- Research public library connections

 Build awareness/recruit US public library staff; design curriculum; recruit Wikipedia guides
- Deliver 9-week online training program; Sept. 13 - Nov. 15, 2017 Enrolled ~300 U.S. public library staff
- Collect / publish case studies and resources Evaluate and share learnings




What do public library staff want?



Welcome to WikiProject Women in Red (WiR), a WikiProject whose objective is to turn "re within the project scope: women's biographies and works by women.

We recognized a need for this work as, in November 2014, only about 15% of the English were about women. Founded in July 2015, WiR strives to improve the figure which has rejune. But that means, according to WHGI , only 250,234 of our 1,472,810 biographies at "Content gender gap" is a form of systemic bias, and WiR addresses it in a positive way the

What are participants doing with their learnings?




Librarians rocked the course!

By the numbers*

- The 236 active participant editors
- made over 5900 edits
- and 369 Commons uploads
- to improve 799 articles
- and create 6 new articles!

Since the start of the course, there have been 36.1m views of improved articles

How did the project take a feminist approach to Wikipedia training?

- Respect participants as unique individuals with a diversity of perspectives, situated knowledges
- Facilitate human-to-human connections to build a supportive, empathetic community
- Name Wikipedia's limits, gaps and biases, identify opportunities to affect meaningful change
- Feature & champion the activist work being done to address limits, gaps and biases
- Educate participants so they can confidently decide for themselves how to engage
- Recognize labors—and aim to enable library staff to incorporate Wikipedia into their paid work
- Stay positive and be kind
