the trash occurred, and blocked the nervow pier. A boat from San Francisco had just arrived in her slip at the pier and hundreds of persons, leaving it, walked down the pier to the scene of the wreck. This caused a congestion of excited passengers on the narrow passageway which made it extremely difficult to carry on the rescue work. IN WRECK OF LINER

PROBABLY PERISHED

Rocks-Fate of Crews Unknowr

Marseilles, France, Feb. 12.-Hoping against hope for news of relatives or friends who were aboard the wrecked French Trans-Atlantic Steamship Company's liner Chanzy, hundreds of auguished persons besieged the company's offices here to-day.

Half crazed with grief they attempted to wreck the offices. A riot was prevented by a strong police guard.

The liner foundered yesterday off the

Island of Majorca, the largest of the Balerica group. Marcell Morrel, an Algerian customs officer, and a pas-senger named Bladez were the only survivors.

There were 87 passengers on the

steamer when she foundered, in ad-dition to the 70 members of the crew. It is almost certain that 155 persons ost their lives

Morrel has been taken to a hospital on the Island of Minorca. His mind is giving away under the certible strain, and he constantly raves of the awful scene that tollowed the wreck and the ries of the doomed men and women

It would be both profitless and impolitic to discuss these features of the defence programme at this time. The only thing worthy of consideration is that in the judgment of the Canadian government, as we are going to undertake the responsibility of nava defence, we might as well lay the foundations of a complete and comprehensive system - something that will develop gradually and naturally with the growth of the country in population and wealth. 

### WILL SHIP OIL IN TANK CARS

PACIFIC WHALING ADOPTS NEW METHOD

Later Tank Steamers Are Expected to Come Direct to Esquimalt

A new method of shipping whale oil to Glasgow has been arranged by the Pacific Whaling Co. In the past the Bise Funnel liners have carried all the oil for the com-pany by way of the Orient and the Medi-terranean, but from 'this time on it will

be sent overland to Boston or some other Eastern port and shipped across the Atlantic from that place.

The oil will be brought to Victoria in harrels and disclarged at the inner harbor at a point as near as possible to the C. P. R. freight yards. At the yards they will be unloaded on a platform from which the oil will flow direct into tank cars. At the Atlantic shipping port the oil will be pumped out into a tank steamer which will take it direct to lis destination.

The new move has been made on account of the larks expense in providing barrels for all the oil, and also on account of the leakage which is common. In the tanks the company will have to pay for transporting the oil only, whereas at present the barrels as well as the oil are paid for. It is claimed by the menagement that there will be a great saving of expense by operating in this way.

Few good men. go in for the deep sea business these days go in for the deep sea business these days for there is an attempt to cling to the ole scale of wages among the wind-jammers The result is they can get nothing but the scum of the earth to man the vessels, and these go only when they are in a state of semi-starvation and can get no-

state of 'semi-stavation and can get no-thing to do ashore.

Even in the Old Country \$50 a month is not very alturing for a ship of over two thousand tons. Here it is an isopossible rate of wages, and no mate would ship at the price. If it were just a trip to the United Kingdom with an opportunity of leaving the vessel there or of spending a good time in port it might attract some one anxious to visit that country, but to Australia and return is not very enticing.

Ophir will take her departure with the mails from Adelaide, bound for Naples The steamers Osterley, Otranto, Otway, Orvieto, Ophir, Orontes and Omnah will provide the fleet. They departure days from Melbourne next month and thence forward will be alternate Wednesdays, instead of Tuesdays, as at present. The mails will be taken on board at Adelaide on Fridays instead of Thursdays. The P. & O. Company's mail service will not be affected. The eight vessels named in the contract with the Orient Company are to do the journey from Adelaide to Naples in Sco hours, and on the return journey from Toranto, where the mails are to be shipped, to Adelaide, in 628 hours. Each of the five new steamers has to make in suitated space for carrying perishable produce of not less than 2,000 tons of 40 cubuc feet to the tony The other vessels are to provide proportionate space. The charges for carriags are not to be higher than a halfpenny per lb. net for butter, and £3 per ton for fruit. CURB ON BUYING AND **SELLING ON MARGINS** 

Board of Governors of Stock Exchange and Gov. Hughes Will Act

ertain reform segislation to the au-horities at Albany.

The present laws affecting specula-ion are loosely constructed. It is a loke on the "Street" that a clever lawjoke on the "Street" that a clever law-yer can drive a team of horses through any of them. For instance, there is an anti-bucket shop law on the statute books. It was forced through the legis-lature by public sentiment cleveriy aid-ed by most of the big stock exchange firms, who saw in it a plan to add to that husters from the bucket shop. business from the bucket shop s. One of the firms that took a clients. One of the firms that took a leading part in having the bill passed, a very old and supposedly very conservative firm, whose head is quoted freely whenever there is a financial flurry as to the cause and the remedy, is notorious for the manner in which all of its outside orders are bucketed.

and to-day there is hardly a city in the state where there are not half a dozen bucket shops all doing business as the "representative" of firms that do business on the Philadelphia or Pittsburg exchanges. So if new laws are to be made it may

So if new laws are to be made it may be necessary to have the men who have the interest of the exchange at heart take a hand in having them enforced. Because of this, frequent conferences of the officials are being held and it is openly stated that Governor Hughes in sympathy with the movement and that he has premised to help all he can be being the legislature pass only by having the legislature pass only such laws as the officials finally decide are necessary.

The proposed laws will, it is under The proposed laws will, it is under-stood, so curb buying and selling on margins as to make it impossible for outsiders to buy into a stock with a margin of less than five points, and spread their money around so thin that a few thousands will carry an enor-mous section of stock. This latter method has caused many big flurries recently, and it is proposed to limit speculation of this sort by compelling the positing of a 20 per cent, margin to he posting of a 20 per cent. margin to arry all transactions.

It will be made mandatory for banks It will be made mandatory for banks and brokerage firms in valueing securities for the purpose of margins or collateral to take their average price during the past three months instead of the marked quotations. This will, it is claimed, prevent pyramiding.

But the big reform will be the attempt to make the exchange a responsible body by forcing it to incorporate. Over this question there will be waged one of the hardest fights ever fought by the stock exchange. Senti-

While there is no possibility of such an action at the present time, yet should the reforms that are to be forced fail to accomplish their purpose, there is a good chance of the proposition being renewed when the next legislature meets.

work to do that has ever occurred in any country, men who have shown what can be done in educational matters in Canada, And we feel that the spirit evinced in British Columbia since this legislation has been before the House is the same that has brought similar matters to accessful issues in other parts of the Dominion.

"We approach the question with the hope that we will be met in the broad spirit which has animated the House ince 1907. We trust that the attitude since 1907. We trust that the attitude the government is taking will forever all ay localism. We trust we have come to the definite point where we can give effect to the decision we arrived at some time ago, that there would be a ressation, so far as the government is oncerned, of the influences so strongby brought to bear upon us during three years. We would prefer all local bodies to get the best data they can and furnish it to the commission, provided the commission makes a demand for it. We feel that in the present ove the government is breaking the spirit of localism, while it may conently boy that the British Columbian spirit will meet with the com-missioners in the sense of patriotism, of helping in the educational improve-ment of the province and the upbuilding of the university. We feel that sectional and political differences should not exist at all. Fortunately political differences have been conspicuous by their absence in the whole course of the university discussions. Sectionalism is the one complaint we have to make, but I feel that that day s over; that we are going to accomined on the platform and on the floor of this House, the accomplishment of an object as full and as complete as we have pictured it.

"We have heard the Premier and

other speakers drawing rosy pictures of what the ultimate result will be. of what the utilistic result will be. From my close connection with this legislation from the outset, from my knowledge of educational affairs as head of the department, and from what I hear among educationists generally. do not think that any too rosy pic-ure has been drawn. British Columbia stands pre-eminent as the univerprovince of Canada. (Cheers.) The results we have obtained in the matriculation examinations, the re-sults of the examinations in our high schools have placed our students away n front of any others in any of the lleges. In one year, out of a class of colleges. In one year, out of a class of 67 no fewer than 25 came from British Columbia; of the leaders 21 were from this province and the one who led last year was a British Columbian. (Hear, hear.) We are supplying the universities with students; we are sending scholars to the Old Country and the United States. I have not any figures United States. I have not any figures for the latter countries, but last year upwards of 300 students went out of for the latter countries, but last year upwards of 300 students went out of British Columbia to the universities of the East, and there were probably 800 graduates of our high schools ready to enter if there had been a university at home. We are getting rich enough where, with a university here on the broad lines we have laid down and with a staff of broad men we could have an institution that I predict with the first warry would have 800 students. in five years would have 800 student

or more.

"We have a number of colleges waiting to affiliate as soon as the university is established. We have Westminster Hall in Vancouver. We have under design by the Episcopai church the end habitett of the Statistic fee which there is a fund of £40,000 ready, which there is a fund of 640,000 ready, and which would affiliate with the university. There is Columbia College to New Westminster only waiting for this to geniarge their institution and use it more as a preliminary school. We have the college at Summerland, all these institutions are filled to overflowing. 



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#### FORMER VICTORIAN REFUTES TORY TALES

Hedley Chapman Silences Tariff Reform Candidate in **English Constituency** 

The mendacities of the tariff reform rs have gone down -unchallenged in Chertsey, and the fairy tales with hich the Tory candidate, Mr. Macof the electorate have been promptly exposed, says the London Daify Chronicle of January 25th.

This gentleman had been assuring his audiences that living and clothing are cheaper in "protected" America than n Free-Trade England, Mr. Hedley apman, a mining engineer with great experience of life in America, retorted that a suit of clothes which cost 50s in this country could not be obtained at anything like that price in Seattle. Some months after this statement by Mr. Chapman the Tory candidate spe-peared in a suit of clothes which he declared he had bought at Vancouver, British Columbia, from the Hudson Bay people for \$10.

Bay people for \$10.

It will be observed that Mr. Macmaster had shifted his battle ground from the United States to Vancouver, but even here Mr. Chapman has been able to bring bim to the ground.

By a piece of good fortune Mr. Chap-nan happened to have in his possession celpts for two suits of clothes sup ed to miners working on the "gr take" principle, at a mine in he had been interested

These receipts are interesting for they show that these suits were supplied by Messrs. Chubb & Stewart, of Hastings street west, Vancouver, B. C., in January, 1909, at \$35 apiece. This means that a rough serviceable suit of workman's clothes actually cost more than £1. Nor were these suits imported, for the trade union tab upon them shows that they were made in Toronto.

Then, as to the allegation by Mr Macmaster that he bought his suit from the Hudson's Bay Company at Vancouver for \$10, Mr. Chapman wrote to the Vancouver depot of that company for their lowest quotation. The reply from the Hudson's Bay Company at Vancouver states: "We can supply en's suits in blue and black serge and worsted material for \$20, \$22.50 and and worsted material for \$20, \$22.50 and \$25. In the good qualities of tweed suits we are pretty well sold out."

529 only the cheapest suit can be sup-plied, as the "good quality of tweed suits" are sold out and so their price is not quoted.
